

Heat are on a comeback run like very few others

MIAMI (AP) – The easiest way to explain what the Miami Heat are doing in the comeback department during these playoffs is simply to put up their numbers against the rest of the league.

When facing a deficit of at least 12 points this postseason:

- The Heat are 7-6.

- The rest of the NBA is 6-59. Combined.

"Biggest thing for us, we had the will and we had the belief," Heat center Bam Adebayo said. "And we keep finding ways to win."

Doesn't matter the opponent, either. Milwaukee, New York, Boston and now Denver in the NBA Finals all have found themselves on the wrong end of a Heat rally.

Miami rallied from 15 points down to beat top-seeded Milwaukee in Game 4 and then from 16 down to win the clinching Game 5; from 12 down to win Game 1 over New York and from 14 down in Game 6 to eliminate the Knicks; erased a 13-point deficit in Game 1 at Boston and then a 12-point deficit to win Game 2 over the Celtics - and now, a 15-point comeback to win Game 2 of the NBA Finals over Denver.

Sunday night's rally matched the fifth-largest in a finals game in the last 25 years. The Heat trailed the Nuggets 50-35 with 5 minutes left in the second quarter and outscored Denver 76-58 the rest of the way to even the series. The series now shifts to Miami, with both teams practicing there Tuesday before Game 3 on Wednesday night.

This improbable story - a team that trailed in the final minutes of an elimination game of the play-in tournament somehow getting to the NBA Finals – now has an even wackier plot twist. The eighth-seeded Heat have home-court advantage in the ti-See, HEAT, Page B2

ifying was what makes this long day so appealing. It was in 2005 when the father shot 73 over the first 18 holes and contemplated withdrawing because he was so far behind. Browne changed his mind thinking, "How can you quit at something and then tell your kids you can't quit.'

He shot 59 that day and two weeks later was in the penultimate group at Pinehurst No. 2. The son remembers that moment well.

'He called me up on the phone. I said, 'How did it go?" Olin Browne Jr. said. "He said. 'Oh, I shot 69.' And I was like, 'Sorry you missed.' He said. 'No. no. I shot 59.' I misunderstood him. It's a vivid memory. I remember hollering at him in the car on the drive home.'

And now it's the son's turn, and the father couldn't be more proud.

"It's gratifying that he's been able to do something that makes him feel like all the work has been worth it," the father said. "It's the national championship and it's a big deal. Qualifying is something those of us who weren't consistent stars on tour had to face on a yearly basis.

Browne Jr. had rounds of 66 (The Lakes) and 67 (Brookside) to lead 11 qualifiers, the most of any of the 10 final qualifying sites.

Others to advance out of Columbus were Davis Thompson, Eric Cole, Nico Echavarria, Corey Pereira, Luke List, Patrick Rodgers, Kevin Streelman, Nick Dunlap and David Nyfall. The last three were in a four-man playoff. The odd man out was former U.S. Open champion Lucas Glover, and it was a painful to watch.

Glover shot 9-under 63 with a three-putt on the final hole at The Lakes. But he struggled to a 73 at Brookside. In the third playoff hole, Glover missed a 2-foot par putt and was eliminated. He recently switched to a long putter, hopeful it would cure what he described as the yips.

Two players now with LIV Golf made it through in playoffs - Sebastian Munoz made it out of the Maryland qualifier, while Carlos Ortiz advanced through Florida. Three others — Matt Jones. Cameron Tringale and David Puig — were playing the qualifier in Los Angeles.

Florida senior Fred Biondi gave up his exemption for winning the NCAA title, saying he was going to turn pro. That spot went to the first alternate from the England qualifier, Jordan Gumberg, based on a USGA formula for distributing spots.

In Georgia, former NCAA champion Gordon Sargent of Vanderbilt led three qualifiers.

In North Carolina, Yuto Katsuragawa of Japan led five qualifiers. Among those missing out were

North Carolina native Harold Varner III. In New Jersey, former U.S. Junior Amateur champion Michael Thorbjornsen led four qualifiers. Thorbjornsen, who just finished his junior year at

Stanford, will be playing his third U.S. Open. In Maryland, Munoz made a 25-foot putt in a 4-for-2 playoff to join four other qualifiers. Among those who lost in the playoff was Ben Kohles, who

leads the Korn Ferry Tour points list.

After qualifying, the U.S. Open field will stand at 150 players. The USGA is reserving six spots for players who will move into the top 60 on Sunday such as Adam Schenk — and if the Canadian Ópen winner gets his second PGA Tour win since the last U.S. Open.

Vegas Up 2-0 In Stanley Cup

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Jonathan Marchessault scored twice and started an early blitz that chased the NHL's hottest postseason goalie, and Adin Hill continued his stellar play as the Vegas Golden Knights seized control of the Stanley Cup Final with a 7-2 victory over the Florida Panthers to take a 2-0 series lead Monday night.

Hill made 29 saves and Marchessault had an assist to finish with three points. His 12 postseason goals set a Golden Knights record, with all coming after the list round.

Brett Howden scored twice for the Knights, who also got goals from Alec Martinez, Nicolas Roy and Michael Amadio. Six players had at least two points for Vegas, all 18 Knights skaters were on the ice for even-strength goals and their nine goal scorers through the first two games are a Stanley Cup Final record. 

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

Goodson didn't know her time until it was announced over the public address system and nearly broke down in tears as she eclipsed Amanda Mercer's record, which had stood for more than 20 years.

"I've been praying for this and have worked so hard for this." Goodson said as she fought back emotion. "I've had so many people supporting me through all of this and it's just an amazing feeling. I have to thank my teammates for always pushing me. I couldn't have asked for a better support system to help make me who I am as a runner. I came here last year and I didn't run a good time, but I told my family after last season that race was just a warm up for (2023) because I knew I wanted to be on the podium.

The Buckeye Local Brother-Sister duo of senior Cai McKeever and junior Brynn McKeever were there rooting each other on every step of the way.

Cai McKeever — a standout in the 400 meter dash - concluded his prep career in impressive fashion. He turned in an impressive 49.81 en route to garnering a sixth-place finish.

The elder McKeever just transitioned to the sprint events this spring. He had been primarily a distance runner, but dropping down to the 400 was a perfect match.

"I really have to thank my coach because he's really put in the work to help make me a great sprinter," Cai McKeever said. "This is really cool. I didn't even make it to the regional last year, so I never even thought I'd be here (at the state). I've put in the work and it's paid off. It's really cool to have placed. Doing it after my sister was really cool. I love her so much and I watch the amazing work she puts in at practice, and I am so proud of what she's accomplished.

Brynn, who was the lone area athlete to qualify to the state meet in three individual events, advanced to the final in the 100 as the ninth seed. She moved up a spot en route to garner All-Ohio by finishing eighth with a solid 12.32 clocking.

McKeever admitted that if someone told her in March that she'd be an all-Ohio sprinter in June, she wouldn't have believed it.

"I usually had spent most of the spring playing AAU basketball, but my coaches have really been encouraging to focus on track and it's paid off," Brynn McKeever said. "It's been crazy how I've been dropping time all year. Plus, getting to experience this with my brother is great."

Both McKeevers as well as junior thrower Pam Kandrach, who competed in the shot put on Saturday - received Academic All-Ohio acclaim as well.

Steubenville's Micah Mitchell, who ran a sub 14 high hurdle semifinal, didn't get the results he had envisioned on Saturday.




