lead local contingent

All week long, St. Clairsville head coach Sarah Steele thought her Lady Red Devil swimmers had a shot to make some noise and possibly claim their first OVAC swimming title.

The Lady Red Devils, paced by Alison and Jamie Garbash, claimed five individual titles to claim runner-up honors in the small school meet during the OVAC Swimming Championships Saturday afternoon at Steubenville High School.

"I'm very ecstatic because this is the first time St. Clairsville has done that well (at OVAC)," Steele said. "The kids have worked really hard so this was a good day for us.

"I'm not upset at all about finishing second," she continued. "We've got half the number of swimmers as Steubenville Central, so to be that close to them (241-186) with half the amount of swimmers is awesome for us."

Alison Garbash led the way for St. Clairsville winning four gold medals, 100- and 50-yard freestyle individual events and anchoring the winning 200- and 500-yard freestyle relays.

Garbash's effort was a surprise to her coach.

"That's amazing," Steele said.

"She has worked hard so hard, has come on so strong and been so dominate this year and to see her be rewarded for all her hard work is great."

Garbash could barely contain her excitement.

"This feels really great and I'm excited," Alison Garbash said. "This is the first time I've won individual titles."

Garbash said she was confident heading into the 50-yard freestyle, which she won in 25.63.

"The 50 was pretty easy," she said. "I knew where the other swimmers were and I've beaten them before, but I was surprised that I beat them by that much (almost a full second)."

Alison Garbash's second individual title came in the 100-yard freestyle, which she swam in 57.39, against a girl she had never beaten.

"The 100-yard freestyle was difficult because I swam against a girl that had won the OVAC title twice in the 100 and I had never beaten her," she said. "My goal was to beat her and I achieved that goal, though it was a little bit harder."

Not to be outdone, Jamie Garbash followed her sister's performance with three gold medals (100-yard butterfly and the 200- and 400-yard freestyle relay) and one silver (500-yard freestyle).

"This feels really good and I'm really happy," Jamie Garbash said. "I was expecting to get second

