## Three Eastern Ohio Schools Gain OVAC Wrestling Titles

### Bellaire Retains 3-A Crown; Cadiz, Beallsville Win

Three Eastern Ohio schools won divisional championships in the 25th annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament completed early Sunday morning at St. John Arena in Steubenville.

Wheeling Park was the overall titlist with a whopping 231 points. The Patriots also reign as 4-A champions.

Bellaire repeated as 3-A champion with 125½ points, good for fifth place overall.

Cadiz made the best showing of the East Ohio entries. The Cardinals finished third overall with 167 points in winning 2-A honors.

Beallsville made its best showing ever in the conference mat event with a 10th place finish overall. The Blue Devils earned a trophy as the top 1-A team.

John Marshall earned a trophy as 4-A runnerup with 169 points. Rayer was the 3-A runnerup with 76 points which was good for ninth place overall. While Linsly won the runnerup trophy for the combined 2-A, 1-A divisions.

Other finishers among the top 10 included Weirton, fourth with 137 points; Brooke, sixth with 95½ points; Steubenville, seventh with 86 points; and East Liverpool, eight with 82 points. By divisions, here's how the final standings look:

Four champions from last year's tournament repeated. One of them, junior Carl Stanley of Wheeling Park, who won at 98 pounds as a sophomore, won at 112 and was also accorded the Dave Bierkore Memorial Trophy as the tournament's outstanding performer.

Dave Chadwell of Beallsville won his second straight title. Chadwell, who was third as a sophomore at 105, won at 112 a year ago and prevailed at 126 in this year's event.

Ray Pennell of Weirton, winner at 138 a year ago, is the 145-pound Davia of Cadiz repeated as the 155-pound titlist.

The only other individual champion from the immediate Eastern Ohio area is Barnesville's Alan Logan. A runnerup at 167 a year ago, Logan prevailed at 175.

Logan, Davia and Chadwell all came out of the conference tournament with unbeaten records.

Another feature of the tournament was the presentation of the "Mr. Mat Award" to John Vrotsos, assistant principal at Martins Ferry High School. Vrotsos started the mat sport at Ferry High and guided the Purple Riders to seven consecutive conference championships. He produced several sectional and district championship teams and a number of outstanding matmen, including a state champion in John Scordos.

The tournament, which was delayed Friday because of the inclement weather and forced officials to exam two days of action into Saturday's schedule, was concluded at 12:20 a.m. Sunday. The event drew 1,000 fans for the Saturday afternoon session and about the same number for Saturday night's finals.

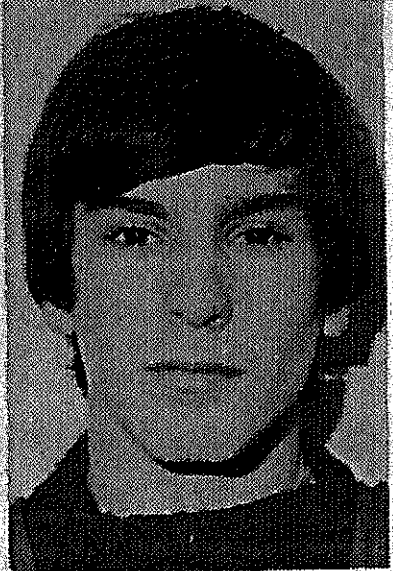

# Wheeling Park's Matmen Cop OVAC Championship

Wheeling Park High rules the wrestling roost today.

The powerful Patriots, piloted by Eric Carder, won the over-all championship and four-A honors in the silver anniversary edition of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference mat tourney, completed late Saturday night at St. John's Arena at Steubenville.

With two champions, one runner-up, five third-place winners and two four-placers, The Park placed 10 of its 13 contestants and amassed 231 points, compared to 169 for defending titlist John Marshall, a four-time kingpin.

In over-all scoring, John Marshall finished only two points ahead of Cadiz, winner in the combined Class AA-Class A division with 167 points.

Defending triple-A champion Bellaire repeated with 125 1/2 points, which placed it fifth in the over-all scoring behind The Park, JMHS, Cadiz and Weirton. The Red Riders of Weir made 137 1/2 counters for third place in four-A scoring.

Beallsville received a trophy as the top Class A school with its 74 1/2 markers.

There was a close race for the runner-up trophy in triple-A with River's 76 points nosing out Wellsville, which made 74.

