
weren't about to give up their gold easily.

After twice toppling Barnesville in regular season action, the Noble County netters prevailed once again Saturday for the OVAC 2-A Volleyball Championship at Steubenville High's Crimson Center.

The rivals split the first two finals' sets before Caldwell rolled in the deciding game.

St. Clairsville, meanwhile, did not fare well in its 3-A semifinal match against Tyler Consolidated. The Lady Red Devils were swept in two straight games, then suffered a similar fate against Buckeye Trail in Saturday's consolation match.

Rachel Antonelli nailed five kills and teammate Toni Jo Teramana tallied four for coach Kurt Vandeborne's Crusaders.


ST. CLAIRSVILLE never led in dropping a pair of close decisions to Tyler in a 3-A semi match.

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ball programs lock horns when second-seeded Indian Creek takes its 16-2 record up against third-seeded and defending champion Cambridge. The Lady Bobcats bring a 15-3 OVAC mark to the semis. The two teams faced each other once during the season with coach Rod Johnson's Lady Cats coming away the winner.

Johnson enjoyed considerable in his first coaching stint at Buckeye and is in his sixth year at Cambridge. For his career, he has 379 wins combined. Crystal Hammack is in her sixth year at the Indian Creek helm and has been nothing short of outstanding. In that brief time she has amassed a 97-35 coaching mark which is one of the best in the valley

during that span.

Jeff Beros is another one of those coaches that can produce winners every year regardless of how many returning players he has. In just 20 years at Buckeye Trail, Beros has surpassed the 400-win mark and owns a 402-89 career record. His 2010 Lady Warriors reeled off 17 straight wins and were unfazed by the jump to Class 3-A this year by gaining the top seed in 3-A. They will face fourth-seeded Edison, who making their third straight trip to the playoffs.

Edison, coached by third-year man Chuck Woodward, finished third last year and won the championship in 2008. Ironically, five of the Lady Wildcats six losses came at the hands of OVAC playoff qualifiers - twice to Indian Creek and single losses to East Liverpool, Beaver Local and Steubenville

Central.

While Trail and Edison square off in one 3-A semi-final at noon, second-seeded St. Clairsville and third-seeded Tyler Consolidated face off in the other semi. St. Clairsville, with Rebecca Hays as a coach and as a former player, has had its fair share of success. As a matter of fact, during the span from 2000 to 2008, the Lady Red Devils captured five OVAC titles including four straight from 2003 to 2006.

Hayes saw her Lady Devils continue that success this year posting a 13-5 OVAC record. St. C faced five different OVAC qualifiers during the season that accounted for four of their five losses. Tyler Consolidated, qualifying for the OVAC tourney for the first in years due to scheduling conflicts, have had great success under head coach Richard Summers. Tyler, along with Oak Glen and Magnolia, have been dominating the West Virginia state tournament over the past few years. Playing a scheduled mixed with OVAC and downstate opponents, Tyler has put together a 16-4 OVAC record and continued to win matches beyond the conference limit.

With Buckeye Trail leaving the 2-A ranks and moving up to Class 3-A, the race for the top spots in Class 2-A was wide-open. At different times during the season, as many as eight different teams were considered true contenders. In the end, it was a pair of 14-4 teams that held the top two seeds.

To some, top-seeded Caldwell may have been the surprise of the season, but the Lady Redskins were red-hot late in the season and were practically unbeatable winning 10 of their last 11 matches during the OVAC season. Coach Megan Stalder's team recorded wins over each of the other three 2-A qualifiers during the season. Her squad will be paired up with fourth-seeded Steubenville Central in one of the lid-lifter semi-finals at 9 a.m. Central, coach by Kurt Vandeborne, struggled in the first half of the season with a 4-4 mark before coming on strong in the last couple weeks.

In the other 2-A semi-final, a squad accustomed to winning OVAC titles is facing a team looking for its first. Troy Baker's Monroe Central team, the third-seed, enters the playoffs with four consecutive titles from 2005 to 2008. Coach Nikki McEndree's second-seeded Barnesville squad is hoping that 2010 brings the school its first OVAC

McEndree's Lady Shamrocks brought a 12-2 record into the month of October, stumbled a bit as the month started then got hot all over again. Two of Barnesville's win this season came over Class 1-A top-seed St. John Central, Monroe Central posted a 13-5 record with three of those losses coming at the hands of Cambridge, Buckeye Trail and Caldwell, all playoff qualifiers. In his 11th year, Baker is just a couple wins shy of his 200th career victory.

Some might say the best is being saved for last. Well, the day's finale will feature some very good and competitive matches with a strong Class 1-A field strong with

semi-finals at 6 p.m.

Top-seeded St. John Central, the defending champs in the class, are back with a new coach but the goal in mind. Veteran Ron Kelly, the owner of over 300 career wins and most recently the coach at Union Local, brings a very talent group into the 1-A mix after posting a 16-3 mark. Despite losing six to graduation, the Lady Irish managed to put together winning streaks of eight and seven matches during the season.

Interestingly, the Lady Irish faced only one of the other 1-A qualifiers during the season beating Paden City early. St. John Central will face Trinity Christian from Morgantown in the semi-final. Trinity is another team that came on strong winning nine of its last 11 matches for Coach

Jennifer Hefner.

In the second semi-final, second-seeded Paden City, coached by Fred King, brings a 15-5 OVAC record in its battle with thirdseeded Madonna, coach by first-year man Joe Edminston. King has over 150 with the Lady Wildcats and advanced his squad with just two returning seniors. This will be the first meeting of the year between these two teams. At one point during the season, Paden City reeled off 11 straight wins while Madonna notched wins in seven of its last eight.




