# OVAC Soccer tourney kicks off Monday

The annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference soccer championships will begin Monday and continue through the finals on Saturday. The boys and girls fields are broken down to the top four teams in each Class 1A-3A, Class 4A and Class 5A.

Semifinal matches will take place Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at the higher seeded team's home field. All matches have 5 p.m. starts.

The boys' championship finals will be contested at Wheeling Island Stadium at 10 a.m. (5A), noon (1A-3A) and 2 p.m (4A). The girls' finals will be held at Red

Devil Stadium in St. Clairsville, with the 3 Wheeling Central, also on Monday at Class 4A beginning the day at 10 a.m. 7:30 p.m. at the 16th Street Field in East Class 5A is set for noon and Class 1A-3A Wheeling. at 2 p.m.


