



St. Clairsville was third in the Small School girls division with 235 points.

"We had some nice swims," Martins Ferry head coach Nick Levi said. "We set two school records. Overall, we had some kids swim some good good times."

While finishing third in the 100 breaststroke, Kalinski, a junior, set a school mark with a 1:11.15 clocking. Also, the Purple Riders' 400 Freestyle Relay foursome, which was third in also established a school standard with a time of 3:53.59. That group included Jamie Fogle, Rylee Reis, Macy Shriver and Kalinski.

The annual Bill Brubaker **OVAC Swimming Champi**onship is just days away.

Prep swimmers - representing 21 schools - will converge оп the Steubenville High School's Natatorium Saturday for the annual meet to crown the conference champions. Swimming action gets under way at 11 a.m.

The top 32 in each event qualify. The qualifying marks were able to posted during any meet of the season, leading up to this past Thursday when the entries were due.

Once again this season, there will be two boys and two girls champions crowned. There will be a division for Class 1A-4A and 5A will have its own class. Those are deter-

mined based on the number of schools, competing in each division.




