The first Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Champions for the 2011-12 school year will be crowned this week.

Along with the first champions, when the golf tournament unfolds at ly root for each other." Oglebay Park, beginning Tuesday, the conference will also crown its first champions in the 5-class sys-

All five classes will compete separately, meaning five golf champions will be crowned since the minimum number of schools was met for each

On Tuesday, the 1A and 2A schools will play at Crispin Golf Center, while the 4A schools will compete at Speidel's Jones Course. The 18hole, stroke-play tournament will

A new champion is assured in both 3A and 4A. St. Clairsville is the reigning champion in 3A, but the Red Devils now compete in 4A under the system, while Wheeling Park will seek to become the first 5A champion after winning the last three 4A titles.

St. Clairsville enters this week's 4A tournament as a heavy favorite.
The Red Devils, who won the Buckeye 8 title convincingly on Friday, return all five of their starters from last second heavy. rs from last season and have shown steady improvement.






