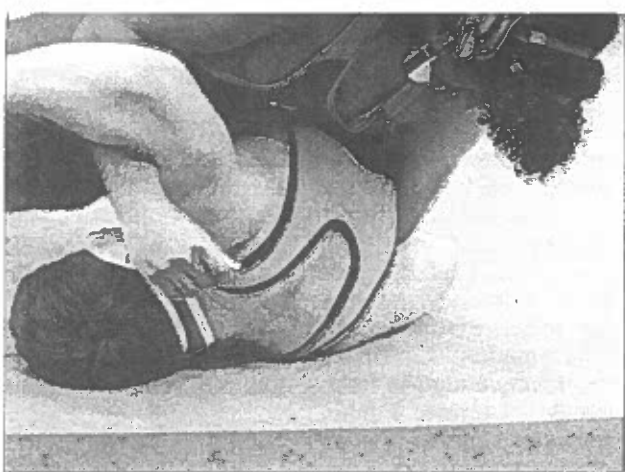

Pair Of Maroon Knights Win At Panther Classic

CONNORVILLE — Perennial W.Va. Class AA Fairmont Senior is 4-for-4 in trips to the Ohio Valley over the last two wrestling seasons. Saturday night, the Polar Bears defended their team title at the Panther Classic inside Buckeye Local High School with 277 points, which was nearly 100 better than runner up Hilliard Bradley (186).

The Marion Countians also had five individuals crowned as champions. Only two other schools — Indian Creek and Wheeling Central had more than one as both had two. Five other schools had one each, including Bridgeport, Edison, Fairless, Indian Valley and Mercer (Pa.).

Fairless finished third with 175.5, which nipped

Indian Valley (175). Martins Ferry was fifth with 161.5 while Indian Creek (160); Weir (146) and Wheeling Central (142.5) were sixth, seventh and eighth, respectively. "The kids wrestled well today." Fairmont Senior head coach Mike Fortier said. "This is a great tournament. We like coming here. Maroon Knights Topple State's No. 1-Ranked Team

WHEELING — It was a top-notch showdown between two top-ranked Class-AA teams. No. 1 Charleston Catholic visiting No. 4 Wheeling Central. Behind Eli Sancomb's 21 points and a fiery start to the second half, the Maroon Knights pulled off a 56-47 win over the top-rated Irish.

"We knew it was going to be a tough one. Sancomb, who shot 8-10 in the game, said, "[Charleston Catholic's] a great team, good players all around. Coach told us that we had to There were eight lead changes in the first half, the

two squads staying neck-and-neck throughout. The game was tied 13-13 after the first quarter.

The Irish grew a six-point lead towards the end of the second quarter, the road team seeming poised to seize some momentum following a big block by Zaden Ranson, but a 3-pointer from Sancomb stopped the slippage, and Central went into halftime down just a point, 28-27.

The Maroon kept it up to start the third.

An 11-0 run, fueled by steal-and-scores from Sancomb and Quinton Burlenski, and a 2-3 zone look on defense, put dis-

tance between the home team and Charleston Catholic, 38-28.

"We try to mix the defenses up a little bit, go a little bit of zone, kind of throw them off a little bit," Wheeling Central head coach Mel Stephens said. "One possession stands out in the third quarter, they had to use an awful lot of clock. I think we ended up with a steal. I was proud of our kids' effort today. Offensively, I think we can get a little bit better, but we talk about making winning plays, and today I thought we were able to do that."

