

His Blue Eagles squad finished the season at 23-5 with just one senior on the team, Spencer Campbell. They rode off into the sunset and claimed the fourth basketball state title in school history by beating rival Wheeling Central, 51-46, in the Class A championship game.

"We did this with a young team," Tallman said. "Our lone senior captain Spencer Campbell did a great job with leadership and the other guys stepped up. Every time we needed them we never saw panic in their eyes, and no matter what they found a way to grind it out."

Magnolia's victory against 2013-14 state champion Wheeling Central in the title tilt, was its third time beating the Maroon Knights this season. The Blue Eagles beat the likes of Central and Bishop Donahue earlier in the season to win the Undo's Classic and they beat both of those schools again in the Region One, Section One tournament in what was considered
