Rockies, Story reach \$27.5 million, 2-year deal

DENVER (AP) – All-Star shortstop Trevor Story and the Colorado Rockies have agreed to a \$27.5 million, twoyear contract that avoids an arbitration hearing, according to a person familiar with the deal.

Nolan Arenado, a five-time All-Star and seven-time Gold Glove winner at third base, recently said he felt a level of "disrespect" from the Rockies' front office in the wake of trade rumors and the team not being active in player acquisition this winter.

Arenado hit a career-high .315 with 41 home runs, 118 RBIs and a .962 OPS last season.



Kobe Bryant, eight others die in chopper crash

CALABASAS, Calif. (AP) - NBA leg-end Kobe Bryant, his daughter and seven others were killed Sunday when their helicopter plunged into a steep hillside in dense morning fog in Southern California, his sudden death at age 41 touching off an outpouring of grief for a star whose celebrity transcended basketball.

The chopper went down in Calabasas, about 30 miles (48 kilometers) northwest of down-town Los Angeles. Authorities said nine people were aboard and presumed dead. Bryant, an alltime basketball great who spent his entire 20-year career with the Los Angeles Lakers, was among the victims, a person familiar with the

situation told The Associated Press. Bryant's 13-year-old daughter, Gianna, also was killed, a different person familiar with the case said.


Los Angeles County Sheriff Alex Villanueva would not confirm the identities of the victims Sunday pending official word from the coroner. "God bless their souls," Villanueva said at a

news conference.

The cause of the crash was unknown.

News of the charismatic superstar's death rocketed around the sports and entertainment worlds, with many taking to Twitter to register their shock, disbelief and anguish.


