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





## **Madonna Tops Paden City**

STEUBENVILLE - Four years ago, a group of freshman arrived in the Madonna baseball program hungry for an OVAC title.

That same group, now seniors, walked off of Vaccaro Field on Saturday hoisting an OVAC trophy, following a 9-4 victory over Paden City in the OVAC 1A Championship.

It is Madonna's fifth OVAC championship in the school's history and first

since 2014.

"It has been awhile for us so it is good to be back here," Madonna coach Tim Provenzano said. "This was a good win. These kids came in as freshmen and this has been their goal ever since then. They got it (Saturday).



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






