



### **BROOKSIDE Reigning Queen of Queens Holds Fundraiser**

However, Massey, an E-2 airman, hasn't forgotten where she came from or how she got to where she is now - Luke Air Force Base in Glendale, Ariz.

"I love it out there so far, but it's definitely different from the Ohio Valley. It's a big change in lifestyle, but I'm adjusting well," she said. "Work is going great, but it's great to be back home. I miss the Ohio Valley, my family and my friends. I'm also excited to crown the new queen Saturday night."

It has become a tradition in recent years that the reigning Queen of Queens holds a fundraiser during the week leading up to the annual OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game. Massey upheld that tradition by staging a car wash and bake sale at Advance Auto Parts on National Road in Brookside Tuesday.

She had hopes of raising at least \$500. BROOKSIDE – Shortly after Briana Massey was crowned the 2015 Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Queen of Queens a year ago, the Bridgeport graduate embarked upon her lifetime dream of serving in the United States Air Force.

However, Massey hasn't forgotten where she came from or how she's got to where she is now - an E-2 airman stationed in Luke Air Force Base in Glendale, Ariz.

"I love it out there so far, but it's definitely different from the Ohio Valley. It's a big change in lifestyle, but I'm adjusting well," she said. "Work is going great, but it's great to be back home. I miss the Ohio Valley, my family and my friends. I'm also excited to crown the new Queen Saturday night."

It has become a tradition in recent years that the reigning Queen holds a fundraiser during the week leading up to the annual OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game. Massey upheld that tradition by staging a car wash and bake sale at Advanced Auto

Parts on National Road in Brookside on Tuesday for four hours. She had hopes of raising at least, if not more than, \$500. In addition to Massey, several of this year's Queen of Queen candidates offered their assistance. They included Lexie Willoughby (Bridgeport); Kaitlyn Callarik (Bellaire); Alexa Mayle (Buckeye Local); Katherine Adase (Wheeling Park); Alyssa Wallace (John Marshall); and Madison Ross (Cameron).

"Five hundred is the goal, but I'd like to get somewhere around \$750 or near \$1,000," she said with her classic smile. "That would be fantastic."

All the proceeds will go to LEEK, a Hunting and Mountain Preserve in Oswayo, Pa., which is located on the border of New York midway through the Keystone State. Massey and her mother, Diane, were searching for a worthy cause to help out. After contacting the Wounded Warrior Project, they were referred to LEEK.

"They basically told us that if we wanted our donation to go directly to something that is really

good at helping out wounded veterans and not into a general fund, we should contact this organization," Massey added. "They kind of led us to them."

LEEK's mission is to provide a friendly, handicap-accessible camp environment and therapeutic outdoor activities like hunting and fishing. LEEK believes in encouraging our wounded heroes to focus on their abilities, without compromising their current physical limitations.

Its purpose centers around providing a safe and friendly environment where wounded U.S. service members can assist each other through the healing process, both mentally and physically. It offers recreational opportunities specifically geared to each wounded veterans' needs and abilities.

"It's an outdoor preserve area that helps wounded warriors," Massey explained. "They take the wounded warriors, many who are missing some type of limb, on fishing and hunting expeditions. It gives those individuals a chance to connect with other wounded warriors who have lost their sense of pride after go to serve for their country.

The Fisher's remain closely involved in the day-today operations at LEEK and hold the mission close to their hearts, having seen firsthand the challenges their own father faced as an amputee.
