## Pickett Makes Steelers Debut

### Rookie QB Provides Spark, But Jets Rally To Win 24-20

PITTSBURGH — Breece Hall ran for a 2-yard touchdown with 16 seconds remaining and Zach Wilson and the New York Jets spoiled Kenny Pickett's debut in Pittsburgh by rallying for a 24-20 victory over the Steelers on Sunday.

The Jets (2-2) won in Pittsburgh for just the second time in franchise history after Wilson — making his season debut — led them down the field late after the second of Pickett's three interceptions gave New York the ball back with 3:42 to go.

Wilson took the Jets 65 yards in 10 plays, the final two coming as Hall churned his way across the goal line. The play was initially ruled a fumble at the 1, but overturned on review.

Wilson finished 18 of 36 for 252 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions in his first game since injuring his right knee in the preseason opener. He also became the first quarterback in Jets history to catch a touchdown when he hauled in a 2-yard pass from Braxton Berrios in the second quarter in New York's version of the "Philly Special" run

by the Eagles in the Super Bowl.

The catch gave New York a 10-point lead. The Jets were up 10-6 at the half and the Steelers made a move that was inevitable at some point, inserting Pickett in place of the struggling Mitch Trubisky.

Pickett, the 20th overall pick in the draft who dutifully sat behind Trubisky as the Steelers endured a bumpy opening month, walked onto the same field where he starred collegiately at the University of Pittsburgh to a massive ovation.

