"It's not a bad problem to have."

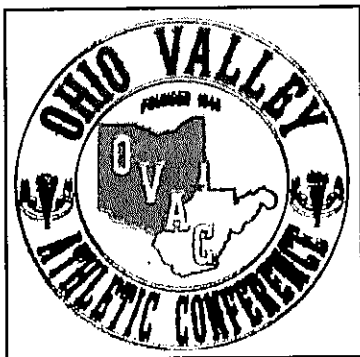
Garbash also has a dilemma that's not too bad to have. He has four talented swimmers who all just happen to be seniors, and thus gone next year.

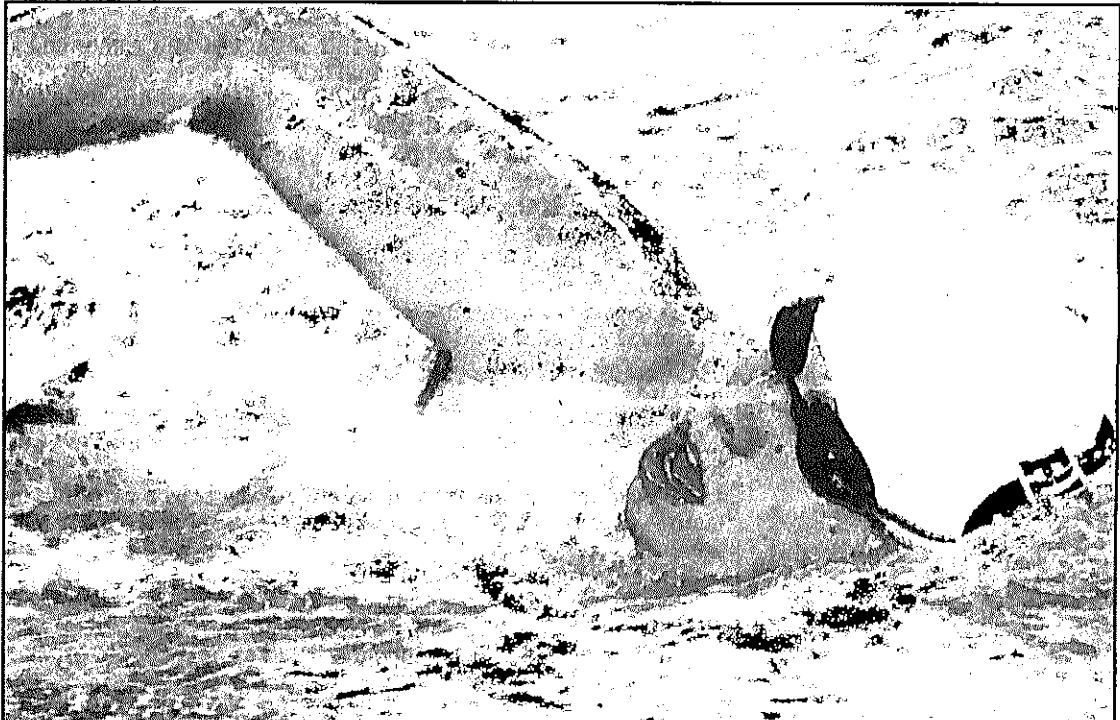

Linsly boys win OVAC swim title

• Big Red, Central also win

Snow showers, 29 degrees, and a winter weather advisory. Not exactly what you'd call prime swimming conditions.

