OVAC Wrestling Tourney To Be Largest in History

The upcoming Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament at the Moundsville Fieldhouse will be the largest, longest, and best ever held in

these parts.

For the first time, the tdurnament will be spread over three days in order to accomodate its mushrooming growth. The eliminations will be launched on Thursday of this week, Jan. 24, at 6 p.m. with first round action. The second round will start at 1 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 25, with the quarter-finals and consolation action on Friday night, beginning at 7. Semi-finals will begin at 1 on Saturday and will be followed by further consolation action. Finals-to determine first, second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth place in each of 13 weight classes-will open at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday.

A total of 31 schools, he biggest field in the history of the meet, will participate a d if all enter full teams, there will be 572 matches between Thursday at 6 p.m. and the windup on Saturday nigh.

John Marshall High, West Virginia state titlist for the last two years, will seek its third straight conference mat crown, with its chief competition likely to be provided by Steubenville, Warwood, and Weirton.

In addition to John Marshall, past champions in the field will be eight-time titlist Martins Ferry, seven-time kingpin Bridgeport, two-time winner St. John's Central, of Bellaire, and one-time ruler Wheeling Central.

Rounding out the field will be Barnesville, Beallsville, Bellaire, Brooke, Buckeye North, Buckeye West, Cadiz, Cameron, East Liverpool, Jefferson Union, Linsly Institute, Magnolia, Mingo, Oak Glen, Shenandoah, St. Clairsville, Toronto, Triadelphia, Union Local, Wheeling High, Wintersville, Weirton, Wellsville and Weirton Madonna.

Pairings will be made at a meeting of coaches scheduled for Monday night at 7 o'clock at Room 240 at John Marshall High School at Glen Dale. Bill Hinegardner, coach at John Marshall, and George Walley, the athletic director, will be codirectors.

Because of the size of the field, an attempt will be made

to use six mats at one time, at least on the first and second days. Referees will be Joe Dyser, Zanesville; Jerry Tenaglia, Mt. Lebanon, Pa.; Walter Tolarchyk, coach at Hoover High at North Canton, O.; Frank Mosier; dean of men and assistant coach at Waynesburg College; George Nedeff, head coach at West Virginia University; and Larry Deaton, of Martins Ferry.

There will be team trophies for the schools finishing first, second and third and individual trophies for the top six places in each weight class.

Weighing in will be from 3 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Friday, and from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Saturday. Athletes will be permitted a one-pound weight allowance on Friday and another pound on Saturday.

Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students at each session but a ticket "book", good for admission at all five sessions, can be purchased by adults for \$5 and by students for \$2.50 at John Marshall High or at the gate.

Defending individual champions entered are Kevin Felton, Brooke, at 98 pounds; Bob Mendenhall, Linsly, the 1973 titlist at 105 but now competing at 112; Challen Stewart, Barnesville, last year's winner at 112 but now entered at 119; Dennis Haney, Warwood, heavyweight; and Eric Frankovitch, Weirton, last year's 185-pound titlist now wrestling as a heavyweight.

Record Field Opens OVAC Mat Tourney

The biggest and best high school wrestling tournament ever held in the Ohio Valley area or in the state of West Virginia will be launched this evening at the Moundsville Fieldhouse with action simultaneously on six different

A record field of 401 matmen from 32 high schools are entered in the colorful, three-day meet, which will be climaxed

on Saturday night.

John Marshall, which is the defending West Virginia state titlist, will be seeking its third straight OVAC wrestling championship but the mighty Monarchs, who have not finished behind anyone in team score in either dual meets or tournaments since 1971, will be facing a severe test, with particularly stiff competition for laurels expected to come from Warwood, Steubenville, and Weirton. Warwood, also unbeaten this winter, has already won the St. John's and Brooke Invitational titles.

The giant field also includes Barnesville, Beallsville, Bellaire, Bridgeport, Buckeye North, Buckeye West, Brooke, Cadiz, Cameron, East Meadowbrook, Liverpool, Jefferson Union, Linsly, Magnolia, Martins Ferry, Mingo, Oak Glen, Shenandoah, St. Clairsville, Bellaire St. John's, Toronto, Triadelphia, Local, Weirton Union Madonna, Wellsville, Wheeling, Wheeling Central, and Wintersville,

Barring last-minute scratches, there will be 193 bouts tonight, in order to get the first round completed. Secondround action begins at 1 p.m. on Friday with quarter-finals at 6 Friday, followed by the initial consolation matches. Semi-finals begin at 1 on Saturday afternoon, followed by more consolation action. The Saturday night session will begin at 7:30, with three mats in use, and will spotlight championship bouts, as well as contests to determine third, fourth, fifth, and sixth places in each of the 13 weight classes. It would not be surprising if the outcome of the third-fourth and

fifth sixth place tussling has much to do with the final

outcome of the team score. Warwood has 11 seeded grapplers in the meet, com-pared to 10 each for Steubenville and John Marshall. Weirton, which has eight seeded grapplers and John Marshall have three top seeds apiece, compared to two each for Warwood and Linsly Institute, while Brooke, Steubenville and Martins Ferry have one each.

Returning are five of last year's individual titlists-Kevin Felton, Brooke, at 98 pounds; Bob Mendenhall, Linsly, winner at 105 last year and now competing at 112; Challen Stewart, of Barnesville, the 1973 champ at 112 but now wrestling at 119; Denny Haney, Warwood heavyweight; and Eric Frankovitch, last year's 185pound kingpin from Weirton who has moved up to the heavyweight division.

