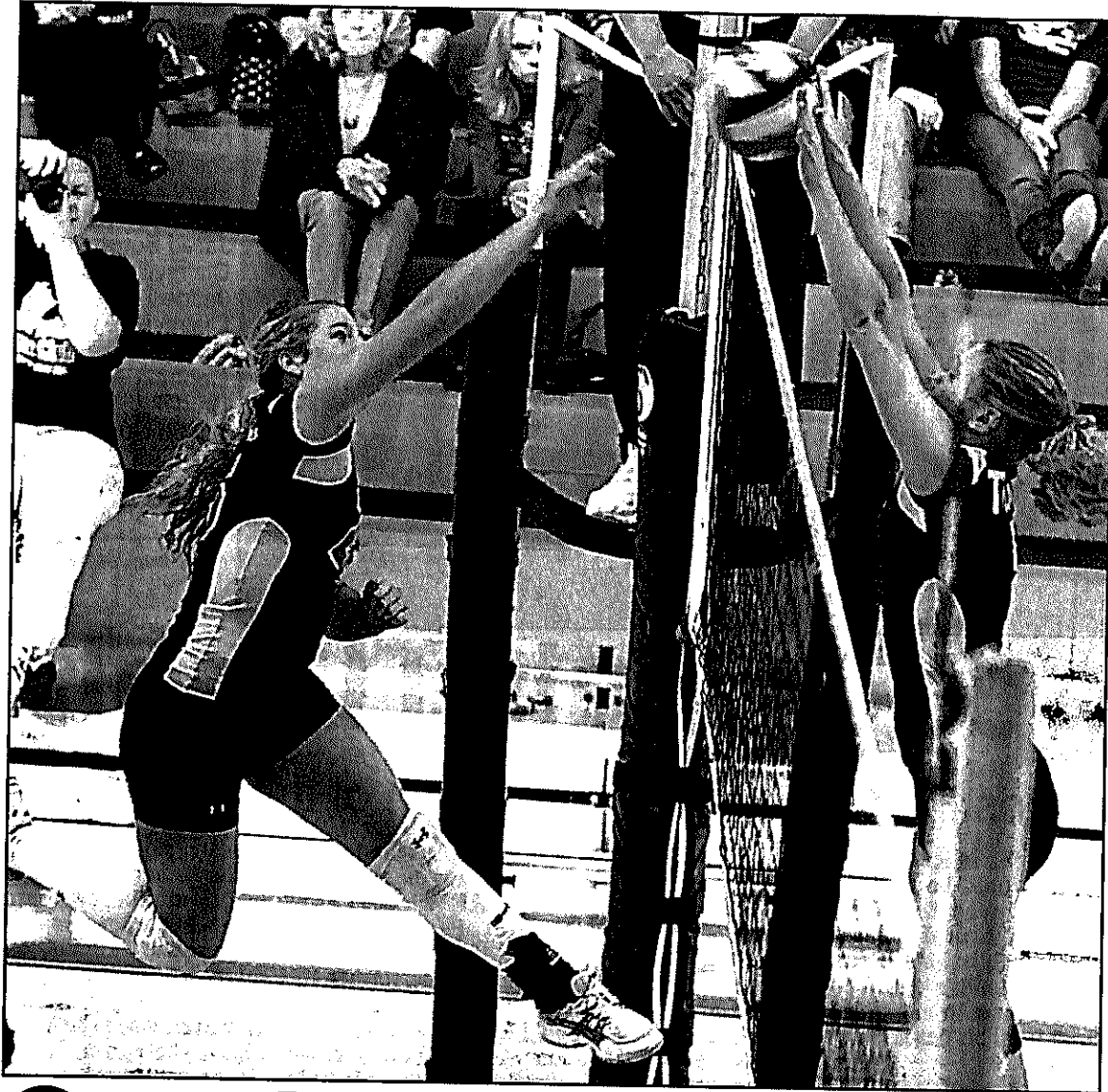

Seminoles spike Trail

• Monroe Central wins Class 3A championship; Now 18-2

STEUBENVILLE — Monroe Central captured the OVAC 3A Volleyball championship Saturday after noon in Steubenville surviving a three-set battle with Buckeye Trail, 15-25, 25-16 and 25-21.

