Softball tournament resumes today.

WHEELING - The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference has announced its pairings for its 2013 baseball tournament. All games will be played Saturday, April 27, however, times have not yet been released.

In Class 5A, No. 4-seeded Cambridge will have to start its mission. for back-to-back pennants at Wheeling Park as it faces the No. 1-seeded Patriots, while Buckeye 8 rivals Indian Creek and Edison will duke it out on the Wildcat's home diamond in the other semifinal.

A new 4A champion will emerge as No. 4 Martins Ferry heads to Harrison Central to take on the top ranked Huskies. No. 2 Steubenville will host No. 3 Buckeye Local for the right to advance to the champi-

onship game.

Linsly will also be looking for a second straight title as the Cadets captured the 2A banner a year ago before making the move to 3A. The No. 2-seeded Cadets will host No. 3 Fort Frye in the semifinals, while No. 4 Shenandoah will travel to take on top seeded Magnolia.

WHEELING - The Cardiac Crusaders have done it

Trailing 6-2 after four innings during Saturday's OVAC Class 2A Championship against Wheeling Central on Lisa's Field, and needing two to tie heading into the bottom of the seventh, Steubenville Catholic received some help in the form of two errors and went on to score three times for an 8-7 victory.

Micca Mirabella's bunt was overthrown to second and the ball rolled all the way to the center-field wall, allowing both Tori Knight and Mirabella to score and tie the game at 7-7 with two outs. Sammi Giannamore followed with a double and scored the winner as Maddy Gulan laced an 0-2 pitch into center, setting off a wild celebration at home plate.

It's the second consecutive come-from-behind victory in tournament play for the Crusaders (16-3), and this one denied the Maroon Knights (16-8), the No. 1-ranked Class A team in West Virginia, their third straight OVAC

"We haven't lost a close game all year long," Steubenville Catholic coach Jim DiCarlo said. "The three games we lost were not close and we've won about five or six really close games.

Classmates Kristin Lewicki (two doubles, RBI), Kylie Howard (double, triple, RBI) and Morgan Watson (two singles) brought the big sticks, while junior center fielder Sissy George ripped a pair of deep doubles and drove in a pair to lead a 10-hit attack.

ELM GROVE — Bellaire hadn't been to the OVAC Softball Tournament since winning the title in 2003, Melissa Lahna's first year as head coach.



With one out and the score deadlocked at five in the bottom of the eighth, Dallas Messenger laid down a perfect bunt that she legged out for a single. After she stole second, Megan Ging ripped an 0-1 pitch to left. Lahna wasn't hesitating in sending the speedy Messenger as her left arm looked like a windmill on a windy day. Messenger rounded third and headed for the plate, but the throw never came. Instead, for some unexplainable reason, the leftfielder came un firing to second hase as

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
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

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
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Shadyside blanked in Class A

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







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