Mendenhall, Felton, and Haney are top seeded in their respective weight classes. The other top seeds are Martins Ferry's Jeff Oberdick, at 105; Steubenville's Joe Jarrett, at 119; Weirton's Chris Pryor, at 126; John Marshall's Ron Griffin, at 102; Warwood's Ron Jewell, at 138; Linsly's Doug Pell, at 145; John Marshall's Ron Koontz, at 155; John Marshall's Scott Lehasky, at 167; Weirton's Sheldon Grace, at 175, and Mike Kovalick, also of the Red Riders, at 185. Griffin has had 13 matches to date this season and has pinned every opponent.

John Marshall Claims OVAC Mat Championship 3d Straight Year

Before a gym-jamming crowd of 2,300 roaring fans, host John Marshall High achieved its third straight Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling championship Saturday night at the Moundsville Fieldhouse.

The largest turnout ever for a schoolboy wrestling event in this area watched the mighty Monarchs, who have not lost either a dual meet or at a tournament since 1971, wrap up the crown when Scott Lehasky, at 167, topped previously unbeaten Bill McKenzie, of Warwood, to put the hosts so far ahead with four weight classes remaining that they were uncatchable.

The depth and balance of Bill Hinegardner's team paid off for Weirton had four champions to the hosts' three and made it close at the finish by taking the titular bouts in the last three weight classes, with two of the nods being by pins.

titlists are Bob Mendenhall, Linsly Institute, who won at 112: Challen Stewart, Barnesville, victorious at 119; and Kevin Felton, Brooke, the 98pound ruler.

Other champions are Jeff Oberdick, Martins Ferry, at Rick Tluchowksi, Steubenville, at 138; and Dean Patterson Oak Glen, at 145.

Brooke's Felton found himself with a little tiger on his hands in Mike Gregg, Union Local sophomore who had won 14 straight, but Felton was ahead, 7-6, going into the third period and the Brooke junior added two points on a predictament to nail down his fifteenth nod in as many starts,

Oberdick (12-3), only a sophomore, built a 6-1 lead in the first period against Jim Fluharty (16-2), of Warwood, and stood off the Viking junior for a 6-5 verdict as Fluharty was unable to turn the blond Ferrian over in the last period

to get the points he needed to win.

The unbeaten Mendenhall stretched his season's winning streak to 18 matches by a 6-0 shutout of Wheeling's Duke the margin. Hanlan (13-2), a junior. Mendenhall, now a senior, was: titlist at 105 last year and move up a weight

Stewart, a Barnesville senior, also moved up a weight after being 112 titlist last year and this time copped 119 laurels with a pin of surprising Steve Nightengale (6-1-2), of Wellsville, in 2:31. It was the fourth pin in five tourney matches for Stewart (14-0). Nightengale was unseeded but upset top-seeded Joe Jarrett, Steubenville, in the first round on Thursday.

Weirton's Pryor, a senior, gained his eighteenth victory without defeat by pinning John Dolan, (15-2), Wheeling Central, impressively in 1:59.

Two unbeaten grapplers, Griffin, John Marshall, and Darrel Owens, Steubenville, both 14-0, hooked up in a wingding 132-pound final, with Griffin eking out a 6-5 nod, with a third-period escape providing

The 138-pound final went overtime with Steubenville's Tluchowski getting a takedown that gave him a 13-2 record and a 2-0 nod over Butch Coleman (10-2), of Wellsville.

Linsly's Doug Pell suffered his first loss in 18 starts and had to settle for runnerup honors at 145 for the second straight year when topped by Oak Glen's Patterson (17-1), also a senior, by an 8-5 score.

John Marshall's Koontz (14-0) needed a third-period escape to decision John Kotson (11-3), of St. John's 4-3, in the 155pound windup.

Warwood's Bill McKenzie had pinned four straight opponents on his way to the 167pound final but suffered his first loss in 17 outings to John Marshall's Lehasky (14-1) by a 5-2 score in a win that wrapped up the team title for the Monarchs.

John Marshall finished with 136 points to 130 for the run nerup Red Riders while Warwood claimed the third place trophy with 108 points just one more than Steuben! ville High. Martins Ferry was fifth with 72½ markers followed by Wellsville, with 64½; Linsly Institute, 60½ East Liverpool, 51; Bellaire St. John's Central, 50: Brooke, 44: Oak Glen 431/2; Union Local 41; Wheeling Central, 371/2 Wintersville, 29; Wheeling, 28? Bellaire, 261/2; Beallsville, 251/2: Shenandoah, 25: Triadelphia, 231/2; Jefferson Union, 211/2: Bridgeport, 19: Magnolia and Mingo 10 each; Buckeye West, Meadowbrook, 61/2; Cadiz, 6; St. Clairsville, 5; and Weirton Madonna, 2. Toronto. Cameron, and Buckeye North failed to score.

A brilliant sophomore from Weirton, 175-pounder Kevin Grace, who pinned five straight opponents on his way to the title, won the Dave Bierkortte Memorial Award as the outstanding wrestler in the tournament.

Weir High's other titlists were Chris Pryor at 126, Mike Kovalick at 185, and Eric Frankovitch, heavyweight. John Marshall represented in king row by Ron Griffin, 132; Ron Koontz, 155: and Scott Lehasky, 167.