The Seminoles improve their season mark to 18-2, 7-2 with the hard fought win over a fellow Pioneer Valley Conference (PVC) foe. Troy Baker, The 'Noles head coach knew it would not be

an easy title to win as the two blemishes on his season record came from 3-A OVAC opponents Shenandoah and Buckeye Trail, "We are very proud to have three PVC teams here," Baker said. "It has been a very competitive league with quality teams and I think that makes us all better."

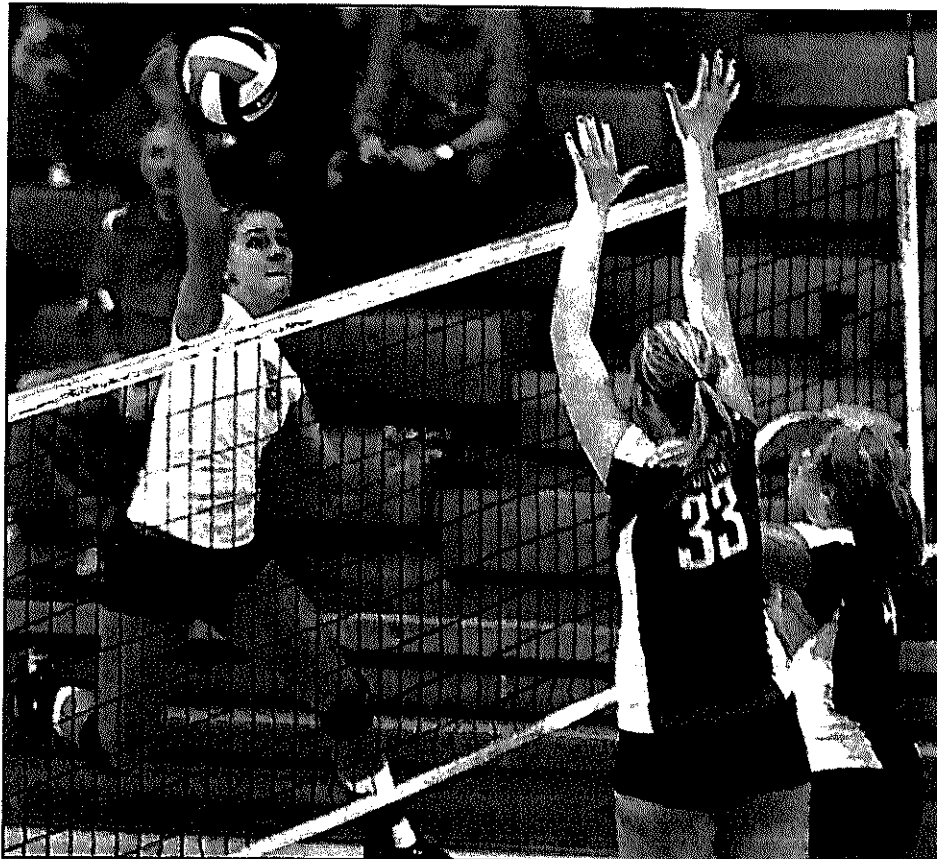
Buckeye Trail coach Jeff Beros also knew that earning the OVAC title in 3-A was going to be a tough assignment, "Our first match this morning was against Shenandoah and they are a quality team," the Warriors coach said. "We had

to work extremely hard to beat Shenandoah."

"I can't explain why, but we just did not come out with the same intensity and enthusiasm that we did in the first game against Shenandoah," a disappointed Beros said. "We know that Monroe Central can catch fire at any time, I feel we squandered the opportunity today to win the OVAC."

"We came out and won the first set pretty easily and I feel we just needed to play hard for another half hour," Beros

added. "At this point in the season you can not give up a 6 or 7 point lead and expect to be able to get those points back."

The Seminoles, after trailing through a majority of the first set, came back in the second and took a 7-6 lead. That was the spark that caused Monroe Central to ignite and from that point on momentum was on the side of the top seeded Seminoles.

"We knew coming in that it would be the team that makes the most plays in the game that would win," said Troy Baker. "In the season, it was just a couple of points either way determining the winner between these three teams."

