Barnett will be introduced to the crowd by Emil Rubcich, assistant principal and athletic director at Marion Elgin High School. Rubcich was Barnett's high school coach. Rubcich was a basketball star at Union High School and West Liberty State College and coached at Dillonvale High.

Larry Barnett, youngest umpire in the American League and an entertaining after-dinner speaker, will appear as the principal speaker at Thursday night's 3ist annual winter meeting of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference.

Barnett umpired his first probaseball game at the age of 18 when he broke into the Midwest League in 1964. Soon to be 29 years of age, the Nitro, W.Va., native joined the American League in 1964 and he's been there ever-since. Barnett was selected to work the American League championship series between Detroit and Oakland in 1972 and he also worked this past—season's five game playoff involving Baltimore and Oakland,