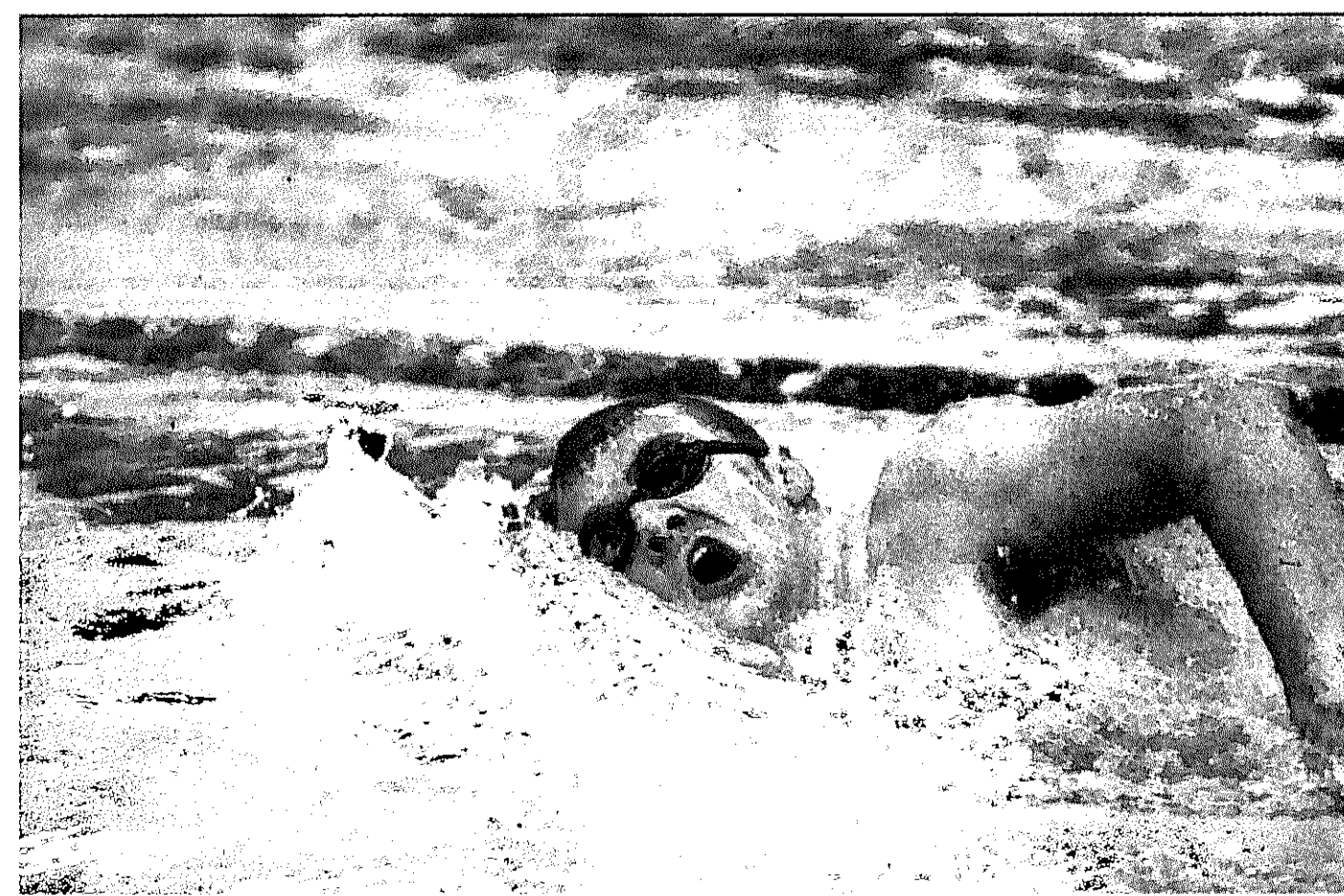

the 500 (yard freestyle), I wanted to in the fly (100-yard butterfly) but I wasn't expecting to so it kind of surprising."

Steele thinks the second place finish at OVAC's gives her team a lot of confidence heading into the sectional meet in two weeks.

"This gives us a lot of momentum heading into sectionals," she said. "With

two relays placing first going into sectionals, I think that bodes well for us going into sectionals."

On the big school girls side, Steubenville Big Red claimed the title 279-209 over Wheeling Park.

Martins Ferry's Elise Maguire finished third in the 50-yard freestyle while the Ferry 200-yard freestyle relay finished third.

On the boys side, Martins Ferry's Tyler Chesonis crushed the field in the 200-yard freestyle with a time of 1:54.36 and the 500-yard freestyle (third straight title) with a time of 5:01.43.

"This feels pretty good," Chesonis said. "I figured the 500-yard would be pretty bad due to the lead I had but the other guys swam really well."

Ryan Longenette placed second in the 100-yard breaststroke and the 200-yard Individual Medley for the Purple Riders.

"I'm very pleased with how the kids did today," Martins Ferry head coach Rhonda Wilson said. "They worked hard and it showed." Wilson said Chesonis continually amazes her.

"He's a one-of-a-kind swimmer," she smiled. "He works harder than any person

I know for swimming and he's very determined."

"He has a huge heart for swimming and he goes out there and does his best."

Wilson said she was pleased with her team's fifth place finishes.

"I'm very happy with where we finished," she said. "The girls did a good job today. I had one girl who was sick and didn't swim her individuals and that would've given us more points. But overall the girls worked hard and did a great job."

Barnesville's Danny Schwartz took home the gold medal in the 50-yard freestyle while leading the 200-yard freestyle team to a gold medal and a second-place finish in the 400-yard freestyle relay.

Wheeling Park piled up an impressive 331.5 points to claim the Big School boys title while Steubenville Central rang up 266 points to outdistance second place Barnesville.

The sectional meet will be held back at Steubenville High School in two weeks.

John's to shoot only 34.3 percent -- 36-of-105.

