


WHEELING - Golf can be a funny game sometimes.





WHEELING - Madonna's Nick Mazur, a No. 4 player for most of the season, grabbed the attention of Coach T.J. Brancazio by shooting a 75 during a recent practice round at Oglebay's Crispin Course as the team warmed up for Tuesday's OVAC Class 1A and 2A Championships.

Brancazio then showed a little faith in Mazur by moving him up to the No. 2 spot for the tournament. And Mazur rewarded Brancazio by shooting 72 and winning medalist honors as the Blue Dons ran away with the Class 1A title with a team total of 297, 49 shots ahead of second-place Connotton Valley (346).

It was the Blue Dons' fourth straight OVAC crown and fifth in school history.




