Magnolia soars to OVAC Class 3A title

WHEELING - It was an ominous start for Magnolia's Peyton Moore in the OVAC Class 3A Golf Championship.

The Blue Eagle senior, who came in as the defending champion, went bogey, bogey to open the tournament, which was played under ideal conditions, at Oglebay Park's Crispin Center.

Like most good golfers, Moore didn't let it bother him.

"I started rough, but I knew I just had to power through it because there are 16 holes left," Moore said.

With the first few holes behind him, Moore shot the final 16 holes in 5-under and finished with an impressive round of 68 to repeat as the medalist and fuel the Blue Eagles to their second consecutive team title.

"It feels good to repeat and it's really exciting to see the young kids on our team be able to get a title," Moore said. "It's nice for our school. I am really happy for everyone on our team."

Moore credited his final score, which included a 3-under performance on the four, par 5s, to his ball striking.

"I was hitting the ball well off the tee," Moore said. "This kind of performance helps my confidence moving forward. I know I

can go low, but I also think I might have left some shots out there, too."







"We haven't been here a ton, but we are familiar with