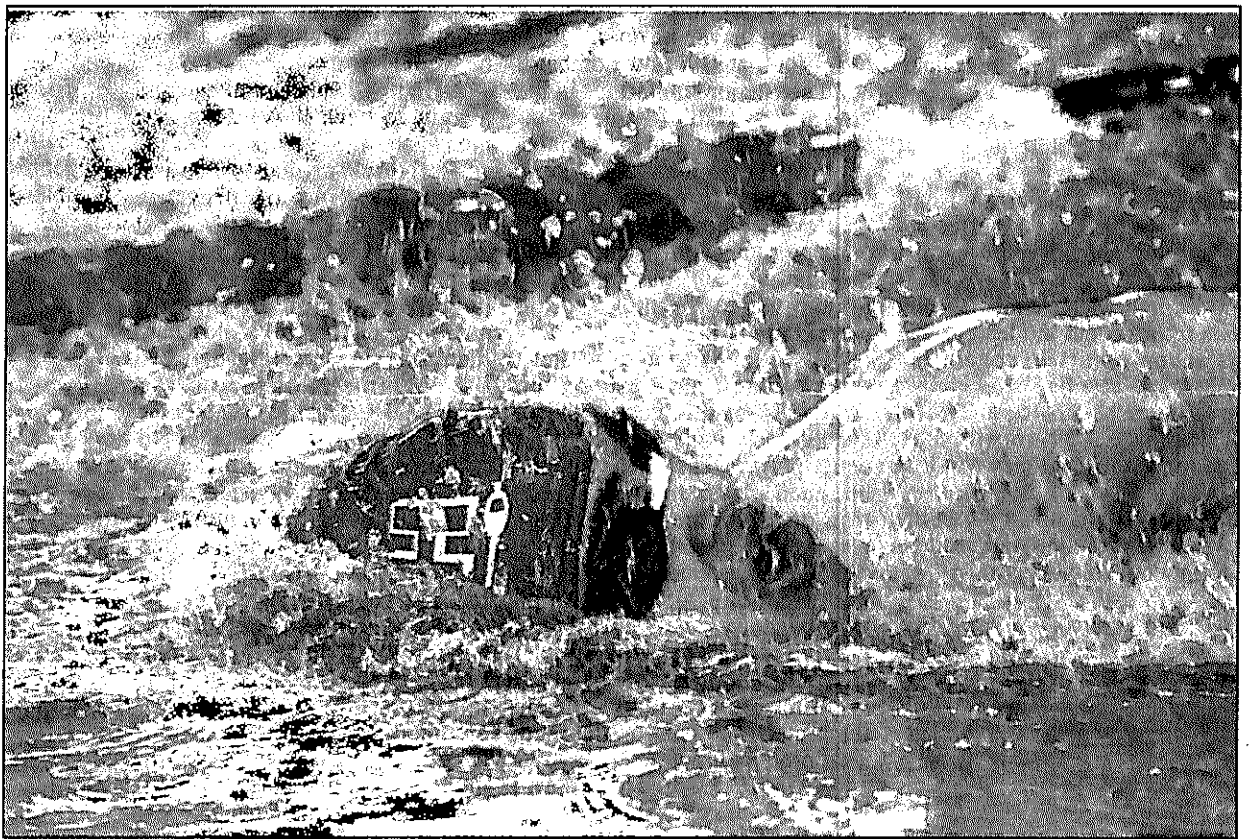
But inside the friendly, but balmy confines of the Steubenville High School Natatorium, the climate was just right for the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Swimming Championships.

Those confines were particularly friendly to the host Big Red, which won titles in both the boys' and girls' Big School Division.

In the Small School section, the Linsly boys out-dueled Steubenville Central and St. John Central, and the Lady Crusaders put some distance between themselves and the runner-up Lady Devils from St. Clairsville.

The venue was packed with more than 409 participants -- up more than 50 from last season. However, that may be too many for one meet. One proposal to rectify the overflow has three multisite preliminaries to allow swimmers to qualify for the OVAC meet.

"It's an Olympic year, so suddenly we have over 400 swimmers," said St. John Central's Ed Garbash. "Now the question is, how do we host this meet next

Record Numbers for OVAC Swimmers

Twenty-one teams, 409 athletes slated to participate in event

A record 21 teams will visit Steubenville High School's natatorium this weekend for the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Swimming and Diving Championships.

The diving portion of the competition takes place today. Girls' action gets underway at 4:15 p.m., followed by the boys' event. Steubenville and Steubenville Central are the only schools fielding div-

ing squads.

Swimming events will begin at 11 a.m. Saturday and conclude at approximately 6 p.m.

With a record number of teams participating and 114 heats slated in 24 events, the 2005 version of the competition promises to be one of the longest on record.

That suits meet organizer and Linsly head coach Bill Brubaker just fine.

"We're probably getting to the point where we'll have to look at splitting the meet in some fashion next year," said Brubaker, in his 25th season at the Cadets' helm.

"But that's a nice problem to have."

East Liverpool is back in the mix this year, while Wheeling Central is entering

a squad for the first time.

All told, 409 swimmers are slated to compete. The girls' 50 freestyle has the most entrants with 67.

Brooke High School will be back to defend its Big School crowns on the boys' and girls' sides. Barnesville is the defending champ in the Small School girls' division, while Brubaker's Cadets are defending titlists in boys' competi-

tion.

St. Clairsville junior Ali Myers is the only swimmer, girl or boy, that has a chance to repeat in two individual events.

Myers is the defending champ in the 200 freestyle and 500 freestyle. She holds the top seed in both events this year.

Myers is also part of St. Clairsville's other top-seeded event – the 200 medley relay. There, she will team up with Alison Garbash, Sarah Heydle and Kelley Kubic.

