

St. C. falls to EL in 4A title match

MORRISTOWN – Getting to the championship in any sport is half the battle. Completing the mission is another story. St. Clairsville found that out the hard way Saturday afternoon.

The third-seeded Red Devils (16-6) knocked off No. 2 Oak Glen in an Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 4A volleyball semifinal Tuesday night to advance to the finals. Howev-



er, they fell in straight sets to top-seeded East Liverpool, 27-25, 25-14 and 25-19 inside 'The Hangar' at Union Local High School.

"I'm proud of the girls for the way they played," a disappointed St. Clairsville head coach Christa Truchan said. "They played hard." St. Clairsville head of

the first set to clinch a victory, but left both slip away. The teams were knotted at 23 - the sixth of eight deadlocks before Courtney Storer gave the Red Devils a 24-23 lead. The Potters drew even on a Skye Stokes kill, but a net serve gave the Red Devils another shot at winning, 25-24.

However, another Stokes' kill made it 25-all and the Potters tallied the next two points for a hard-earned triumph.

East Liverpool (17-3) led wire-to-wire in the second set. They scored six of the final seven points for a 2-0 set advantage.

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Trail wins another conference title

MORRISTOWN – At the outset of Saturday's OVAC Class 3A championship match between Fort Frye and two-time defending champion Buckeye Trail, veteran Warriors head coach Jeff Beros reminded his unbeaten squad to "be ready for anything."

It was and, as a result, the best season in 23 years for the Guernsey County program continues.

Jennifer Burga recorded 14 points and, with 41 assists, became the school's alltime leader in that category, as the Warriors swept the Cadets, 25-9, 25-15, 25-17, to claim their 16th conference crown inside "The Hangar' at Union Local High School.

"I couldn't be more proud of this 13member team we have," Beros said. "We were expecting a successful season, and we're not done yet."

Buckeye Trail enters Ohio Division IV sectional tournament action next Saturday at 22-0; it's best start since finishing 25-1 in 1993 when it fell to Sydney Lehman in the state semifinals in 1993.

"And what's more remarkable about this season is this group has only lost one set all season," Beros noted.

Paden City Falls in Class 1A Final

Frontier Gets Best of Wildcats

Staff Writer BELMONT – There are times in sports when a very good team just meets its match. That was the case Saturday as top-seeded Paden City fell to the second-seeded Frontier in straight sets of the OVAC Class 1A volleyball championship at Union Local by scores of 25-16, 27-25 and 25-19.

Paden City's biggest lead was only 25-24 in the second set, but the Wildcats couldn't seal the deal and they never led the first or third sets

".Frontier is a very good volleyball team," Paden City coach Fred King said. "They are gifted, athletic and nice kids and the coaches do a good job. When you put good instruction, talented athletes and good plays together, you are going to be tough to beat.

"As a coach I have to give them credit. We didn't play bad, they just made it look that way because they are so good. They put us in a position and we couldn't

respond." The good instruction that King is referring to comes from Cougars coach Donna Murphy, who has led her squad to an 18-6 record and now an OVAC championship.



Frontier sent a message early, jumping out to a 7-1 lead in the first set behind quality serving from senior Lexi Brookover.

The Wildcats clawed their way back into the set with three straight points from Malayna Price to cut the deficit to 8-5 but Frontier just continued to extend the lead and stopped any scoring runs Paden City generated. Tiffany Graham set Brookover up perfectly to deliver the final kill of the first set for the Cougars.

The second set was a much different story. Paden City took a 1-0 lead before Frontier snatched it right back. The Cougars led the

majority of the set but the Wildcats hung around until they were able to regain the lead at 21-20. The teams traded points until the set was knotted at 25-25.

The next points were crucial as Frontier's Nikki Haught and Dani Reed tallied kills to give their squad a 2-0 advantage in the match, instead of Paden City knotting the match at 1-1

Frontier controlled the third set from the start as Brookover recorded a fourpoint run to give the Cougars a 5-1 edge and they never looked back.

As Paden City faced elimination with the score at 24-14, Jenna Arnett stepped behind the service line for the Wildcats and served her team to five consecutive points, showing that her team has a nevergive-up attitude. Finally, Paden City failed to get the ball over the net and Fron tier completed the sweel and an OVAC champi onship victory.

"We came out slowly and they did a good job in the first game," Crusaders senior Samm Simmons said. "We capitalized on some of their errors in the second game and started to get our confidence back.

"I think we just started playing our type of volleyball," Barber said.

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