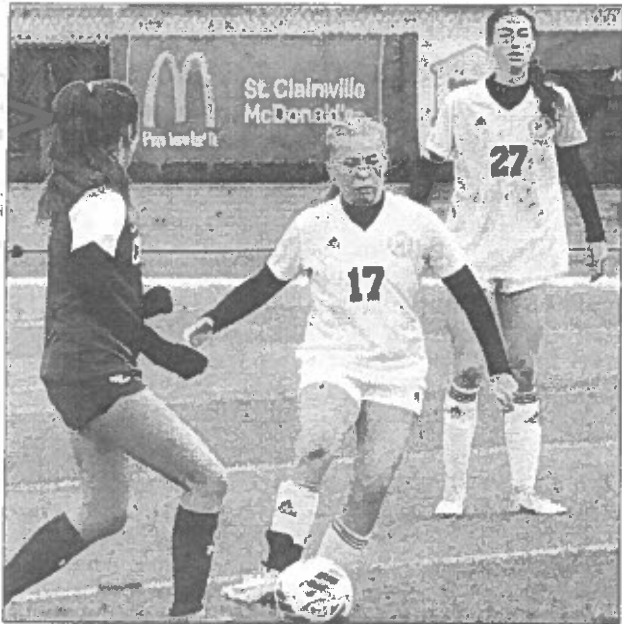

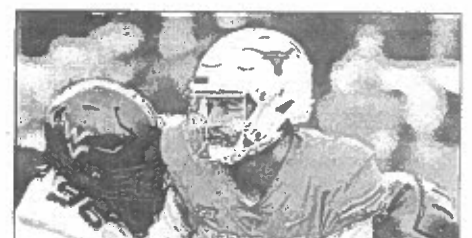

Linsly took a 1-0 lead in

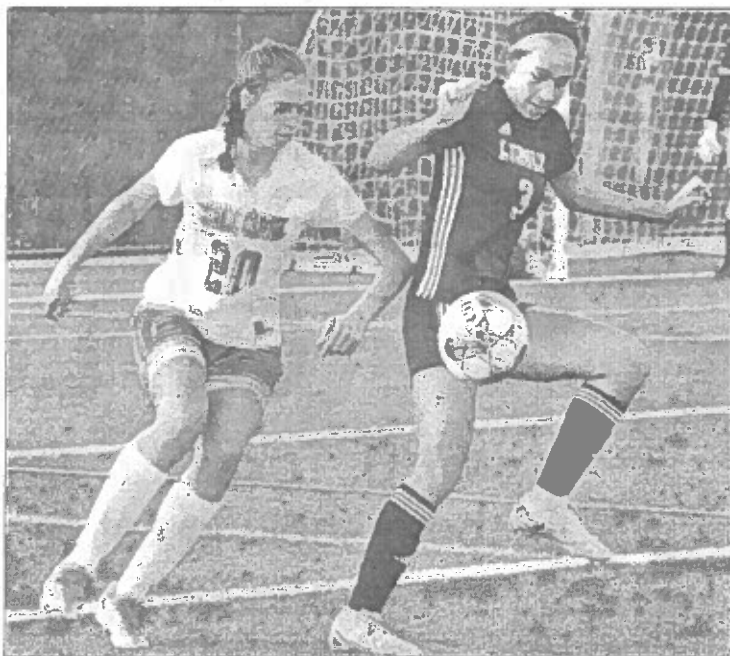

Sophomore Zara Harveth recorded five kills, while Ava Marinacci had 15 assists

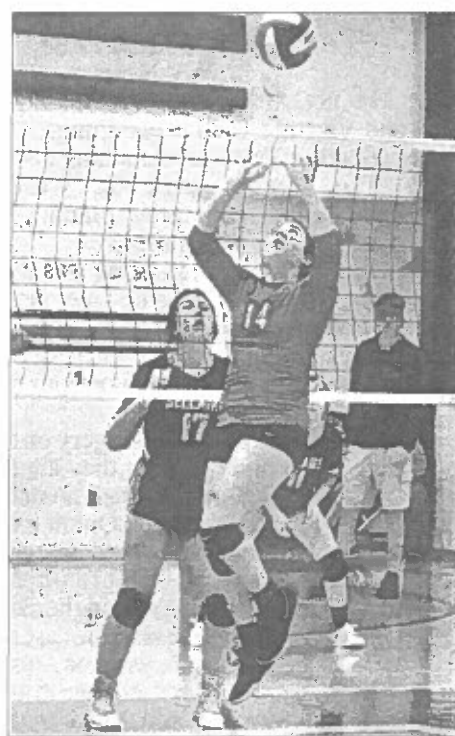

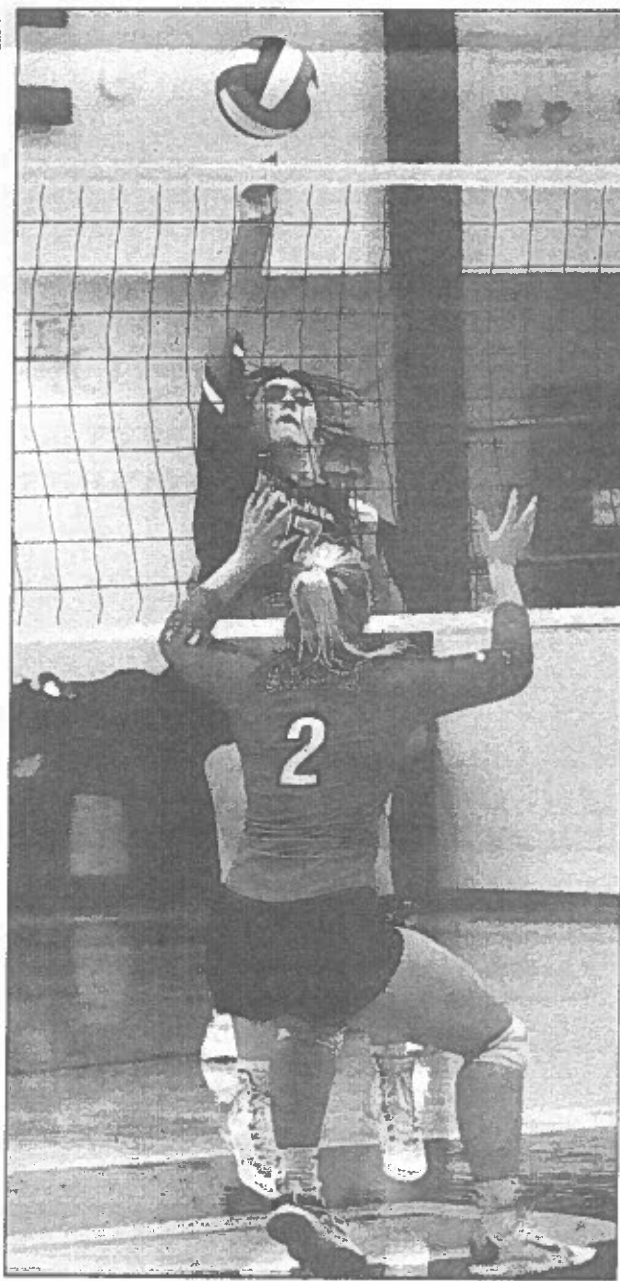

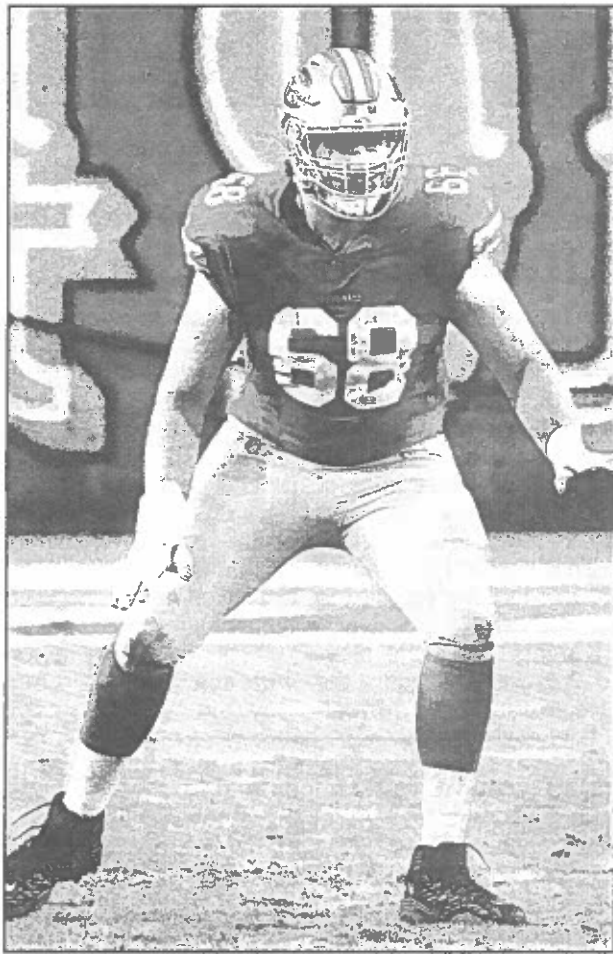

WHEELING — It's out of the frying pan and into the fire for Wheeling Park head coach Chris Daugherty and his Patriots Friday night.

Coming off a 69-28 setback to Ohio power Steubenville last Friday night, Park (3-2) welcomes fellow West Virginia Class AAA heavyweight Morgantown (3-1) to Wheeling Island Stadium this week for a 7 p.m. Friday night battle.

"I am really proud of how our kids played last week," Brown admitted. "They are understanding what we are putting in front of them and going out and executing it on the field. Our schedule is

