## OVAC Soccer tourney kicks off Monday

The annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference soccer championships will begin Monday and continue through the finals on Saturday. The boys and girls fields are broken down to the top four teams in each Class 1A-3A, Class 4A and Class 5A.

Semifinal matches will take place Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at the higher seeded team's home field. All matches have 5 p.m. starts.

The boys' championship finals will be contested at Wheeling Island Stadium at 10 a.m. (5A), noon (1A-3A) and 2 p.m. (4A). The girls' finals will be held at Red

Devil Stadium in St. Clairsville, with the Class 4A beginning the day at 10 a.m. Class 5A is set for noon and Class 1A-3A at 2 p.m.

ON THE boys' side, Steubenville Catholic (1A-3A), Steubenville (4A) and Wheeling Park (5A) are the defending champions.

The top-seeded Crusaders will be seeking their fourth consecutive title. They have captured six of the last seven championships since the format change from divisions to classes and will host fourth-seeded Caldwell on Monday. The other semifinal pits No. 2 Linsly and No.

3 Wheeling Central, also on Monday at 7:30 p.m. at the 16th Street Field in East Wheeling.

In Class 4A, Big Red is the fourth seed and will trek to Morgantown to meet No. 1 University on Tuesday. A night later, No. 2 Wheeling Park hosts third-seeded Indian Creek.

In Class 5A, top-seeded Beaver Local entertains No. 4 Oak Glen on Monday. Second-seeded East Liverpool welcomes No. 3 Harrison Central on Wednesday.

## Linsly Solves Steub. Catholic

### Cadets Win First OVAC Title Since 2014

WHEELING — For three straight seasons, the Linsly boys soccer team has come up short against Steubenville Catholic in the OVAC Class 3A/1A final.

Three straight years of disappointment and frustration.

No more.

Linsly exploded for four goals in the second half — three coming in a three-minute span late — as the Cadets threw the monkey off their backs and ended Steubenville Catholic's stranglehold on

the OVAC trophy with a 5-1 victory Saturday at Wheeling Island Stadium.

"This is a big monkey off our back and a lot of our guys, especially our seniors, played with a little bit of a chip on their shoulders," Linsly coach Greg Martin said. "Three years in a row (Steubenville Catholic) has walked away the better team.

"We kind of made it a priority. It was our main goal this year to bring this championship back home so it meant a lot to us."

For senior captain Chaz Ghaphery, it was a feeling of redemption.

As the Cadets goalie, he has been the victim of Crusaders goals during that run.

## Knights Win 2nd Straight Title

ST. CLAIRSVILLE — You know what they say about paybacks. Wheeling Central delivered one Saturday afternoon.

Kenadee Wayt continued her torrid scoring pace and Jairika Baylor was splendid between the pipes as the Maroon Knights went back-to-back Saturday afternoon with a 2-0 blanking of No. 2 Linsly in the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 1A/3A girls soccer championship match on the artificial pitch inside Red Devil Stadium.

"This is the game of the year for both schools," Wheeling Central coach Julie Barack said. "They (Linsly) can't go any further than OVACs. We can go to states, but it doesn't matter. This is what matters to us. The girls are friends ... both teams, and sometimes it's tough to play against your friends with something at stake like this, but it was a good game."

Wayt scored her 103rd goal in the 50th minute after the two rivals battled through a scoreless first half. Her 104th tally came late in the 76th minute following a gold-

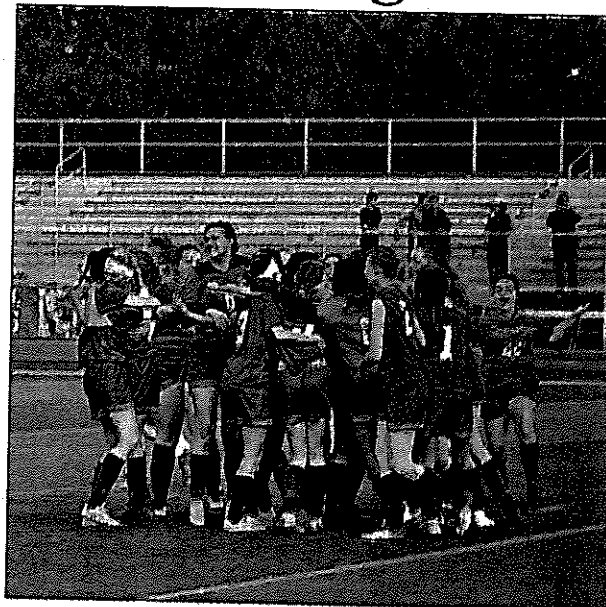

en opportunity by the Cadets moments earlier.

