

Morgantown is coached by Dave Tallman, a New Martinsville native. He has experienced great success at the Mohigans' helm in just his second year.


His well-drilled charges won the OVAC crown a year ago, downing Parkersburg South. Tallman also has his team perfect after 16 starts this winter.



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

ST. CLAIRSVILLE — The Wheeling Hospital Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Boys Basketball Class 2A championship game can be billed as the wiley veterans against the new kids on the block.

Wheeling Central (17-1) is 5-0 in championship games since the event began in the 2007-08 season. The Maroon Knights have won three straight conference championships and are 4-0 in 2A title tilts. They won Class 3A championship the first season.

Meanwhile, Caldwell (16-4) has never appeared in an

OVAC championship game.

The Maroon Knights and Redskins will tip-off at 3 p.m. today inside Ohio University Eastern's Health and Physical Education Building. The game will be the middle one of five that day.

Top-seeded Wheeling Central advanced to the finals with a 70-57 victory over No. 4 Shadyside Tuesday night in East Wheeling, while third-seeded Caldwell needed overtime to upset No. 2 Toronto, 55-54, Wednesday night in the Gem City.

"I think a lot of our success lately can be attributed to

Chase," Wheeling Central head coach Mel Stephens said of his West Virginia University recruit, Chase Harler. "It's not by coincidence that we've had this run since he came on as a freshman, but we've had some other pretty good kids alongside him."

The 6-3 Harler averages 24.1 points per outing, one of three double-digit scorers for the Maroon Knights. The others are 6-0 junior Gabe Rohmann (10.6) and 6-0 sophomore Brent Price (10.5). Junior John Burkhalter (6-0) and sophomore Owen Gainer (6-0) round out the starting five

Harler fired in 27 points in the win over Shadyside. Price added 19.

"Having a player like Chase on your team makes our job as coaches a whole lot easier," Stephens noted. "He has a very good IQ for the game of basketball and he understands the game. There are a lot of things that he does on the court that we don't have to relay to him."

Price has been a bright spot for Stephens and Co.

"He's very athletic and jumps pretty well," the head coach said. "He could probably be averaging more points, but he's unselfish to a fault."

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





Blue Eagles, Cadets to battle for 3A championship

ST. CLAIRSVILLE - It seems like Magnolia and Fort Frye have been on a collision course for one another.

At the start of the season, both teams had today's date circled on their calendars.

After several ups and downs along the way, both the Blue Eagles and Cadets have arrived at their destination ... Ohio University Eastern's Health and Physical Education Center for the Wheeling Hospital OVAC Boys Basketball Championship in Class 3A.

The game will tip off at 5:30 p.m. and the victor will

receive the coveted conference championship trophy.

The top-seeded Blue Eagles come in with a 13-2 record, riding an eight-game winning streak and are fresh off a victory against Monroe Central in the semifinals.

"This is a great event for the players to play in," Magnolia head coach Dave Tallman said. "We know we have a great opponent in Fort Frye. We're excited.'

The second-seeded Cadets didn't have quite as easy time getting to the final as the Blue Eagles did in their 58-43 victory against the Seminoles.
Fort Frye was taken to overtime by Bellaire before post-

ing a 56-54 victory thanks to a buzzer-beating 3-pointer by Carter Lang.

"That game definitely drained us," Cadets' head coach Eric Henniger said earlier this week. "I think we're playing well right now. It took us a little while for some of our guys to figure out their roles, but they're starting to come together and are playing really good basketball right now."

The teams - though they don't play in the pre-OVAC portion of the regular-season slate - are growing quite familiar with one another. This is the second straight season they've met in the title game. Magnolia won last year's encounter, 67-65, and rode the momentum to Charleston and eventually a West Virginia Class A state

The Blue Eagles have been more of a work-in-progress this season despite having several key cogs back. They got





formance, which had Clifford smiling from ear-to-ear inside his office that night.





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



ST. CLAIRSVILLE - After coming up short in its quest to repeat as conference champions last season, Frontier head coach Scott Murphy knew his team was on a mission Saturday to finish the job this year.

"At the Bridgeport game, I could see it in their eyes they were ready," Murphy said of Monday's Wheeling Hospital OVAC Championship Class 2A semifinal victory against the second-seeded Bulldogs.

Were they ever. The Cougars set a pair of shooting records and came up short of a scoring mark Saturday in handing River a 65-54 defeat in the 2A title tilt inside Ohio University Eastern's

Physical Education Center.

"We've shot really well more than once this year," Murphy said. "It's something we talk about every day in practice. And the only way you're going to shoot well is if you make good passes."

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



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

Unfortunately for them, Saturday night marked the third consecutive season they left with silver medals around their necks.




within six points.




