



Steubenville CC denies Bellaire in Class 3A, 8-0

ELM GROVE — For the second straight season, the Bellaire softball team reached the OVAC Class 3A title game.

However, it also came up short of its goal once again.

Top-seeded Steubenville Catholic Central scored four runs in the bottom of the first and never looked back en route to an 8-0 victory on Lisa's Field during at the OVAC Tom Bechtel Softball Championship Saturday morning.

While the Crusaders, who now own six conference titles, got seemingly big hit after big hit, Bellaire just couldn't get untracked at the plate against sophomore hurler Alex McComb.

Those runs were more than enough for McComb, who finished the completegame gem with seven strikeouts and nary a walk.