With the Friday session of the tourney called off because of the giant snowfall of that day, the coaches and officials crammed virtually two days of action into one on Saturday to produce something of a marathon tourney.

Weir High had the most individual titlists—three. The Red Riders won with Randy Pryor, who topped JM's Don Simmons, 11-8, for the 98-pound laurels. Terry Weigel, a state champ last year, topped Kris Parsons, of East Liverpool, 6-1, in the 119 final while another state-titlist of 1977, Ray Pernel, last season's OVAC 138-pound champ, took the 145-pound honors with a 4-1 verdict over the Monarchs' Rick Holliday.

Wheeling Park, 1977 W. Va. state champion, won individual titles with Carl Stanley, who had been the 98-pound titlist in the conference and state meets, last year as a sophomore. He decided Brooke's Jeff Cionni, 18-6, at 112 pounds. The Patriots' Sean O'Brien, runnerup in the heavyweight division last year, mounted the 1978

John Marshall also boasted two titlists in Greg Morris, at 167, and Greg Lehasky, at 185. A state champion last year as a sophomore, Morris took Cambridge's Alan Neff, 7-2, in the 167 final. Lehasky edged Mike Kaldor, Bellaire, 10-9, in an exciting title bout.

Cadiz High's Joel Davia successfully defended his 155-pound championship as he bested Matt McCool, of John Marshall, 13-6, in the finals.

Cadiz had another champion in 105-pounder Paul Carter, who edged Joe Strickland, of River, 9-7, at 105 pounds.

Wellsville also produced two champions in Dave Bailey, who edged Meadowbrook's Chuck Sexton by 2-0 at 132, and Paul Prezzia, who nipped Bellaire's Dave Mlynek by 4-3 in the 138-pound final.

Beallsville's brilliant Dave Chadwell, the champion at 112 last winter, won the 126-pound crown by default

when Linsly Institute's outstanding junior, Paul Caruso, suffered a broken hand in the semi-finals.

Runnerup at 167 last year, Barnesville's Alan Logan moved up to the title this time by blanking Wheeling Park's Jim Fry, 4-0.

Only pin in the finals was by O'Brien.

While John Vrotsos, ex-Martins Ferry coach, was named recipient of the "Mr. Mat" Award for outstanding service to wrestling, another ex-Rider coach, Art Hehr, was also cited for his title-winning effort with the Riders and John Marshall's Bill Hinegardner received a "coach of the year" award for his team's 1977 victory.

# Vrotsos Named Recipient Of 1978 'Mr. Mat' Award

John Vrotsos, one of the most successful high school wrestling coaches that the Ohio Valley has ever seen, was honored Saturday night at the OVAC wrestling tournament at St. John's Arena at Steubenville.

The 50-year-old Vrotsos, who initiated the grappling sport at Martins Ferry High School and piloted the Purple Riders to the heights, was named as recipient of the third annual "Mr. Mat" Award in recognition of his services to the sport.

Now an assistant to Martins Ferry school superintendent John Yoder, Vrotsos coached the Riders to seven straight Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championships in the years from 1961 through 1967 and thus equalled the feat of George Kovalick, who had guided Bridgeport to seven straight titles and who was the recipient of the initial "Mr. Mat" Award in 1976. The year after Vrotsos resigned from his coaching post, his successor, Art Hehr, won an OVAC crown with the Purple and thus extended the Rider string to an all-time record eight straight crowns.

In the two years before mounting the OVAC throne, Vrotsos-coached teams were runners-up to Bridgeport. They were second in the Eastern Ohio district meet three times and won it on six occasions.

Since he has been out of coaching, Vrotsos has remained interested in wrestling and has helped to set up tournaments in the area. He directed the OVAC and district and sectional tournaments when they were held at Martins Ferry—years when the conference tourney made giant strides.

A brother of ex-Purple Rider athletes Tony Vrotsos, who went on to play football at West Virginia University, and Nick, who was

who coached basketball and football at Dillonvale and basketball at Dover and Massillon and has been a long-time assistant in the grid sport for the Tigers. "Corky" Vrotsos is a 1946 graduate of Ferry High. He was a three-year letterman in both football and basketball. He starred as a guard in basketball under Floyd Baker and Ralph Gartrell and was an All-Eastern Ohio center in football under Fred Thomas.