The 26-point margin of victory also was Pitt's largest in a series in which St. John's has dominated, winning 33 of 50, previous largest was 23 points, 77-54 in 2002.

Brown says Bengals must draft better

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Bengals, wracked by the arrests of several players over the last year, will look more closely at the backgrounds of the players they draft, team president Mike Brown said.

Brown told The Cincinnati Enquirer for a story published Thursday that the team would change its approach on draft day.

"There may be some gifted athletes we won't pick that we might have picked a year ago," Brown told the newspaper.

A Kenton County (Ky.) judge sentenced Bengals receiver Chris Henry on Thursday to two days in jail after he pleaded guilty to letting minors drink in a hotel room he rented last spring. He won a two-game suspension last season for violating the league's conduct and substance use policies, and could get a harsher punishment for his latest conviction.

Henry has become the sym-

bol of Cincinnati's extensive off-field problems — nine players arrested in the last nine months, two of them suspended by the league during the season. Henry had four arrests in the last 14 months.

He avoided jail time in the first three cases, but was taken to the Kenton County Jail after a judge accepted his guilty plea.

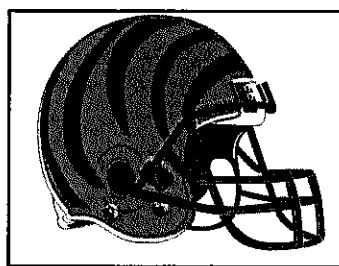
Henry's sentencing came three days after cornerback Johnathan Joseph, the team's No. 1 draft pick in 2006, was arrested in Boone County on a charge of marijuana possession.

District Judge Greg Grothaus told Henry, "You embarrassed a lot of people: teammates, friends and family, the city, the fans and myself."

Brown said Henry deserved to be scolded.

"It did not displease me that the judge did that. We're trying to do the same thing with Chris, to send a message to other players," Brown said.

Brown also said the league



and players union limit team discipline.

"There's only so much we can do in these situations," Brown said. "We can't act as forcefully as we did in the past. ... Our hands are tied. We can't fine, sanction or fire a player."

Lewis can discipline players if they show "conduct detrimental to club," as written in the league's collective bargaining agreement with the players union.

Teams can suspend a player up to four weeks but no longer, according to the agreement. A team or coach also can fine a player one week's salary. Henry had a base salary of \$310,000 in 2006, and each of his 17 weekly game checks was worth \$18,235.

Lewis disciplined starting tailback Rudi Johnson and linebacker Odell Thurman in separate games in 2005. Lewis made the players sit out the first series for breaking undisclosed team rules. Lewis repeated the punishment for Johnson this past season, not starting him in the San Diego game.

Thurman is serving a one-year suspension for a third violation of the substance-abuse policy.

Thurman and Henry are "broken records," Brown said.

"Everyone here is fed up with this, including Marvin and me, and we want it to stop," he said.

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference is set to crown its next set of individual and team champions for 2007 during Saturday's OVAC Swim Meet at Steubenville High School.

St. Clairsville head coach Sarah Steele said her kids are prepared for Saturday's meet.

"I think the kids are ready to go," she said. "They've been working hard all season and are looking forward to a good meet."

The Lady Red Devils are led by the Garbash sisters (Alison and Jamie).

"Alison is ranked number one in both the 50-yard and 100-yard freestyle while Jamie is in the top five in both the 200-yard and 500-yard free," she said.

Alison Garbash has a personal best time of 25.81 in the 50-yard freestyle and 57.17 in the 100-yard freestyle.

Sister Jamie is ranked third in the 100-yard butterfly with a time of 1:06.47 and second in the 500-yard freestyle event with a time of 5:55.04.

According to Steele, the Lady Red Devils are the favorites in two relay events.

"We have the second fastest time in the conference in the 200-yard freestyle (1:53.04) behind Wheeling Park and the fastest time in the conference in the 400-yard freestyle (4:11.23)," she said. "If we don't win those, then we should place high."

