

Park seeks three-peat vs. JN

· Patriots, Monarchs meet for third time this season and third straight time in 4-A title game

Seeing Wheeling Park and John Marshall in the championship game of the Class 4-A Wheeling Hospital OVAC Boys Basketball Championship has become commonplace.

The Patriots winning the title has become a commonplace that John Marshall would finally like to end when the two meet for the third time this season Saturday morning at Ohio University Eastern in St. Clairsville.

We talk in the preseason and we set three goals," said highly-successful Patriots' head coach Michael Jebbia. "We want to advance to and win the state tournament and we want to win the OVAC Tournament."

This marks the third consecutive season the Patriots have been in the final, while the Monarchs have been a part of all four title games since the OVAC implemented this system. Unfortunately for the Monarchs, they're 0-3 in the title game. They lost to Indian Creek in the inaugural event.

"We're happy to be here," said JM head coach Bill Storm. "We don't like playing Wheeling Park three and four times, but we're legitimate members of the OVAC and we do what we're supposed to do and this comes with the ter-

The Patriots have had their way in the prior two meetings with Monarchs, winning by a margin Moundsville before JM closed the gap somewhat during the team's most recent meeting at the Palace on the Hill in Wheeling.



you win, you've got to play someone better and now we're playing the best," said Storm. "No one in the Ohio Valley has beaten us except for Wheeling Park, so we feel pretty good about ourselves, too. We know it's going to be a challenge."

Wheeling Park advanced to the final by virtue of a 80-67 victory over fourthseeded East Liverpool. while the Monarchs battled back from as many as seven down with just a few minutes to play at Indian Creek before pulling out a 46-41 victory

"I already told our kids that they're champions regardless of what happens Saturday because of the comeback they made (in the semifinals)." Storm said: "For us to be here is just a credit to the kids who refuse to lose.

The Monarchs, who are 13-6 on the season, seem to be playing their best basketball at the right time of the season. Along with the aforementiond victory at Creek, the Monarchs also knocked Class 3-A finalist St. Clairsville from the ranks of the unbeaten earlier this month.

"We've been pretty consistent all year." Storm said. "We've had a couple of letdowns at Fairmont and North Marion. This is the time of the year when you want to start playing well."

The Monarchs' recent surge hasn't gone unnoticed by Jebbia, who's got his team sitting at 17-2 after it knocked off South Charleston Wednesday evening.

"John Marshall is playing real good ball of late." Jebbia admitted. "I thought their semifinal would be close and I really thought. going in, JM was capable of winning that game.

Wheeling Park, meanwhile, hasn't lost a game to an OVAC opponent all season and, in all actuality, hasn't been challenged by a



"I don't know what you do with them," Storm said. "They're really good and really quick. If someone knows how to handle them, they need to tell someone."


In the first meeting, the Patriots seized early control in the first quarter, sprinting by the Monarchs with their quickness and agility.


"I tried to tell the kids how quick they were," Storm said. "I don't think they believed me because you've got to see it to believe it. In the second game, I don't think they played their best game."






The Beverly-based Cadets are involved in their second OVAC championship, having fallen to Wheeling Central in the 2009 2-A contest.





















Trinity Battling Foes on the Court, in the Court

Case involves use of ineligible player

WHEELING - Two months removed from the West Virginia Class AAA football playoff fias-co, another Ohio Valley Athletic Conference team finds itself battling in the court system. It should be known sometime today if a second conference school has joined the argument.

Beallsville, which was beaten ty status of one of its players, absolutely nothing and the SSAC ineligible player participating 89-39 by Morgantown Trinity in a semifinal Tuesday night, is considering filing an injunction to stop the Wheeling Hospital OVAC Class A boys' basketball championship between Weirton Madonna and the Warriors on Saturday at Ohio University Eastern. Trinity (19-1), the No. 1ranked small-school team in the state, was recently notified by the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission that it was being forced to forfeit each of those victories due to the eligibili-

point guard A.J. Mayle.

Following the lead of the Brooke and Martinsburg football programs, despite the state Supreme Court of Appeals ruling in that case that the SSAC had all authority concerning such issues,

the Trinity administration filed its own injunction with the Monongalia Circuit Court, allowing its team to compete Tuesday night. "We talked to our legal coun-

sel," OVAC Executive Secretary

Tom Rataiczak said Wednesday.

They said the appeal meant

decision would stand.

But if the injunction was given, we have no choice but to allow (the game) to be played."

According to Beallsville athletics director Delmas Moore, that might not be sufficient for his school. He noted that he didn't want to criticize another school, but that his administration is considering putting a halt to the

"Myself, and I am just speaking for me, that would have never happened here," he said of an

(An injunction is possible, but) I can't say it will or won't happen. That decision will be made after we get more advice.

'It's a Catch-22 for us. What

do we do? "Do we just take the loss and

go by the wayside? Rataiczak said he and his staff

were in discussion from the time the OVAC received the 19-page court document at approximately I p.m. on Tuesday.

Rataiczak said he then contacted Trinity athletics director Butch Varner to find out more, then informed him that without legal documentation the Warriors would be forced to forfeit and Beallsville would advance.

"The thing that's frustrat-

ing to me is, people said 'I knew this going into the sea-son, Rataiczak said. Why wait until Game 18 to say something?

'Have the courage to do it in Game 1 or 2.'

Beallsville is considering doing just that, but it may come down to a financial situation for a school that spent more than \$400, which included a team meal at TJ's Sports Garden and Restaurant and the bus trip, which roundtrip was roughly 5 hours, to travel to Morgantown for a game that arguably should never have been played.

