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

ST. CLAIRSVILLE — Conotton Valley's senior class has enjoyed a pretty good run in the Wheeling Hospital Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Girls' Basketball Championships. Over the course of the past three seasons, the Rockets are a perfect 5-0 in playoff games, including back-to-back Class 1A titles.

Come Saturday afternoon at 3 inside Ohio University Eastern's Health and Physical Education Building, third-year head coach Chandra Myers' squad will be seeking a 'three-peat' when it faces top-seeded Madonna (12-5), which it defeated in last year's championship game. The Rockets (17-3) advanced with a thrilling, 52-50, nod over No. 2 seed St. John Central, while the Blue Dons eliminated




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

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Bridgeport, Central to vie in Class 2A

ST. CLAIRSVILLE -A pair of state-ranked teams will do battle for the Wheeling Hospital Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 2A championship Saturday afternoon inside Ohio University Eastern's Physical Health and Education Building.

Top-seeded Bridgeport (20-1) and No. 2 Wheeling Central (14-2) will tip-off at approximately 5:30 p.m. in the fourth of five games. The Bulldogs are ranked seventh in the latest Ohio Division IV poll, while the Maroon Knights top the W.Va. Class A list.

The matchup is a repeat encounter from last winter's OVAC semifinal contest in which Bridgeport prevailed, 50-43, in comeback fashion. However, the Bulldogs fell to Frontier in the finals.


"There aren't too many secrets between the two teams," Bridgeport head coach Rob Zitzelsberger day in practice. We pride

said. "We've got one AAU player and they've got two AAU players.'

The Bulldogs' head coach was referring to his standout Caitlyn Kroll. The 5-10 junior dandy leads the Ohio Valley at 28 points a game. She is also an outstanding rebounder with 7.9 per outing. In addition, she averages 4.5 steals and hands out 3.2 assists per

Her versatility showed in last Monday's 42-31 semifinal victory over fourthseeded Clay-Battelle. She scored 14 points, grabbed 11 rebounds, charted halfa-dozen steals and handed out five assists, four of which came in the fourth quarter when the hosts went into a 4-corner delay game. She is also deadly from the free throw stripe where she connects on 88 percent of her attempts.

Caitlyn is a great player," Wheeling Central head coach Penn Kurtz assessed. "We work on defense every

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"Baker is the engine that makes them go, just like Kroll for us," is Zitzelsberger noted. "We'll have to try and slow her down, but it won't be easy.'

According to Kurtz, Baker is more than just a scorer for his team.

'Lindsey not only leads us in scoring, but she is also our assists leader," he said of his point guard. "She has really worked hard on her game."

Role players could play a huge part in the outcome.

In addition to Kroll, the Bulldogs also start 5-8 senior Briana Massey; 5-6 junior Courtney Trouten; 5-5 junior Justine Schell and 5sophomore Deja Massey. The older Massey scores nine points a game and grabs six rebounds, while her younger sister

averages five points and six boards. Deja Massey tied her career-high of 14 points in the victory over the Cee-Bees.


"It's no secret that Kroll is our go-to player," Zitzelsberger added. "But we've got to have other girls step up and play well. Deja did that the other

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

"They're fundamentally sound, play great defense and shoot the ball well," Isaly said. "They just don't give you good looks. Coach Liedtke does a great job with his program.'

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

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














Photo by Kyle Lutz Conotton Valley senior Chandice Cottis passes the ball during the OVAC Tournament 1A title game.









Seven Springs' halfpipe largest in eastern U.S.

SEVEN SPRINGS, Pa. — On a clear but frigid afternoon in February, friends Mark Oshie and Steve Slyman carved their way to the top of Seven Spring Mountain Resort's Olympic-size halfpipe. Balancing on their snow-boards, they looked down its 500-foot length and discussed its condition.

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
The halfpipe is the only one of its kind on the East Coast now that Killington in Vermont has shut down its own Olympic-size halfpipe. Approximately 60 feet in width, its massive walls are made entirely of snow -45acre feet of snow, to be exact. Maintaining the feature takes a serious commitment, according to Joel Rerko, director of mountain operations for the resort.

"It takes a lot of dedication to your terrain park program," he said. "And it takes a lot of resources to build a pipe. A lot of snow making. A lot of water. And the proper equipment to do it correctly."

Olympic-size halfpipes are much more common at resorts in the Rocky Mountains and the West Coast,

WVU slapped with NCAA probation

CHARLESTON - The NCAA placed West Virginia's athletic department on two years' probation Wednesday for recruiting violations involving illegal text messages and phone calls in 14 sports.

The NCAA said a Division I infractions committee determined that coaches in 14 sports sent impermissible texts and made phone calls to prospects and parents

between June 2010 and February 2013. Most of the gymnastics, football, women's basketball and women's soccer.

Most of the women's gymnastics violations were committed by one assistant coach, who was placed under a one-year showcause penalty, cannot recruit during a 30-day signing period and



must attend an NCAA regional rules seminar.

The committee determined that infractions in other sports were limited.

The NCAA said several coaches involved in the violations believed there was a misunderstanding in some of the recruiting communication rules.

Additionally, the school did not fully understand how to use compliance software it purchased to monitor phone and text activity," the NCAA said. "It wasn't until the software company updated the software that the school learned of the violations."












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

"But you never know coming into a season how kids will respond. A lot of the teams we've played we haven't overwhelmed, but we've found ways to win at the end."



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