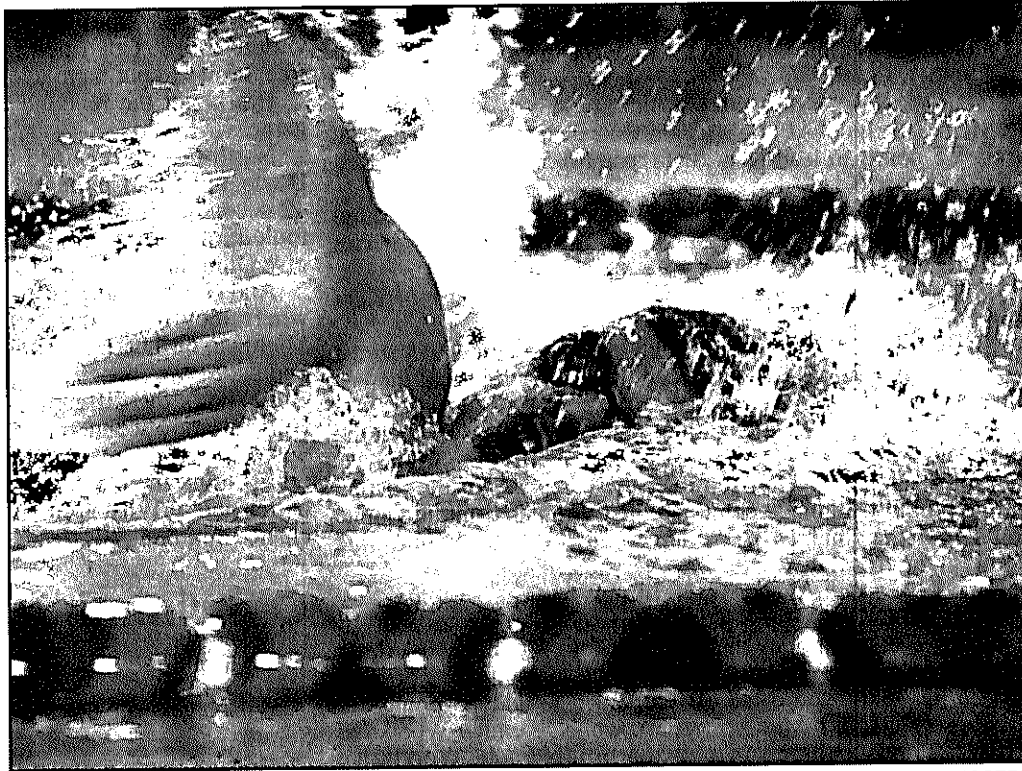
The Lady Red Devils relay teams are led by Jamie and Alison Garbash, Katie Oszeski and Sukhmani Sandhu.

Steubenville will be vying to defend both the Class AAAA boys' and girls' big-school championship title. The small schools, including all Class AAA, AA and A high schools, will be competing to take the boys'

and girls' titles away from defending champion Steubenville Catholic Central.

"We're going to give them a run for their money..." third-year Steubenville Catholic coach Judith Lucas said of her 30 girls and 17 boys. "They've seen success over the years. They know they're the defending champs and they want to continue it."

Rachel Williams, of Steubenville Catholic, will be returning to defend her individual 100M butterfly first-place title.

"Swimming is a lot more individualistic but one individual can't win the banner. You will the championship because of the team."