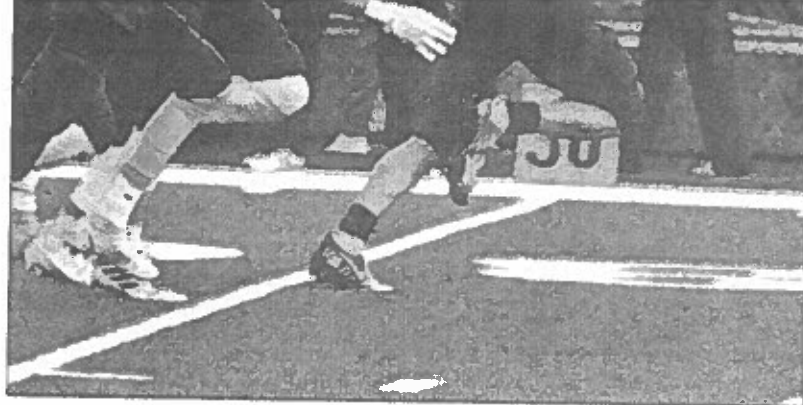

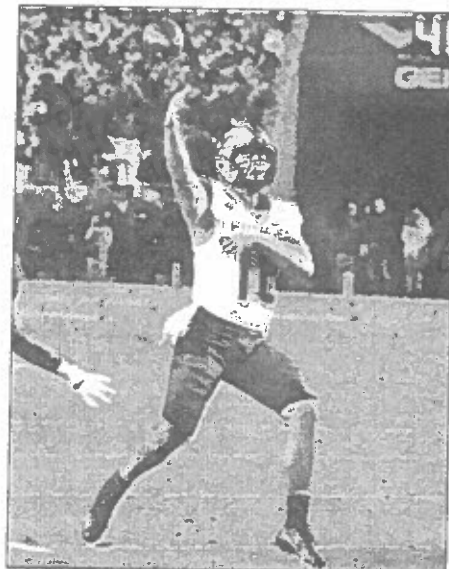

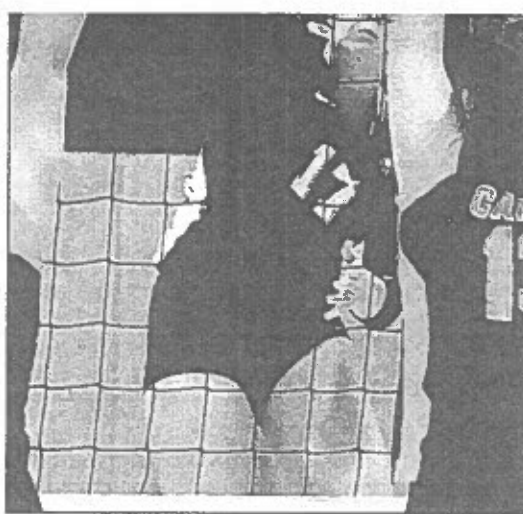

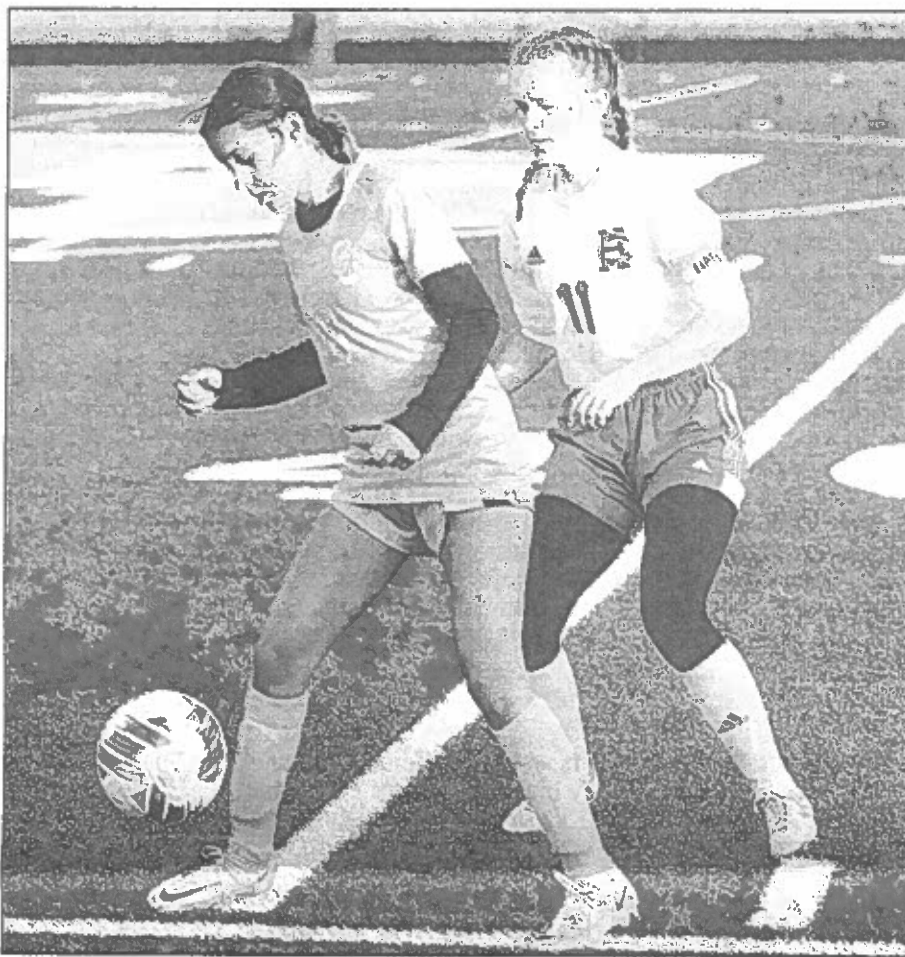

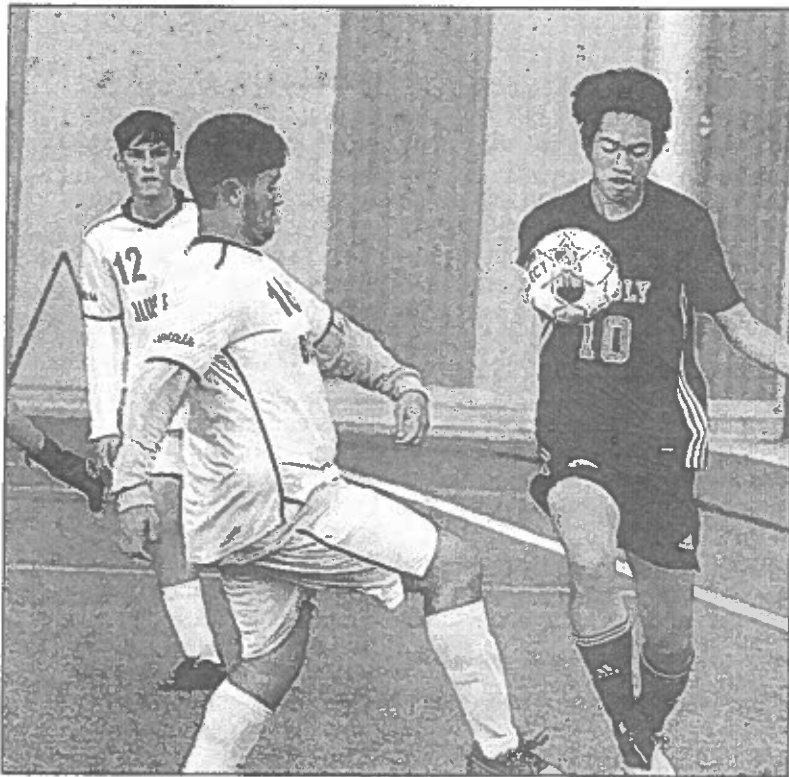

## Browns' star Garrett suffers sprain, banged up in car crash

CLEVELAND (AP) - Cleveland Browns star defensive end Myles Garrett suffered a sprained shoulder, strained biceps and minor cuts when he flipped his Porsche in a frightening single-car accident on Monday.

Garrett, who spent several hours being treated at a hospital, rolled his car on a rural road following practice. He was driving with an unidentified female passenger, who was also taken for emergency care.

