Pitt Coach To Be Speaker At Conference Spring Fete

ball's "man of impact", has agreed to be the guest speaker at the spring awards dinner of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference, scheduled for Tuesday night, May 15, at 7 p.m. at Oglebay Park's Glessner: Auditorium.

The appearance of the Panthers new head football coach will serve as a highlight for the annual spring affair, which this year also marks the thirtieth anniversary of the OVAC.

Majors came to Pitt this past winter from Towa State where he resurrected a Big Eight dormat, taking the Cyclones to bowl games the last two years.

He's raiready created renewed interest in Pitt football as the result of an extensive and apparently fruitful recruiting program.

"I'm a strong believer in people, that's why I'm here," Majors said at his first press conference after accepting the five-year contract offered by Pitt athletic director Cas Myslinski, a Steubenville native. "The people here have a strong commitment to football, within the framework of the university. They want to win," Majors added.

The Pitt situation appears hopeless to many people, especially after last season's 1-10 record which brought about the dismissal of Carl DePasqua as head coach. But five years ago Majors found himself in a similar situation at Iowa State.

The Cyclones were hardly recognized as a football power. Never in their long history had they been invited to a Bowl game and they were generally regarded as pushovers in the

The following season the Cyclones were 5-6, with one of their wins coming over strong Missouri while a heartbreaking loss occurred at the

In :: 71, the biggest crowds in Iowa State history flocked to Ames to watch Majors' team roll to an 8-3 record and a Sun Bowl invitation, Both the AP and UPI selected Majors as the Big E ght coach of the year, as did G. idiron Magazine. He also served as head coach of the North team in the annual Shrine Game played on Chris mas night in Miami.

Last year the Cyclones made it to the Liberty Bowl despite a losing regular season record. They were 5-2.1 at one stage, including a 23-23 tie with powerhouse Nebraska. However, injuries took their toll and the Cyclones wound up with a 5-6-1 mark.

Majors comes from the most famous football family in the state of Tennessee. His father was a highly successful coach at the University of the South. Two of his younger brothers, Bill and Bobby, were stars at the University of Tennessee.

The new Pitt mentor earned All-American honors at tailback for the Volunteers and playing on the 1956 squad which was 10-0 during the regular season and went to the Sugar Bowl. He finished second to Paul Horning in Heisman Trophy balloting, Majors was twice named the MVP in the Southeastern Conference and still holds a number of school records. He is a charter honoree in the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.

Following graduation from Tennessee, Majors began his coaching career as an assistant at his alma mater. He moved to Mississippi State and in 1963 joined Frank Broyles' staff at the University of Arkansas as defensive backfield coach. In 1968 he accepted his first head coaching job at Iowa State.

Majors is married to the former Mary Lynn Barnwell, of Chattanooga, Tenn. The couple has two children, a son, John Ireland, 8, and a daughter, Mary Elizabeth, 6.

Mr. A. J. Vaccaro 1972 — 1973 O. V. A. C. Vice-President From the very beginning, Pitt Athletic Director Cas Myslinski wanted just one man--Johnny Majors. Myslinski and Pitt today have that man of "impact" who many knowledgeable football experts consider the finest young football coach in America.

Five years ago Majors took over an lowa State job that seemed hopeless. The Cyclones had one of the worst football reputations in the country and had never in their long history been invited to a Bowl game. Majors changed all that; he put lowa State on the football map.

His first two squads were 3-7, but that was an improvement and the Cyclones were getting beat by respectable scores. The following year he was 5-6, with one of the victories coming over a strong Missouri team and one of the loses, a 29-28 heartbreaker to Oklahoma.


The following years Major's team rolled to an 8-3 record and an invitation to the school's first bowl in history. the Sun Bowl. For that he was named Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year by both wire services. Gridiron Magazine selected him Coach-of-the-Year and he was head coach of the north team in the Shrine North-South game.

This past season Majors made it two in a row by taking his squad to the Liberty Bowl. Iowa State jumped to a 5-2-1 record early in the year, including a 23-23 tie with mighty Nebraska. But injuries took their toll and the Cyclones finished with a 5-6-1 record. Still, Majors had directed Iowa State to its only two bowl appearances since the school began playing football in 1892.

John, though, was the biggest star. An All-American tailback at Tennessee, he led the Vols in 1956 to a 10-0 regular season record (Sugar Bowl) and finished second to Paul Hornung in the Heisman Trophy balloting. He was twice named MVP in the Southeast Conference, and still holds a number of Vol all-time records. For this he is a charter honoree in the Tennessee Hall of Fame.

Majors is married to the former Mary Lynn Barnwell of Chattanooga, Tenn. He and his wife have two children--John Ireland, 8; and Mary Elizabeth, 6.