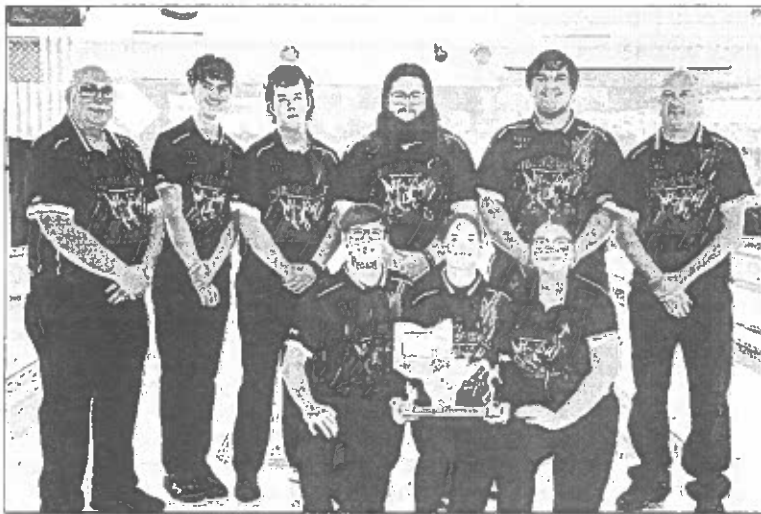

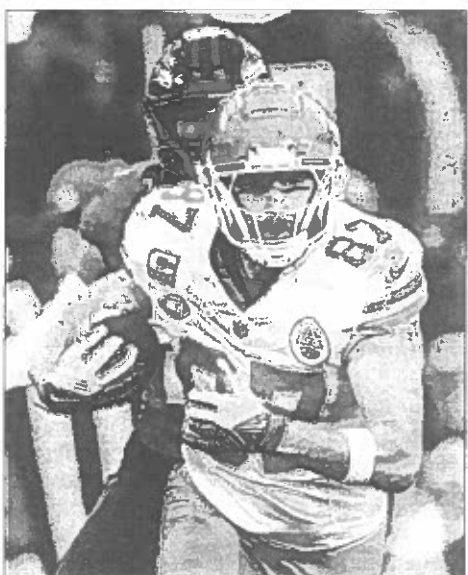

SABALENKA REPEATS AS AUSSIE OPEN CHAMP

Aryna Sabalenka has successfully defended her Australian Open title. The No. 2-ranked Sabalenka clinched back-to-back titles at Melbourne Park with a 6-3, 6-2 win over No. 12-seeded Zheng Qinwen in the women's final. She forced service breaks early in each set and maintained her dominance over 21-year-old Zheng, who was playing in her first major final. Sabalenka improved to two wins in her three Grand Slam finals. She is the first woman since Victoria Azarenka in 2012 and '13 to win consecutive Australian singles titles. The 25-year-old from Belarus says her breakthrough win last year gave her the confidence she could win more Grand Slam titles and her U.S. Open final loss to Coco Gauff gave her the extra motivation.

"We shot well," Eilert said, noting that they shot 43% from the field to 40% for the winning team. He could have added that they made three more field goals than Oklahoma State and made three more field goals, two more 3-point field goals.

But the box score would reveal inside the numbers the reason why the

Weir was the two-time defending OVAC 4A/5A champion. But that crown was not awarded Saturday.

The conference split up the 4A and 5A teams into their respective divisions and crowned four team and four individual champions. Much like the 2023 championships, Weir needed to come from behind in the Baker rounds to claim victory.

In '23 East Liverpool's boys held the lead after three individual rounds. This year? That honor belonged to Harrison Central. The Huskies led 2,747 to 2,708 thanks in large part to strong showings from juniors Kyle Blake and Kobie Hennis.

Blake closed strong, rolling a 204 and 214, respectively during his final two games to finish with a 615 series. His efforts were good enough for second place.

Hennis set the tone early that the championship was his to lose, rolling a 288 in the first game and backing it with a 203 in the second. After two games, Hennis held a commanding edge and not even Blake, nor Weir's Jackson Parsons could catch him.

Parsons closed strong with a 258 third game to vault himself into the Top 3, passing teammate Shane Arnold at fourth (605) and St. Clairsville freshman Brenden Thoburn, who rolled a 579 series in his first OVAC tournament to finish fifth.

