


Photo by Kyle Lutz Linsly's Amika Ekanem after a return during her OVAC finals match. Ekanem posted an 8-1 victory.

With two victories and two runner-ups, Linsly tallied a total of 24 points during the two days to year in a row.


the semifinals before bowing out. They were Abby Jones, Ritika Reddy and Pond.