Another tanker looking for a huge day is Wheeling Park's Sarah Hooff.

Hooff, a junior, is the top seed in the 100 breaststroke and the 200 IM.

Steubenville Rules The OVAC Pool

Big Red sweeps big-school meet; Linsly, Crusaders also prevail



It was a big day for Steubenville High School Saturday as both the boys and girls captured Big School titles at the 2005 Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Swimming and Diving Championships at Big Reds' natatorium.

Steubenville wrapped up the boys' crown with 345 points, well in front of second place Brooke, which recorded 218 markers.

Wheeling Park was third, followed by Edison, Cambridge, John Marshall, Beaver Local and Zanesville.

The Steubenville girls won their title with 393 points.

OVAC Swimming

Wheeling Park was second with 272.5 points, followed by Brooke, Edison, Beaver Local, John Marshall and Zanesville.

In the Small School division, Linsly's boys and Steubenville Catholic's girls took home trophies.

Coach Bill Brubaker's Cadets repeated with a total of 301 points. Steubenville Catholic was second, followed by Bellaire St. John, Martins Ferry, Bellaire, Barnesville, St. Clairsville, Weir, Wellsville and Wheeling Central.

The Crusaders took the crown with 371 points, well ahead of second-place St. Clairsville, which tallied 168. Weir was third followed by Barnesville, Linsly, Mount de Chantal, Bellaire, Martins Ferry, Shadyside, Wellsville and Wheeling Central.

Hupp was also a winner individually in the 200 freestyle (2:03.75), while fellow Big Red Jeremiah Carmine picked up a victory Friday in the one meter diving event (231.55).

Bellaire St. John's boys, which had seven top seeds entering this weekend's event, brought home three victories.

The relay team of Kevin Rico, Eric Rico, Michael Totterdale and Jake Palmer swam to victories in both the 200 medley relay (1:49.15) and the 200 freestyle relay (1:36.81).

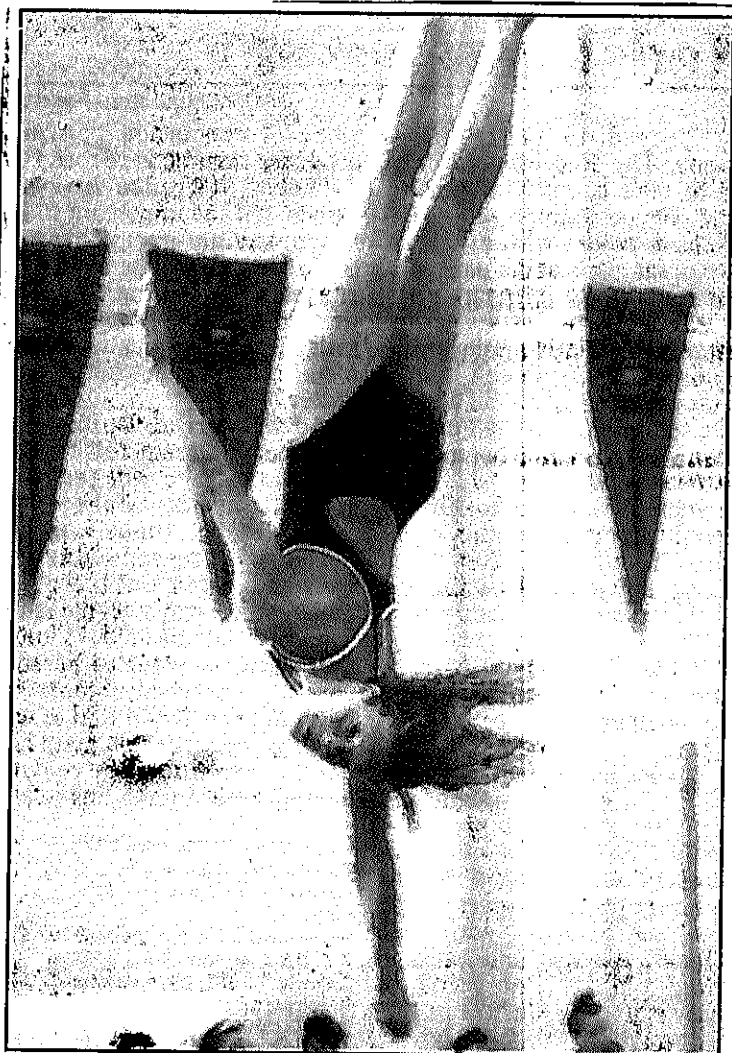