Thoburn tied with teammate Sebastian Lewis for the third highest individual game at 224, a score they both rolled in the first round.

In 5A, it became apparent quickly that it'd be a three-man race for champion. Wheeling Park junior Kaden Miller started strong with a 268 in his first game, as did Parkersburg South's Logan Fling with a 247, and Miller's teammate Zac Davis with a 235.

Davis kept his consistency with a second 235 in Game 2, while Miller fought his way through some momentary struggles with a 198, still only four pins behind Davis. It was Fling who flung down the gauntlet, posting a 275 in Game 2 to take a 523 to 470 and 466 lead into the final individual game.

While 53 pins seemed like a solid cushion, it didn't stop either Miller or Davis from coming back. Miller regained form with a 220 to finish with a 686 series, four better than Fling at 682.

But Davis, in his final OVAC bowling championships, was perfect through 9 2/3 frames, leaving four pins hanging in the 10th to finish with a 296, just four shy of a perfect 300.

Park's Sam Metzner finished with 574 to come in fourth while South's Logan Utt rolled a 566 to come in fifth, one ahead of Brooke's top finisher, Damian Maine at 565.

Defending girls' champion Dover did not participate, meaning two new champions were crowned on the girls' side, though one came with little surprise.

Harrison Central's Angel Utter came in third with a 473, followed by St. Clairsville sophomore Kailin Hughes (467) and East Liverpool's Paige Grimes (451) to round out the Top 5.

Grimes came from behind in the fifth game with a 144 to overtake Harrison's Ty Lynn Smith (446 total).

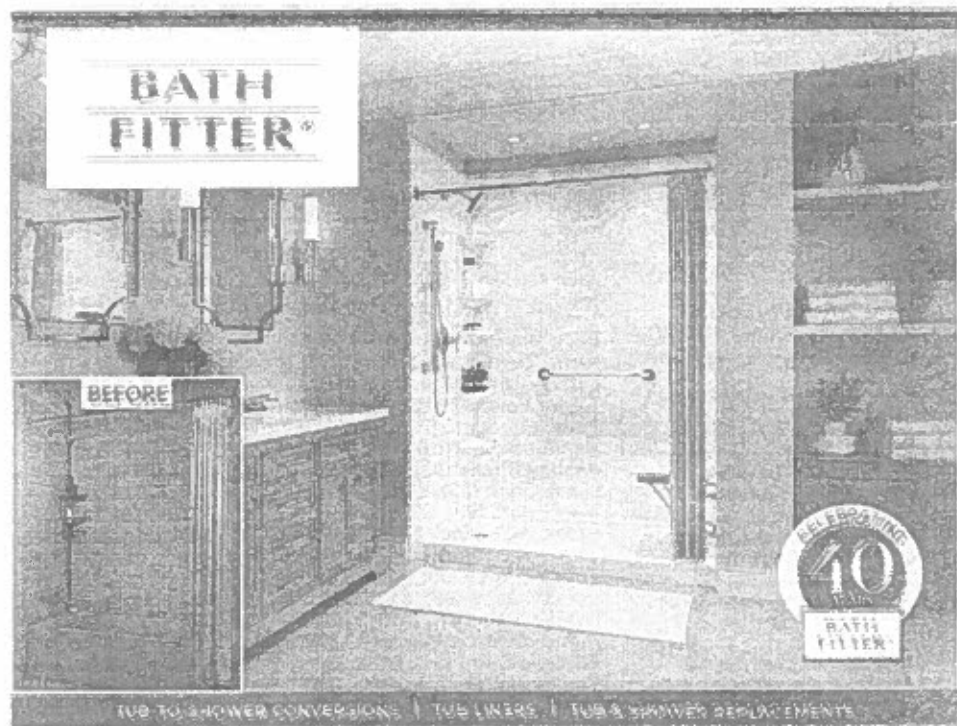
Buckeye Local's Haylee Brown (435) followed in seventh.