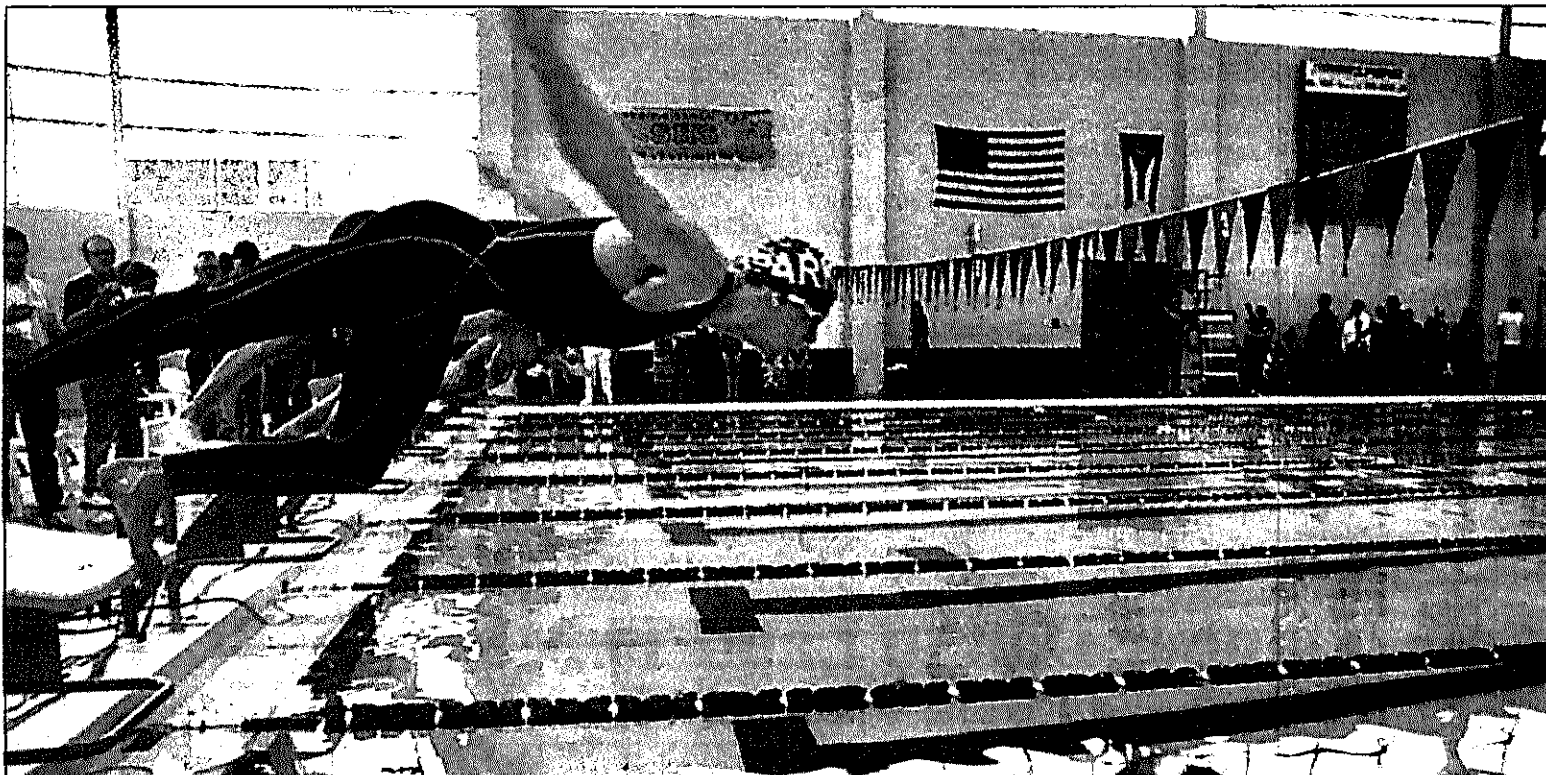
Bill Brubaker, OVAC swim meet director and Linsly's coach, noted another aspect of team unity becomes apparent in configuring relays.

"Different swimmers like different strokes and you have to work at times to get the kids to see what's in the team's best interest (when making relays)," Brubaker said.

