OVAC girls hoop tourney pairings set

The cut-off date has come and gone. The brackets for the fifth annual Wheeling Hospital OVAC Basketball Championship are officially set.

The basketball committee met Tuesday morning at the OVAC headquarters to finalize the pairings and establish the consolation pairings, which are comprised of the teams that didn't finish in the top four

of their respective class.

The tournament opens on Monday with 5A (5:30 p.m.) and Class 1A (8 p.m.). the higher seeds hosting semifinal games. The championship games are slated for Saturday, Feb. 9 at Ohio University Eastern in St. Clairsville. The losers of Monday's contests will play on Thursday in the consolation rounds.

The schedule for Saturday's finals are as follows: Class 2A (10 a.m.), Class third time. River is 15-5 on the season and

Seven area teams played their way into the championship bracket and of those four will host semifinal contests.

River earned the top seed in the 3A field, which is comprised completely of Pioneer Valley Conference foes. The Lady

Pilots will meet Shenandoah for the

3A (12:30 p.m.), Class 4A (3 p.m.); Class narrowly edged out Fort Frye for the top seed. The Lady Pilots and Zeps split their two meetings, each winning on the other's home floor.

'We're very happy to be the top seed and excited to play at home," said River head coach Rick Isaly. "This was one of our kids' goals before the season. Now, we can focus on taking the next step.'

The other half of the 3A bracket finds

Wheeling Central (15-2) earned the top seed. The Lady Maroon Knights are the defending class champions and are starting to get key pieces back from injuries. Central will welcome fourth-seeded Clay-Battelle (13-1) on Monday.

The other half of the bracket is one of the most intriguing matchups of the entire tournament. Secondseeded Bridgeport has ran roughshod through its

The Lady Tigers battled their way through arguably the area's toughest schedule, posting a 13-7 record. Shadyside was in the title game last year, but fell to

The 4A field is assured a new champion because Edison failed to qualify for the top four this season. Steubenville, which has had a roller coaster month of January, pocketed the top seed with a 13-5 record. The Lady Big Red will host fourth-seeded Oak Glen, which is

8-7 for the season. On the other side of the bracket, defending runnerup Union Local is seeking another trip to OUE. It'll meet third-seeded Martins Ferry with tipoff slated for 7 p.m. The Lady Jets, who won the 2011 title, are 13-6, while

the Lady Riders are 11-8 on the season.

In Class 1A, Conotton Valley earned the top seed. The Lady Rockets posted an 11-5 record and will host Morgantown Trinity, which is the defending champion. Trinity, which is facing more than a 120-mile trip to Bowerstown, is 10-7 on the season.

The other half of the small-school bracket pits secondseeded St. John (14-6) against third-seeded Madonna (9-10). These two met for the title in 2011 with the Lady Blue Dons prevailed, 47-41.

Snow Plays Havoc With OVAC Girls

Game officials biggest hurdle in rescheduling

A snow storm wiped out Monday's entire slate of Wheeling Hospital OVAC Girls' Basketball Tournament

The plan, for the moment, is for three of the quarterfinal games to be played today and the remaining seven Wednesday, according to tournament

director Rick DeLuca.

The consolation games are in flux, as today also marks the cutoff date for next week's boys' tournament, meaning a full night of boys' games have already been scheduled.

"It's not so much the games," DeLuca said, "but there's only so many officials.

"You have those 10 more games, and you throw those on 20 more boys' games and you're going to start running into problems.

Many Ohio Valley officials work both boys' and girls' games, so supply could fall short of demand.

DeLuca said some schools were looking at the possibility of playing the girls' games in front of the boys' games and canceling the scheduled jayvee games.

At this point, all avenues are being iscussed

With more snowfall in the forecast, there's a possibility this problem could persist. Not to fear though, the OVAC is the type of organization that has contingency plans for its contin-

gency plans.

Hospital Basketball Championship begins this b evening with championship semifinals slat-ed for all over the Ohio Valley with the winners earning a trip to Saturday's title games at Ohio University Eastern in St. Clairsville.

Let's take a closer look at the classes: In Class 1A, Bishop Donahue and Conotton Valley earned the top two seeds. Beallsville squeezed into the field in the last week, but the Blue Devils, who are led by talented senior Teryn Jarrett, could very well be an extremely tough out for the Bishops.

The Rockets have been close the last few years, and I believe they'll take the next step and follow the path of their girls and get to the OVAC final. Conotton Valley boasts the best player in the class and one of the best in the entire conference in Brandon

Bailey. Keep an eye on him.
In Class 2A, Steubenville Central and Clay-Battelle are the two teams hosting this evening. Steubenville Central has been around the top of the standings all season. Coach Sean Tucker is one of the best young coaches in the area. He's got a Crusaders' team that's still fairly young and getting better each game out. They'll host Cameron, which squeezed past Shadyside for the fourth seed.

Wheeling Central, who is really turning it on at the right time, has gotten hot and bol-stered itself up to the third seed. It'll trek to Blacksville to meet a CeeBees' squad, which handled Magnolia earlier this season, so it's obviously no slouch. This game has a chance to be one of the best of the semifinal round.

The Class 3A field is loaded. The same four teams have been battling for positioning basically the entire season and it's refreshing to see the actual 'best' four teams in the field.

It's a hard class to get a handle on, too.

Taking a closer look at that field consider this: River beat Magnolia twice, split with Buckeye Trail and lost decisively in its lone meeting with Monroe Central.

Monroe Central just beat Buckeye Trail convincingly last Saturday and has lost twice to Magnolia, while the Blue Eagles and Warriors, who own a win against a talented Cambridge squad, don't play.

Again, that classification is wide open. It's been the most balanced all season and 12:30 p.m. Saturday could be very interest-

The Class 4A field is balanced in the 2-4 slots. However, St. Clairsville is a clear-cut favorite. It owns a 4-0 record against the other three teams, including a blow-out victory against Martins Ferry last month.

As we've written in weeks' past, 5A is another grouping that's tough to get a handle on. Prior to the season and for much of the first two months, I would have no trouble saying Morgantown was the team to beat. But, when you take the best players, including WVU recruit Nathan Adrian out of the lineup, things get a little more interesting quickly.

If it wasn't for the lengthy trip from Wintersville to Parkersburg South, I'd have little trouble saying I wouldn't be shocked if the Redskins show up in the title game once again. The battle of Morgantown, on the other side of the bracket, could also go either way.

I am not in the business of making pre-

dictions, so I am going to hold off.

However, I will predict that there will be some quality teams and matchups at OUE on Saturday, which creates big-time crowds and atmosphere.

For a while it appeared that the Cee Bees were going to give the hosts all they could handle.













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

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




CLAIRSVILLE'S Michael Eaton swims in the 100yard freestyle Saturday in Steubenville.