Despite his many injuries, Garrett has not yet been ruled out of Sunday's game against the Atlanta Falcons (1-2).

Browns executive Andrew Berry said Tuesday night the team was "thankful that Myles, his passenger and no other parties were seriously injured in the single-car accident yesterday."

The team said its doctors concluded Garrett injured his shoulder, biceps and had some "minor lacerations as well as some bumps and bruises to various other body parts."

"Myles didn't suffer any fractures and has also cleared concussion protocol," Berry said in a statement. "Currently, our focus is on providing Myles the medical care needed for him to return to football activ-

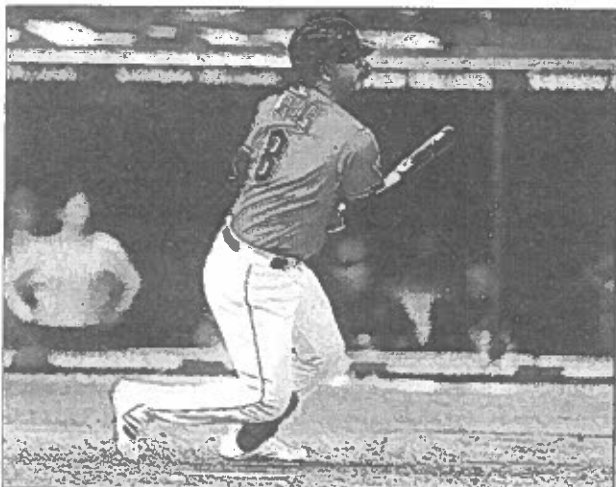
It's still September. The season is longer than ever.