Wayt dribbled the ball down the left sidelines to deep into the box. Her left-footed laser blast went off the fingers of Linsly goalkeeper Johni Lech and into the net.

"The old school record was 88 and she has flown past that," Barack said. "She got her 100th recently. She's not done and I'm excited to see how many she ends up with.

She's an incredible player who is fun to coach and fun to watch. I'm glad she is on my team."

Linsly's Faith Paull had given her team and fans a ray of hope when she went down the right side of the field before unleashing a blast that Baylor smothered with no rebound. She finished with 12 stops.

"The girls played their hearts out. Both teams did. It was a battle from the opening whistle. What was it 30 seconds after the start before there was a free kick?"

## Class 5A

### Parkersburg South 3 University 1

ST. CLAIRSVILLE — The seniors on the Parkersburg South girls' soccer team had never beaten their West Virginia Class AAA rival University High on the soccer field in their four years.

However, that all changed within a 2-hour time span Saturday afternoon on the artificial pitch inside Red Devil Stadium when the No. 1 seeded Patriots (13-0-2) defeated the second-seeded Hawks to capture the school's first Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championship in the sport.

"We've been a bridesmaid to University two of the last three years in the championship game, so I guess this is a bittersweet one for the girls to finally break through and beat them," Parkersburg South head coach Ron Bucholtz said. "This group had never beaten University until today. We've had some tight ones with them in the OVAC championships and some regular season games and they've had some lop-sided wins, but it's always been a tight battle.

"We played to a 0-0 deadlock earlier this season at their place," he

added. "They are a quality program and (coaches) Kat (Devlin) and Graham (Peace) do a great job coaching that group.

"They've got a good team and, obviously, they are a quality opponent. I'm very proud of the way my girls played."

Callie Leasure's kick from 35 yards out that sailed just over the outstretched arms of University goalkeeper Corinne Grabow and into the net for the first score of the game. Jordan Huffman assisted on the net-finder that came in the 25th minute.

The Patriots avoided trouble early in the second half when defender Kathryn Bowers headed a ball away from deep in the box following a Hawks' corner kick.

Nearly 15 minutes later, University was whistled for a hand-ball in the box that resulted in a penalty kick. Leasure sent a laser to the left of a diving Grabow, who just missed deflecting it away. The scoreboard read 2-0 in the 59th minute.

University sliced the deficit in half just two minutes later when the Patriots were guilty of a hand-ball in the box. Stephanie Chmiel went low along the rug into the left corner past a diving Parkersburg South goalkeeper Kendall Mader and into the cage.

Parkersburg South sealed the deal on a beautiful play in the 65th minute. Huffman took what Bucholtz thought was a terrible long shot that Charley Taylor outleaped Grabow for and headed into the net.

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He even let the first one in, a goal by Juan Miguel Gonzalez in the fourth minute. But that was it and his teammates kicked him up.

As the trophy was presented, Ghaphery grabbed a hold of it and rarely let it go, holding it and screaming in excitement.

"This means the world, especially for seniors that have lost three in a row," Ghaphery said. "Having this victory under belts is huge and we loved every minute of it. The team has been working hard for this.

"It feels fantastic. We have created a rivalry against Steubenville Catholic.

They have embarrassed me for two years in a row so finally getting this win is amazing. I have been stressing out all week and going into the game, it was surreal and I didn't even know what was

happening. Just working hard, team was working hard. I was on the moon."

Linsly was able to tie it before half on a goal by Jackson Gilbert.

In the second half, it was all Cadets.

The Linsly defense locked down and allowed two shots in the final 40 minutes.

Linsly (9-2-1) broke the tie as Will Carson took a perfect through ball from Diego Solano and beat Steubenville Catholic netminder Travis Shore in the 55th minute.

