CHAMPIONSHIP SATURDAY IN THE OVAC

Record-Setting Day For Park, Linsly, Ferry

Nine marks set during **OVAC Swim Meet**

WELLSBURG - Records are meant to be broken, but who knew so many could be broken in one day?

Nine records were set Saturday at the OVAC Swimming Championship at Brooke High School, including three

meet records and one pool record.

Linsly's Kevin Pietz broke two meet records, Wheeling Park's Sarah Heilman garnered two school records and one meet record, while Park's Charles Schellhase recorded a school record, Martins Ferry's Rylee Reis and Jarrett Bolinger each set new school records and the Linsly 200 medley relay team set a new pool record.

In the team competitions, the Wheeling Park girls collected the 5-A title and finished runner-up on the boys side by four points to the 5-A winner, Park-ersburg South, by a 320-316 count.

Linsly earned top honors on the boys side in the Small School division and secured the runner-up position in the girls small school, just behind Martins Ferry by a 442.50-410 score.

As a celebration, both Wheeling Park coach Patrick Durkin and Linsly coach Bill Brubaker, were surprised by their teams as they were tossed into the pool after receiving their trophies.

"This feels good after being here since eight this morning," Brubaker

said as he wiped the water from his face. "I am very proud of all of them




Photo by Cody Tomer Wheeling Park's Sarah Heilman competes in the OVAC 100 butterfly as she set a new school record for the event.

because almost everyone dropped times. Pietz had a great meet and broke two meet records. Kaleb Nuckles-Polen swam great and Michael Schwarz had a great meet. They all swam their hearts out, especially our girls.

The Cadets were led by a record breaking day from senior Pietz, who shattered the meet records in the 100 butterfly (52.16) and in the 100 backstroke (53.65).

The Linsly boys also finished first in the 200 medley (1:45.35) and the 200 relay (1:34.13), while the girls 200 medley relay team of Carleigh West, Sydney West, Sian Longley and Carol Gao set a new pool record of 1:54.23.

As for Park, moments before being tossed in the water, along with every member of his coaching staff, Durkin reflected on a memorable day with his

Patriots.

"It was a good day," he said. "Everyone dropped a lot of time across the board and our kids gave everything they had. The coaches and I are extremely proud of their efforts. They did a fantastic job and the coaches and I enjoy coaching all of them.

"The girls really dropped time (Saturday). Sarah broke two school records and

a meet record. She is phenomenal."

Heilman broke her own school records in the 100 butterfly with a time of 1:00.88 and the 100 backstroke at a 59.64 pace, which was also good enough to break the OVAC meet record.

"It feels pretty nice," Hellman said. "It is nice to get my best times at the OVAC meet and I didn't even know I broke the meet record. It took me by surprise."

Wheeling Park's top swimmer on the boys' side had a pretty strong day as well. Schellhase delivered a masterful perform-

ance in the 200 freestyle (1:52.97) and broke the Wheeling Park school record in the 500 (5:04.27).

"This is amazing," he said. "I didn't expect this to happen at all. I finished the 500 and I felt dead. Then, when I looked at my time, all of my energy came rushing back to me. It means a lot to me.

"We have all been working so hard at practice and all the hard work pays off."

The Purple Riders were led to victory on the girls side by Reis, who delivered a school record in the 50 freestyle (25.78).

"This is such an amazing experience," the junior said. "It is exciting because I got third in the 50 last year and my goal this year was to get first.

"The whole team has worked so hard together and put in so many hours and it is nice when that hard work pays off."

The girls also received a victory from Alyssa Kalinski who won the 500

(5:19.14).

"This is huge for us," Levi said. "We sat down at the beginning of the year and wrote down team goals and winning OVACs was high up there for the girls. Every race was crucial and every point mattered and I told the girls to respond and keep going and they did."

Perhaps the future of Martins Ferry swimming resides on the boys' side in freshman Jarrett Bolinger, who set a new school record in the 100 (50.11) and claimed the 100 breaststroke (1:03.25).

"This is probably my best season out of any of my club swim seasons," Bolinger said. "Our whole team works so hard and we have a great coach. Its an amazing feeling to go from watching this tournament last year and standing on the podium this year and I am excited for the future."





"The team that will win will be the one that can get scoring from swimmers moving up from 22nd to 17th or 16th to 12th," Levi said. "In order for us to win this meet, it will need to be a total team effort. Every point is going to be crucial, every race will matter."

Martins Ferry features the top seed — based on entry marks — in the 500 freestyle and 100 breastroke. Those are where senior standout Alyssa Kalinski resides. She's enjoying a brilliant campaign thus far, having established three new Ferry school records. She is the defending conference champion in the 500.

"Alyssa is having another stellar season," Levi said. "She will be in the hunt for medals in both of her individual events."

In the 500, Kalinski's entry mark of 5:22.97 is nearly seven full seconds better than her nearest competitor. In the breaststroke, however, Kalinski is less than a second ahead of Linsly's Sydney West, who is the defending champion.

Other Ferry girls seeded in the top two of their respective individual events are Jamie Fogle (200 free), Rylee

Brubaker's boys appear prime to make a splash toward an eighth consecutive, too.






