





Bridgeport's Herink earns all-OVAC status

WHEELING - Another year, another trophy for Wheeling Central. The Maroon Knights have solidified itself as a powerhouse in golf as they captured the OVAC Class 1A/2A championship on an overcast Tuesday at Crispin Golf Course at Oglebay Park.

Wheeling Central totaled 310 strokes, 33 more than runner-up Bridgeport (343). Steubenville Catholic placed third with a 345.

"They played pretty well," Maroon Knights coach Jim Mortakis said. "My (No.) 3 and 4 kids were right there close to making All-OVAC. They work hard, they practice and they spend a lot of time at the golf course. They have some specific goals and this was just one of them. Hopefully, they're just going to con-

"It's just a singular goal that we have during the year to win the

OVAC. To do that, it worked out good. To win convincingly like we did, too, makes you feel pretty good about where your program is and where we're going."

There were a lot of accomplishments for Wheeling Central. It was the fourth straight year it took home the hardware and it also had a clean sweep in the medalist category.

Derrick Harrison turned in a 73 for the low round of the day while J.C. Maxwell shot a solid 76, good enough for runner-up medalist.

Also scoring for the Maroon Knights were Zach Mazur (80) and Matt Mazur (81).

"Everything was planned," Harrison said. "Driver was working really well. I was hitting my irons really well and putting was as good as its going to be on these greens (Tuesday).

Harrison was also crowned medalist last year when the Maroon Knights won the 3A tournament. As the tour-

WHEELING - The early returns were encouraging for Payne Johnson on Thursday.

The Barnesville junior was part of the first group to return to the clubhouse at Oglebay's Crispin Golf Course, which hosted the annual OVAC Class 3A Golf Championships.

Johnson fired a 1-over-par 72, and it jumped off the scoreboard.

About three hours later, once the final scores were filled in, Johnson was awarded the championship plaque, the spoils of winning the conference's individual title - his first.

But instead of talking about his own achievements, Johnson focused on his team, which, behind his win, captured the school's first conference golf title in 35 years and second overall.

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