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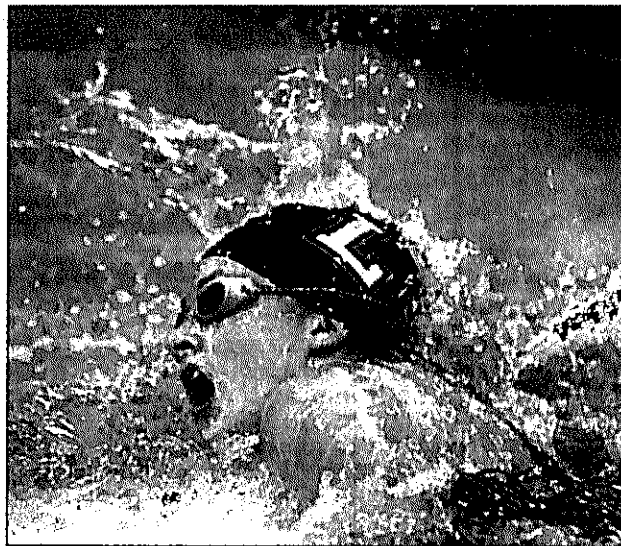

Park Boys win first title, while Steubenville girls nab ninth crown in 10 seasons

After years of domination in the pool, Steubenville finally met its match.

The Wheeling Park boys swim team captured its first OVAC Swimming Championship on Saturday, edging Big Red 331.5-254 for the Big School title at the OVAC Swimming Championships at Steubenville High School.

Wheeling Park got first place finishes from its 200 Medley Relay team of Tyler Jones, Evan Laird, Justin Kissinger, and Robert Jones, and the 400 free relay team of Tyler Jones, Robert Jones, Kissinger, and Brandon McKinley.

Tyler Jones captured individual honors in the 200 Individual Medley and 100 backstroke, and Robert Jones won first place in the 100 freestyle.

Steubenville Catholic won its second straight title among the small schools, defeating second-place Barnesville, 266-182.5.

Big Red might not have been able to win on the boys' side, but the girls walked away champions.

Winning for the ninth time in 10 seasons, Steubenville won the title despite having no one finish in first place.

Not to be outdone by the boys, the Steubenville Catholic girls also won, making it three in a row for the Crusaders.

The story of the tournament might belong to Alison and Jamie Garbash, the sister duo from St. Clairsville.

