

WEST LIBERTY — Thursday is going to be a day that Wheeling Central's Laina Anderson is going to remember for the rest of her life. After four matches in about nine hours, Anderson walked off the courts at the Edgar Martin Tennis Complex a winner as she secured the No. 1 singles title at the OVAC championships on the campus of West Liberty University.


"Laina played a wonderful match," Wheeling Central coach Peggy Dailer said. "She was so smart. She played the match just

Anderson went into the OVAC Tournament as the top seed in No. 1 singles. What was even more impressive was that the freshman had not lost a match the entire season. In the first round, she defeated University's Maya Gharib, 8-1, followed by a shutout win over Magnolia's Logan Riggs.

In the semifinal round, Anderson bested Parkersburg South's Jordan Mader, 8-2, to make it to the championship. In a hard-fought match against No. 2 seed Emme McKnight of Morgantown, Anderson got the upperhand, 8-3, as the emotions came pouring out when she secured the match.

WHEELING – After a 14-hour and 41-minute day, the final boys' OVAC singles champion was crowned at 11:11 p.m. inside the Wheeling Park Bubble on Tuesday.

Wheeling Park's Jitesh Pujara and Linsly's Federico

their singles championships but ultimately fell by narrow margins.

Navarro dropped an 8-6 decision to Cambridge's Mason Long, while Pujara was ousted in a 7-3 tiebreaker.

"I'm very proud of Pujara," Park coach Tim Ickes said. "It seems like he is not playing as well during the year but when it comes to tournament time, he is killing it. That's the time to be playing well."

University was the 5A team champion, as Drew Hawthorne, Kyle Hawthorne and Andre Barcinas all claimed singles titles for the Hawks' third consecutive crown.