With Steubenville Catholic pressing late and trying to get the equalizer, Linsly took advantage of the situation.

Solano had one of the most impressive goals you will see, deking a pair of Crusaders defenders, then as Shore came out to challenge, went around him and placed

the ball into the empty net for an insurance goal in the 75th minute.

Less than two minutes later, Felipe Garcia lobbed a shot over Shore to make it 4-1.

Solano added his second less than a minute later.

"They were pushing to try and get something and we caught them on the counter and it worked out in our favor," Martin said. "Diego, Felipe, had some nice goals. They are a talented team and great kids to coach. I am thrilled for these seniors that they finally get to grab that trophy.

"This is our only trophy we play for. We have a couple big games coming up, we have a prep tournament coming up, but this is the only actual trophy we get to lift up and it was a huge priority."

For Steubenville Catholic, all good things have to come to an end, but Coach Steve Kopcha knows how impressive of a run his team had gone on.

"Linsly did a great job, we did a great job, but once they got that second goal, we had to try to make some adjustments to tie it up and it left us exposed in the backfield," Kopcha said. "Whether it was 2-1 or 5-1, we needed to do something to tie it up and it just didn't happen. A great team like Linsly was able to take advantage.

"It has been an exceptional run. Linsly got us in the very beginning, but we were able to run off the next few years. It is a great rivalry and we are very proud of the three in a row we did get. We have to try and go out and start a new streak next year."

# Oak Glen Defeats Beaver

It's been said that practice makes perfect. Oak Glen girls' soccer coach Ryan Wells is a firm believer in that.

In the final practice before Saturday morning's Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 4A championship game, Wells had his Golden Bears practice penalty kicks in a shootout form. Less than 24 hours later, that extra work paid off.

In a game that featured 80 minutes of regulation play, a pair of 5-minute overtime sessions and nine penalty kicks in the shootout, Oak Glen successfully defended its title.

When senior Natalie Szpyrka tickled the twine with the first shot of the 10th round in the second shootout, the top-seeded Golde Bears (12-1) had a second straight championship with a hard-earned, 2-1, nod over No. 3 seed Beaver Local (9-5) on the artificial pitch inside Red Devil Stadium.

"It's funny because we replicated the same exact thing at the end of practice (Friday) and we tied the first round. So, we go to a second-round shootout right at the end of practice before I dismissed the girls," Wells said.

"We went over it (Friday). It was a smooth transition and the girls knew what to do."

Szpyrka beat Beavers' goalkeeper Jackie Francis with a shot inside the post to her right. That gave the Golden Bears an insurmountable 6-4 advantage with only one Beaver Local player remaining to shoot. The game-winning goal went to freshman Kamy Burton whose shot to the left of a diving Francis trickled off her fingers and into the cage.

"Not really, but kind of sort of," Wells said when asked whether this title meant more than last year. "Whenever you win a championship ... the way we won it, you hate

to see a team lose. Beaver Local, from the beginning of this year has played so well. It has gotten so much stronger, as well as we have. A game like today you really don't see a winner or a loser. You hate to see the way it ends up, but any time you can win back-to-back it's a good year."

Oak Glen goalkeeper Kaylee Travis stood tall between the pipes. She finished with 10 saves.

"Kaylee just had nerves of steel," Wells said of his junior goalkeeper. "That's the type of kid she is and the type of family she comes from. All of these kids are like that. We talked to her (before the shootout) and she was nervous. It's only her second or third year player soccer. She came up with huge saves. Any time you put a keeper in a position like that and she comes up with huge saves by getting any piece of a body part on the ball is a good day. She came up with 4-5 really good saves in the shootout."

Oak Glen led 1-0 when Brooklyn Loveland pounded home a penalty kick in the 34th minute. That goal would stand up until late in the match.

With time winding down, Beaver Local's Riley Britt sent a corner kick

towards the net that teammate Jenna Riccardo headed into the net in the 75th minute.

