

Linsly, Park Sweep **OVAC Swim Meet**

Cadets girls win first conference crown

STEUBENVILLE — It was a historic day for the Linsly girls Saturday at the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Swimming Championships at the Steubenville High School Natatorium.
The Cadets captured a team championship for the first time, winning the

onship for the first time, winning the Small School division with 216 points.

Martins Ferry was second with 199.

The Cadets scored 305 points to cruise to the boys' title. Steubenville Catholic was second with 141 points.

Wheeling Park swept the Big School team competition. The Patriots girls beat newcomer Parkersburg South, 205-199.

The boys outdistanced rival John Marshall, 262-210.

"We had a very good day," Cadets coach Bill Brubaker said. "We have 47 on the swim team this year - 27 girls and 20 hour. It got a little grounded at practice. 20 boys. It got a little crowded at practice a few times, but, again, it was the ones who you didn't see swim (Saturday) who are just as important as the ones who did.

"They were pushing people to take spots and get places in the relays.

We have seven seniors to graduate. For all those who were sitting here watching, hopefully it made an impression so we'll get even more from them next year."

Linsly scored the most of the day of any school in either division. The Cadets girls also didn't have a swimmer finish first, second or third.

"We were worried at one point when Martins Ferry was up by 26. We began calculating what we had to do to win and just did it," Riel said.



The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference's championship was held Saturday at the natatorium inside Steubenville High School's Crimson Center and when the pool had cleared Martins Ferry's girls' team had tallied 211 team points and claimed the first title in school history.

The day did not begin on a positive note for the Purple Riders as their 200 IM relay team was disqualified from the event for an early

departure. Event seven turned the disappointment to gold as senior Elise Maguire broke the school record with a time of 25.80 seconds defending her title in the 50 yard freestyle.

It was the start of a huge day for both Maguire and the Purple gang as she repeated her feat from last season striking gold a total of four times while leading her team to the championship.

Maguire set another personal best time defending her 2009

crown by smoking through the 100 free in 56.96 seconds. Both those marks would be shattered as she would swim lighting laps as the anchor of the 200 and 400 yard relay teams. First making up a half-length of the pool deficit in the 200 with a time of 25.68 to out touch Wheeling Park's anchor 1:50.18 to 1:50.34.

In the 400 version Maguire once again stood atop the starting board and watched the Park swimmer Caitlin Jividen swim away four and one half seconds before the Purple Riders number three swimmer





The 2009 OVAC meet was underclass dominated. Relays obviously withstanding, 14 of the 16 individual races contested were captured by underclassmen.







"Jacob Robey's goal all year has been to get under a minute in the 100 fly. His 59.56 was incredible. It was a perfect day. On that last note, they set a school record with a time of 3:35.98, which blows away the old record by over a sec-

ond. It is just a perfect day."

John Marshall's second-place finish was led by Derek Artimez, who set a pool record in the 50-yard freestyle with a 22.93 finish. Artimez closed the day with three gold medals, including the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 51.23