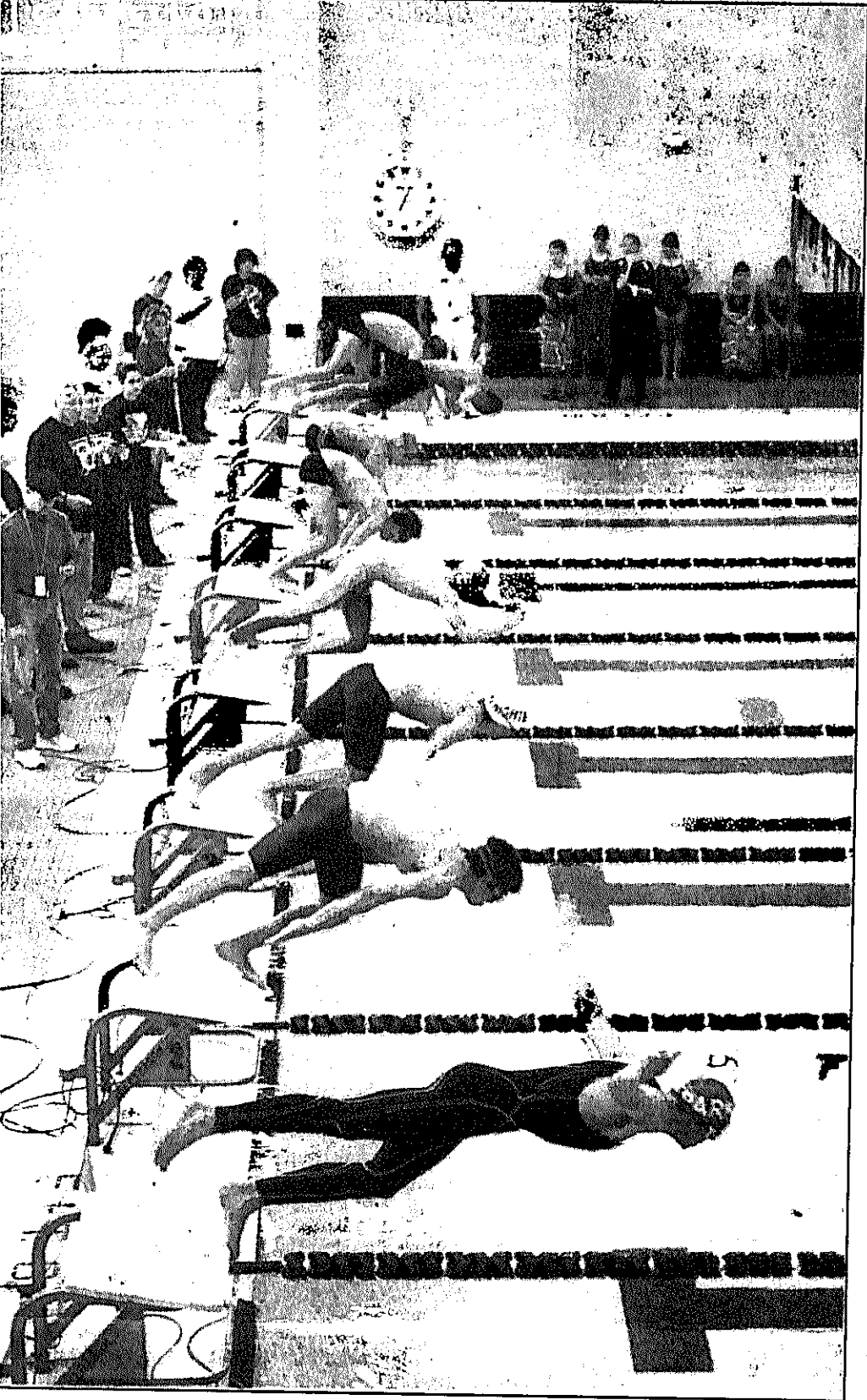

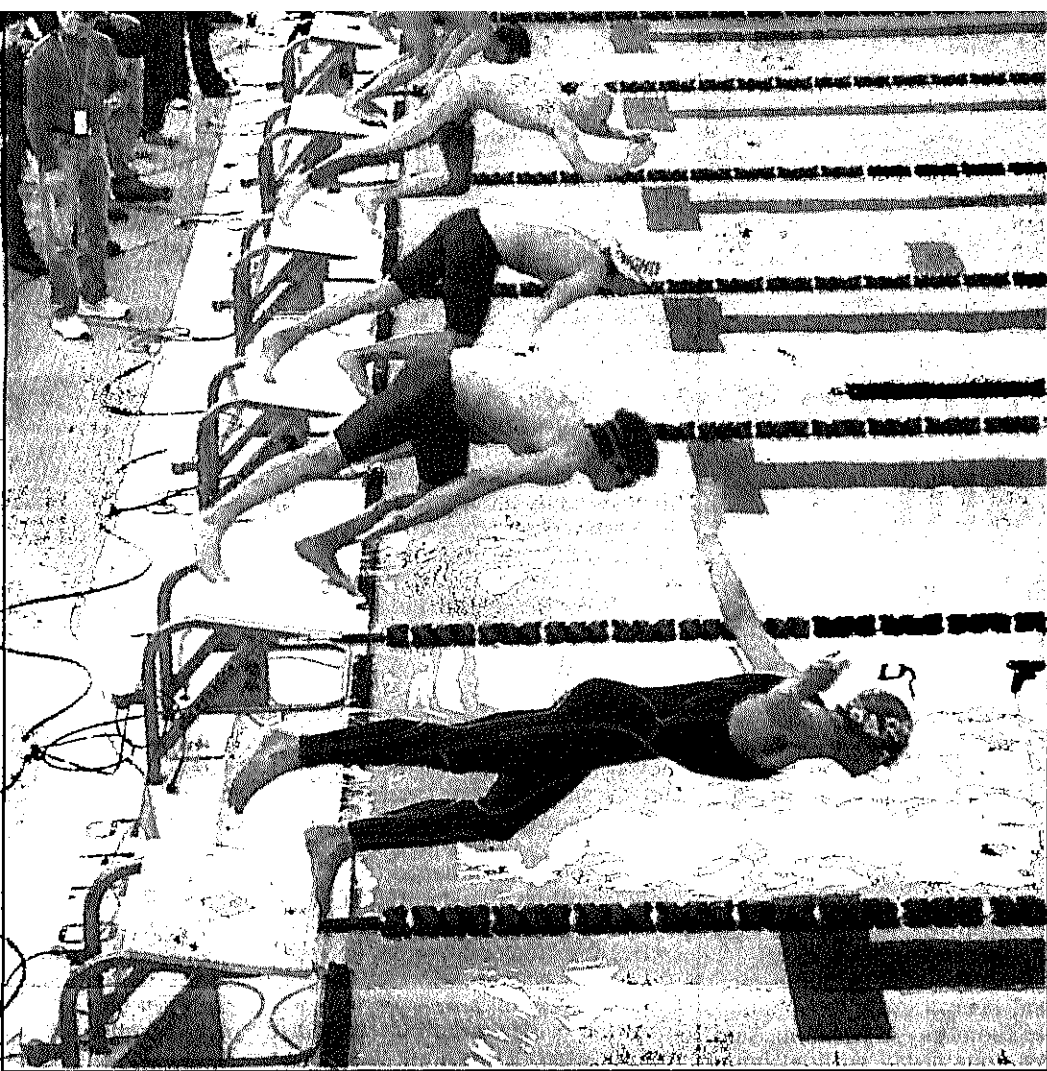

Wilson said she thinks two of her girls can make a splash on Saturday.

"Megan Berry was the first girl from Martins Ferry to make it to the state meet in the 100-yard freestyle," she said. "Freshman Katie Longenette is the top seed in the 200-yard intermediate medley, so I think it's going to be close."

Elise Maguire is ranked third in the big school division with a time of 59.22 in the 100-yard freestyle.

Katie Longenette's top time in the 200-yard intermediate is 2:30.15.

In the small school division, look for the Barnesville boys, led by Danny and Eric Schwartz to make an impact Saturday in the relay and individual events.

With Danny Schwartz ranked fifth in the boys 50-yard freestyle with a time of 24.36 and fifth in the 100-yard back stroke with a time of 1:08.68, while Eric Schwartz is ranked first in the boys 100-yard butterfly with a time of 1:01.78 and second in the boys 100-yard freestyle with a time of 52.53.

The Barnesville boys are ranked second behind Steubenville Big Red in the the 200-yard freestyle relay with a time of 1:42.19.

"It's getting them to realize that they can be just as successful doing a stroke they don't like."

These swimmers are used to sacrifices by the time OVACs roll around. With the exception of Brooke, Wheeling Park, Linsly, and Steubenville, team members have to transit to a neighboring city to practice, unlike other sports where practicing facilities are located within the high school.

Some OVAC participants swim up to 10,000 yards a practice and endure three-and-a-half hour sessions.

Barnesville's team, including Eric Schwartz who is back to repeat at both the individual 100M butterfly and 100M freestyle, is said to have recorded more than 1,300 miles commuting to practice and meets for the season.

Other defending champs who understand the discipline of swimming include Martins Ferry's Tyler Chesonis (200 Freestyle, 500 Freestyle) and Mount de Chantal's Rachael Moynihan (200 Freestyle and 100 Backstroke).

All other individual events will be open for a new swimmer to take home the first-place title.

Brooke, Cambridge, East Liverpool, Edison, John Marshall, Beaver Local, Steubenville, Weir, Wheeling Park and Zanesville will be competing for the OVAC Big School Title.

Competitive small schools consist of Bellaire, Bellaire St. John, Martins Ferry, Mount de Chantal, St. Clairsville, Steubenville Catholic Central, Linsly and Wheeling Central.

The top 16 places will be awarded points and the team with the highest total will earn the 2007 OVAC title.