If it's \$4,000 or \$5,000 "You'll never make that to fight it, then we don't have when sectionals begin." to fight it, then we don't have that," Moore said. "Whatevcriticized.

"I realize we went down there and got beat by a lot so some people are just going to say it's sour grapes. But I've got 15 kids I have to worry about.

Rataiczak said that if Trinity should win Saturday and subsequently be ruled ineligible, it would be stripped of a championship that would then be awarded to Madonna. He pointed to the conference taking a cross country crown away from Bellaire St. John last season as precedent.

"I don't understand where anyone comes from any-more," he said. "There's a lesson out there for athletic directors and principals in that, if that kid left your building for any reason, whether it's to get ice cream down the street or to go to another school, you better know where he's going.'

Rataiczak said he received the notification far too late to make any theoretical changes, noting that because Trinity plays a schedule that includes schools from all three classes in W.Va., that ti would have upset the pairings

for every OVAC division if the Warriors were forced to forfeit. He also said whatever final decision is rendered, it won't affect Trinity's standings with the OVAC

'Heavens no,' he said. If we had to throw out every single school that used an ineligible player, we could have a conference of 10.

This eligibility issue has surfaced at 50 different schools in all sports. The irony in it is, it doesn't affect the SSAC run.

That's true.

Even if the Warriors are forced to forfeit their victories, they will still participate in playoff action and would remain a prohibitive favorite to win the Class A title, even without Mayle who averages roughly 16 points a game.

For Moore and Beallsville. this whole issue comes down

to one thing.

"It's about what is ethical, and what is not," he said. 'We found out at 10 a.m. Tuesday and we've wrestled with it since.

The question is whether the team is ineligible or eligible, and does it forfeit?'

























Controversy surrounds 1-A **OVAC** Final

 Eligibility of a Trinity player in question; Beallsville weighing options for injunction

months removed from the schools - it's been \$1,800, West Virginia Class AAA \$1,600, even last year with football playoff fiasco. another Ohio Valley Athletic Conference team finds itself battling in the court system. It should be time to play it. Ohio's got known sometime today if a second conference school has joined the argument.

Beallsville, which was 89-39 by beaten Morgantown Trinity in a semifinal Tuesday night, is considering filing an injunction to stop the Wheeling Hospital OVAC Class A boys basketball championship between Weirton Madonna and the Warriors on Saturday at Ohio University Eastern. Trinity (19-1), the No. 1ranked small-school team in the state, was recently notified by the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission that it was being forced to forfeit each of those victories due to the eligibility status of one of its players, point guard A.J. Mayle.

Following the lead of the Brooke and Martinsburg football programs, despite the state Supreme Court of Appeals ruling in that case that the SSAC had all authority concerning such issues, the Trinity administration filed its own injunction with the Monongalia Circuit Court, allowing its team to compete Tuesday

night.
"We talked to our legal counsel. OVAC Executive Secretary Tom Rataiczak said Wednesday. "They said the appeal meant absolutely nothing

and the SSAC decision would stand.

But if the injunction

was given, we have no choice but to allow (the game) to be played.

According to Beallsville athletics director Delmas Moore, that might not be sufficient for his school. He noted that he didn't want to criticize another school, but that his administration is considering putting a halt to the game.

Myself, and I am just speaking for me, that would have never happened here," he said of an ineligible player participating. "(An injunction is possible, but) I can't say it will or won't happen. That decision will be made after we get more advice.

"It's a Catch-22 for us. What do we do?

'Do we just take the loss and go by the wayside?"

Rataiczak said he and his staff were in discussion from the time the OVAC received the 19-page court document at approximately 1 p.m. on Tuesday.

Rataiczak said he then contacted Trinity athletics director Butch Varner to find out more, then informed him that without legal documentation the Warriors would be forced to forfeit and Beallsville would advance.

"This tournament is to the point where all the monies that are made, is WHEELING - Two divided equally to the the weather each school received \$1,200.

> "If you take one game away: 1) you have to find a sectionals starting next week, and then you have to have an agreeable time. Then we can't get the OUE venue because they've got sectionals going on out

> You have to pay for extra workers, officials, rents and everything else.

> 'Take a little school like Fort Frye who is minding its business and doing the right thing, and suddenly this \$1,800 is now \$900.

> "You'll never make that up when sectionals begin.'

> The situation centers on Mayle's eligibility as a transfer student. He attended Cheat Lake Middle School, a feeder school for University High, as an eighth grader and transferred to Trinity where he played two seasons. However, he then transferred to the Kiski School in Pennsylvania before reenrolling this season at Trinity.

"The thing that's frustrating to me is, people said I knew this going into the season," Rataiczak said. "Why wait until Game 18

to say something?
"Have the courage to do it in Game 1 or 2.

Beallsville is considering doing just that, but it may come down to a financial situation for a school that spent more than \$400, which included a team meal and the bus trip, which roundtrip was roughly 5 hours, to travel to Morgantown for a game that arguably should never have been played.
'If it's \$4,000 or

\$5,000 to fight it, then we don't have that," Moore said. "Whatever we do, we're going to get criti-

cized.

"I realize we went down there and got beat by a lot so some people are just going to say it's sour grapes.

"But I've got 15 kids I have to worry about.

Rataiczak said that if Trinity should win Saturday and subsequently be ruled ineligible, it would be stripped of a championship that would then be awarded to Madonna.

He pointed to the OHSAA taking a cross country crown away from St. John last season as precedent.