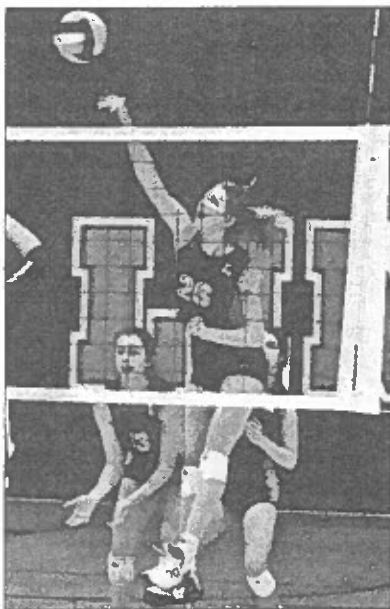

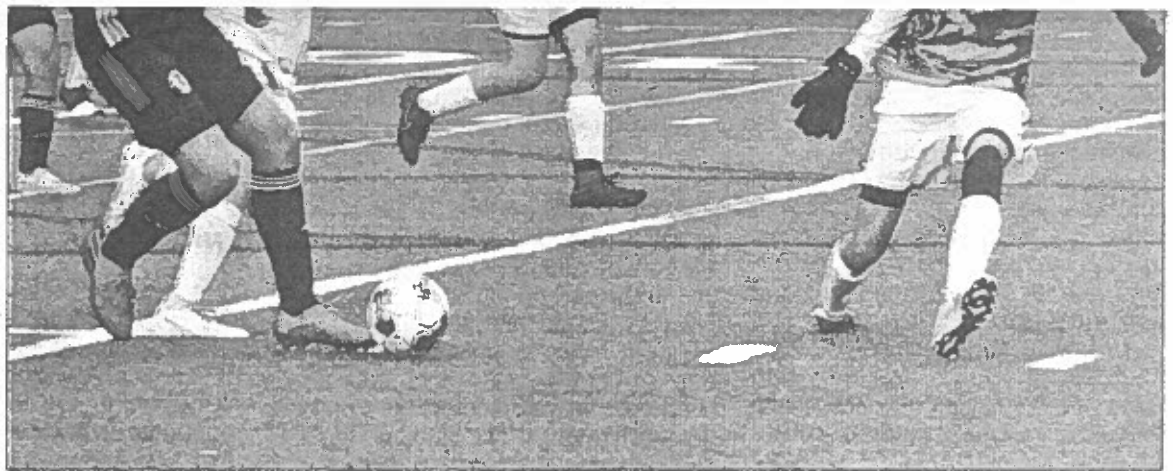

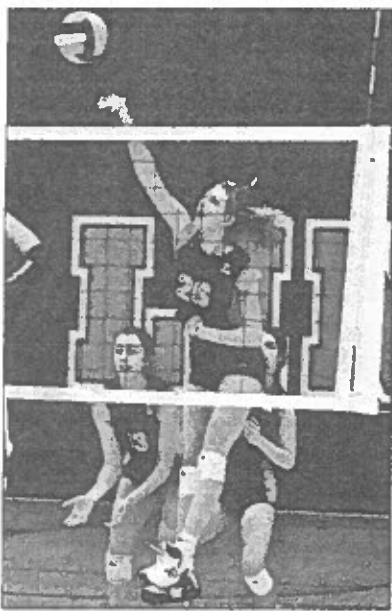

## Keller's Idea Of A Down