Leading the way at the net for the Warriors in the championship match was LeeAnna Sichina with 15 kills, one block and 10 digs while Samantha Schaeffer added 12 deadly spikes, blocked 4 adding an identical 10 spot in the dig column. Lynsey Beros helped the cause with 33 assists, 6 digs and 10 points. Kelsey Beros posted 9 digs, 4 kills and one assist. Allison Sichina was credited with 9 digs, 4 kills and one block for Buckeye Trail as they head into sectionals with a respectable 18-4 season mark.

Chelsie Roberts would pace Monroe

Central with 11 kills, 11 digs 3 blocks and 3 assists. Kate Fickell added 10 kills, 6 digs with 3 blocks and 3 assists while Kayley Stephens also had 10 deadly spikes, 3 blocks, 2 digs and one assist. Asia Prickett aided the cause with 19 assists, Chelsie Tewanger had a team high 18 digs, 2 assists and one kill. Demitra Habig dug up 16, notched 7 deadly spikes with 2 blocks and one assist for the Seminoles.

The Warriors have another potential confrontation with the Seminoles or the Zeps in the sectional brackets. Buckeye Trail will begin their sectional play on Tuesday at Meadowbrook against Bellaire and if they win out they will face the winner from the lower bracket where Monroe Central will begin their play with Martins Ferry across their bottom frame in Division III from Shenandoah beginning their post-season play with St. Clairsville.

The Red Devils were in the 4-A OVAC championships falling in the opening round to East Liverpool 15-25, 11-25 and in the Consolation to Oak Glen 17-25, 19-25.

Freshmen complete
four-year journey

WELLSBURG — When Kurt Vandeborne took over the volleyball program at Steubenville Catholic Central four years ago, the freshmen at the time set a goal of winning an Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championship.

That test came Saturday at Brooke High School and the Crusaders passed and left with the first OVAC Class AA volleyball title at the school since 1992 with a 25-18, 25-27, 25-11 victory against Frontier.

"It was a total team effort," Vandeborne said. "The girls on the bench kept focused on the girls on the court. They gave them support, even when we were down.

Wildcats Claim Class A Title

Paden City sweeps
Madonna in finals

WELLSBURG — Championships aren't achieved by merely having great players.

There's no question it helps. But other factors, such as parental involvement and good coaching, also come into play.

Everything came together for Paden City on Saturday as the Wildcats earned their first OVAC Class A championship in six years by sweeping Weirton Madonna, 25-14, 25-18, at Brooke High School in the only title match featuring two West Vir-

ginia squads.

After coming up short in the tournament the past few seasons, Paden City coach Fred King was happy to see his girls get over the hump and bring home the school's first crown since 2005, and sixth overall.

"They're a super bunch of fine young ladies," said King, also the school's athletics director. "If you were watching their intensity and the hustle and the togetherness ... this team is not good by itself. It's only good because of the players.

"I guess we have the right combination."

While Paden City is an established program, the Blue Dons are program on the rise.

