
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
The Irish then secured four runs in the top of the eighth and when they took the field, did not allow another comeback as they came away with a 9-5 victory on Monday at Lisa's Field.

Central stymies Shadyside, 3-0



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

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

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



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

ELM GROVE - Outstanding pitching. Steady hitting. Solid defense. Those are three ingredients to becoming a very good softball team.