Night: 5 Innings, 1 Run

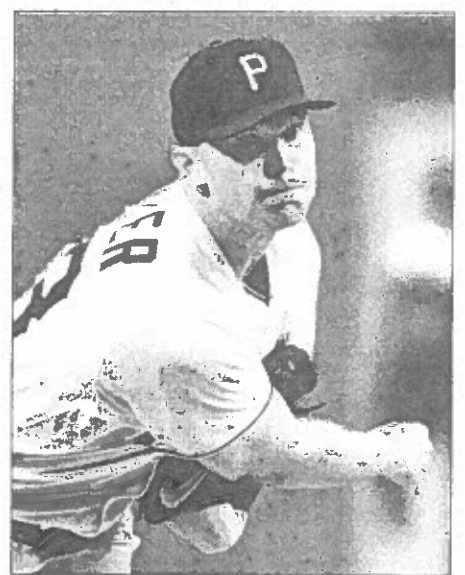

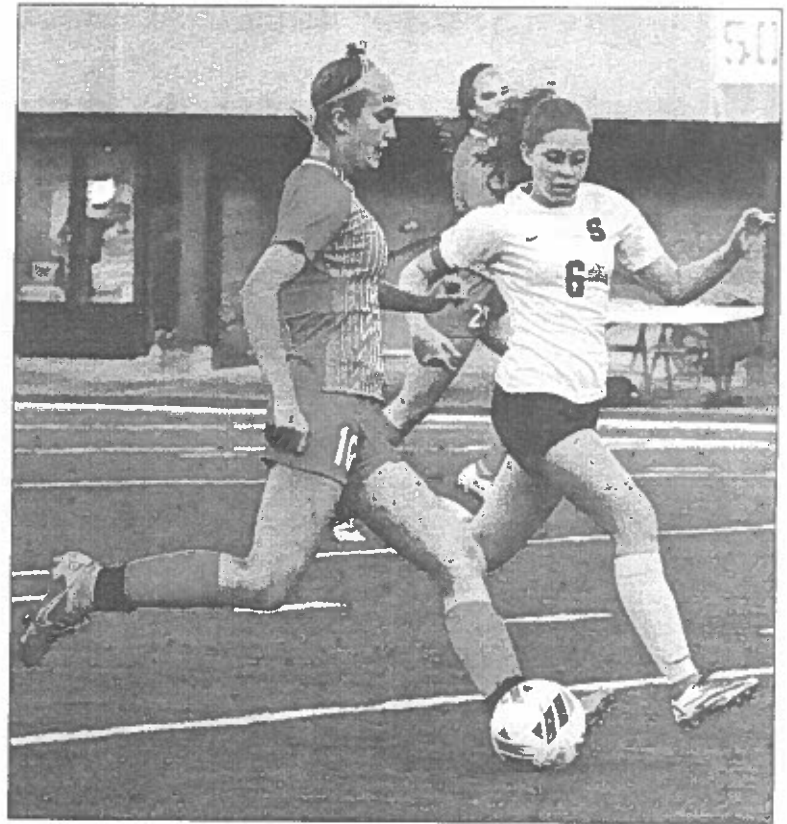

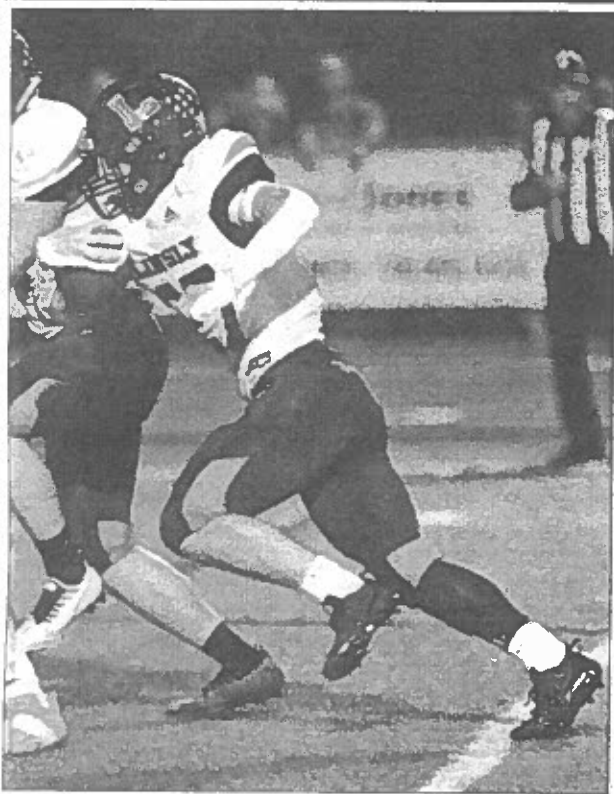