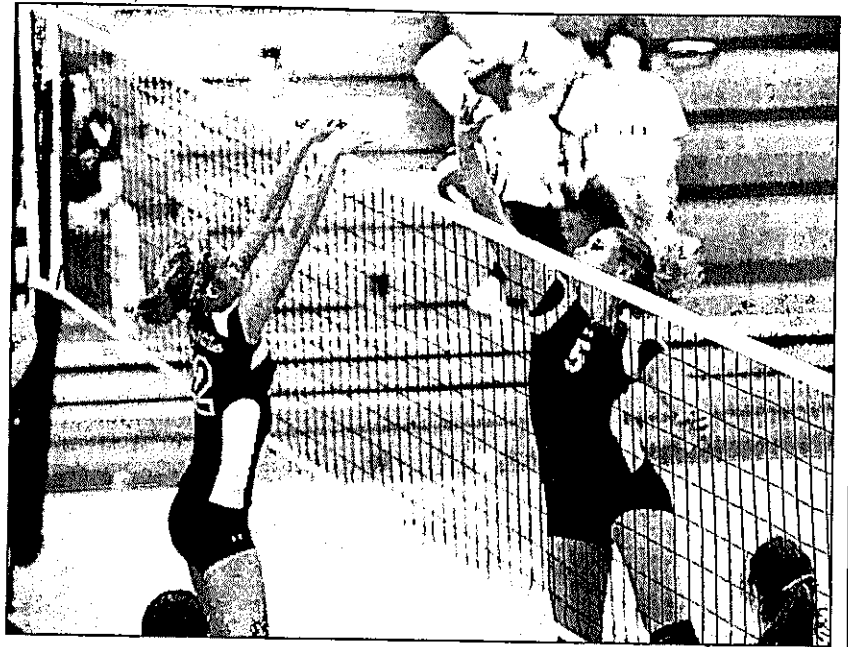

OVAC to crown more champs

• Volleyball tournament to be held at Brooke and Steubenville

Volleyball in the Ohio Valley will hit its high point on Saturday. That's when 20 schools in the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference will be sending teams to two different sites for a chance to be crowned an OVAC champion.

This year's annual OVAC Volleyball Championships will take on a new look. The first big change came about with the expansion of the conference into five classes.

Another major change is that this year's event will be played at the aforementioned two different sites. The conference has held the volleyball playoffs at only one site since the two-state tournament started in 1995. Prior to '95, champs were crowned in both states.

This year, the conference is using two venues. Steubenville High School, the site of the past two finals, will again be

used. Brooke High School has been added to the list of sites for this year's event.

Conference officials have chosen to divide the venues by class. Brooke will host the Class 1-A and 2-A semifinals and finals. Steubenville will play host to the Class 3-A, 4-A and 5-A finals.

Play at Brooke will begin at 10 a.m. with the smallest schools. On Court #1, top-seeded Paden City will take on fourth-seeded Trinity Christian while on Court #2, second-seeded

Madonna will battle third-seeded St. John Central.

Paden City comes in with a 17-3 conference record. Coach Fred King's Lady Wildcats won their final 13 matches before the cutoff to seal the top spot. In the conference, Madonna finished with a 13-3 record, St. John Central posted a 13-6 mark and Trinity was 14-6.

Starting at 1 p.m. on Court #1 at Brooke, top-seeded Steubenville Central

will take on fourth-seeded Caldwell in one of the semifinals. In the other semi, second-seeded Frontier will take on third-seeded Wheeling Central on Court #2. In both classes, the finals will be contested immediately following the semis on Court #1 and the consolation finals on Court #2.

Action will be plentiful at the Crimson Center in Steubenville with all classes primed for some tight and exciting matches.

At 10 a.m., actions gets started with top-seeded and once-beaten Monroe Central battling fourth-seeded Tyler Consolidated a semi-final match on Court #1. The other Class 3-A semifinal will have second-seeded Shenandoah taking to the court against third-seeded Buckeye Trail.

Coach Troy Baker's Monroe Central netters finished the OVAC season with a 16-1 record while Shenandoah reeled off 10 straight wins before posting a 15-3 mark at the cut-off. Trail had a 14-3 conference mark. Tyler held a 13-6 confer-

ence mark at the cut-off.

Fourth-seeded St. Clairsville is the real surprise of the tournament. After starting the season with a 3-5 mark, the Lady Devils caught fire and posted an 11-8 record to grab the final spot in Class 4A. The Lady Devils will battle top-seeded and once-beaten East Liverpool in one of the semi-finals on Court #1 at 1 p.m. in Steubenville. Second-seeded Oak Glen and third-seeded Meadowbrook will go toe-to-toe in the other semi on Court #2.

Bob Shansky's Lady Potters are one of the top teams in the state and will bring in a 16-1 conference record. Their lone loss was to state-ranked Salem. Oak Glen had a 14-6 record at the cut-off and Meadowbrook was impressive with a 14-4 count.

Rounding out action at Steubenville will be the Class 5-A action starting at 4 p.m. Top-seeded Indian Creek will face fourth-seeded Morgantown in the Court #1 semi-final while second-seeded Parkersburg South takes on third-seeded Cambridge on Court #2 in the other semi-final.

Like at Brooke, the championship finals will be contested on Court #1 immediately following the semi-finals. The consolation finals will be played at the same time on Court #2.

Doors open at both location at 8:30 a.m. Tickets are good for all matches. Those planning to be at both venues are reminded to receive wristband before leaving.
