OVAC to crown golf champs this week at Oglebay Park

WHEELING - The first Ohio Valley Athletic Conference champions of the 2015-16 school year are about to be crowned.

Oglebay Park will play host to the OVĂC Golf Championships this week with champions in five classes to be awarded based on 18-hole stroke play.

The tournament begins on Tuesday with Class 4A playing at the Jones Course at Spiedel and Classes 1A and 2A will play concurrently at Crispin Center, but will crown a separate champion.

The other two classes - 3A and 5A - will play on Thursday on Crispin and Spiedel, respectively.

Each class tournament will begin


at 9:30 a.m.