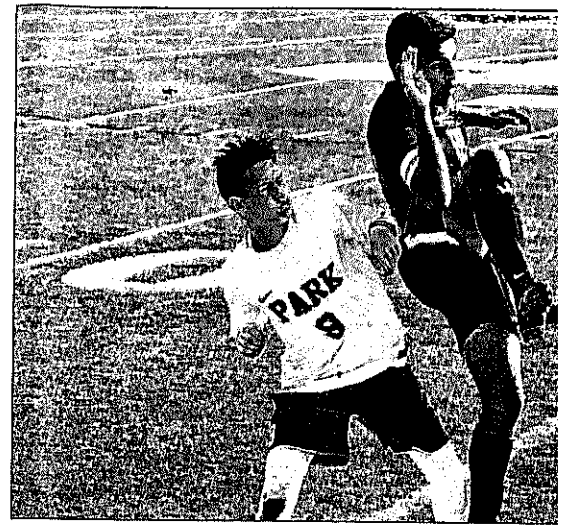
Francis denied Oak Glen's high-scoring Maggie Kovlacik with a diving save in the first OT, while the Beaver had two golden scoring opportunities in the second extra session. Britt attempted a penalty kick after Leah Pancake was injured while being tripped in the box. Britt's shot caromed off the cross-bar and came right back to her, but her header sailed just over top of the cage.

The teams were deadlocked at 2 after the first 10 shooters and Oak Glen quickly grabbed the momentum as Taylor Allison, Jillian Williams and Burton found the net before Szpyrka ended it.

Francis also recorded 10 saves.

"I think all of the girls would agree that we didn't play our best soccer today, but they continued working hard and got themselves back in the game in the second half late," Beaver Local coach Elizabeth Connor said.

"We left some things out there on the field that we needed to finish. I think we'll learn from that heading into the postseason."

WHEELING — University's Joseph Biafora will be playing for West Virginia University next fall — and for good reason.

He is one of, if not *the*, top players in the state. With an OVAC Class 5A title in the balance, he showed why.

Biafora scored the game-winning goal, a header in overtime, as the Hawks stunned Park, 1-0, in the Class 5A final at Wheeling Island Stadium.

It is the second straight OVAC championship for University.

Fortunately for the Hawks, it is hard to keep an exceptional player like Biafora off the scoreboard and when his team needed him most, he came through.

A little more than three minutes into the first overtime session, University gained a throw-in deep in Park territory.

Mason Shockley gained possession and sent a perfect cross into the box.

Biafora leaped high and headed the ball past Wheeling Park goalie Zach Calvert and the celebration began. Biafora threw off his shirt and was mobbed by his teammates at midfield.

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The celebration may have been too much as he was assessed a red card afterward.

"Every time we play them, it gets more and more challenging," Talton said. "From a neutral standpoint, it was a great game to be a part of. It

was exciting to be a part of.

"It was a great goal. We have great senior leadership. Mason Shockley put the ball in on the wing and he is another guy we rely heavily on. Him taking it upon himself to go down in the corner and play that cross to another guy we count on, as a coach, that makes my job easy when those guys put that effort.

Wheeling Park had its chances, the best coming on a Jason Pennybacker header that was just wide in the 64th minute. Vincent Bauer had a point blank shot on University goalie Justin Parsons, but was denied in the final minutes.

Parsons made nine saves.

"I thought we played a whale of a game, played with a lot of energy and had a game plan to defend Joe Biafara and Mason and we managed and handled them really well," Wheeling Park coach Mario Julian said. "We had a really strong first half and we easily could have had a few goals. Early in the second half, we really needed to put one away.

"The longer that game went on, they started to get a little bit of momentum the last 15 minutes of regulation. We battled hard and we know they are the class of the state. It is going to be a tough road, but I am proud of the way the kids played."

University thought it had broken the tie in the 57th minute, but a goal by Tyler Blohm was called back because of offsides.

Calvert made seven saves for the Patriots, who are still seeking their first OVAC title since 2011.

"We had several chances to win that game, but it came down to a beautiful goal by Joe Biafara," Julian said. "The goalie came off in hopes of challenging, but the ball was out past the 6 (yard line) and it would have taken a great effort to stop it.

"When you get a Division I player in high school 1-on-1 against a defender in the air, it is going to take a lot to stop him and to his credit, he finished."