After service in the army, Vrotsos enrolled at West Liberty State College in February of 1948. He was graduated in June of 1951. He was a three-year varsity grid performer for the Hilltoppers during some of the school's most glorious years. In fact, while he was on the team, the West

Liberty squads, coached by Joe Bartell, went undefeated twice and played in the Smokey Mountain and Pythian Bowl games.

The Ferrian began his coaching career as a junior high coach at Newcomerstown in 1951. He returned to Martins Ferry as city recreation director in May of 1952. He served full time in that capacity until 1957 when he joined the high school faculty as head coach in wrestling and assistant in football and track. He was on the football staff when the Riders went undefeated four times in five years.

Vrotsos introduced wrestling at Martins Ferry in the 1957-58 school year, after preparing himself for that task by observation, study and actual wrestling himself. In his first year, his team suffered 10 dual meet defeats. In all subsequent seasons combined, the Riders lost a total of only nine dual meets. They won 84 and in both 1964 and '67 did not lose any. In five different seasons, they lost only one.

Best finish of the Purple at the Ohio state meet at Columbus was a tie for fifth in 1960 when Jerry McDaniel was runnerup at 103 pounds and Bob Bruney and Jeff Jones were third at 154 and 112 pounds, respectively. Bruney is now the Riders' head football coach.

Only individual state champion produced by Vrotsos was John Scordos, at 175, in 1964. Steve Scipio was runnerup at 165 in 1966 and Keith Sommer was second at 175 in 1959.

Vrotsos and his No. 1 fan, his wife, Jackie Ayers Vrotsos, have three children—Susan, 22, a teacher at Buckeye South High School; John, 20, a junior at West Liberty and a former Ferris Ferry wrestler; and Keith, 17, a junior at Ferris High where he is a regular in three sports—football, basketball, and baseball—and one of the finest all-around athletes in the school.

# Wheeling Park Wrestlers Take Command In Conference Tourney

With an imposing show of quality depth, Wheeling Park High swept into the final session of the weather-plagued Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament at St. John's Arena in Steubenville Saturday night with a commanding lead in the over-all and four-A standings.

Nosed out in the very last match by John Marshall High last year, Coach Eric Carder's Patriots took a wide advantage over the Monarchs into the finals as The Park built up 210 markers, compared to 159 for Bill Hinebgardner's squad.

Final results were not available at press time last night as the tournament ran later than usual because what would normally constitute two days of action was crowded into a

single day and night, due to the postponement of Friday's afternoon and night-time sessions because of the giant snowfall. Moreover, the News-Register was confronted with an early deadline because of the necessity of getting delivery trucks onto routes as quickly as possible.

Cadiz was spread-eagling the Class AA-Class A field as the Cardinals went into the finals with 148 1/2 markers, leaving them third in the over-all standings behind the two four-A powers, Wheeling Park and John Marshall.

Bellaire, defending titlist in triple-A, was a certainty to repeat as it had 115 1/2 counters, compared to 76 for second-place River and 53 1/2 for third-place Martins Ferry. In the Class AA-

Class A division, Beallsville's 68 1/2 points were second to Cadiz entering the finals. Linsly Institute stood next at 57 1/2 and then came Barnesville, with 49 1/2. Magnolia was fourth in triple-A with 45 and then came St. Clairsville, with 43.

In four-A, the Patriots and Monarchs were followed by third-place Weirton, 122 1/2; Brooke, 95 1/2; East Liverpool, 82; Steubenville 78; Cambridge 63; Oak Glen, 40; and Wintersville, 21. The complete final standings will be in Monday newspapers.

Wheeling Park, the defending West Virginia state champion, had three wrestlers in the championships finals and John Marshall had four.

The Park's Carl Stanley became the first repeat titlist when he defeated Brooke's Jeff Cionni, 18-6, in the 112-pound windup. Stanley won at 98 pounds last year as a sophomore.

First champion of the night to be crowned was Weirton 98-pounder Randy Pryor, who topped John Marshall's Don Simmons, 11-8. Paul Carter, of Cadiz, became the 105-pound kingpin with a 9-7 verdict over Joe Strickland, of River.

# OVAC Mat Tournament Test of St

The final session of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament began on Saturday night and finished on Sunday morning and climaxed a strange odyssey for Wheeling Park High Coach Eric Carder and his powerful Patriots.

Moreover, at least a dozen teams had reservations at motels in the Steubenville area and checked in on Thursday with full intention of staying through until Saturday night. As it happened, some of them, including Wheeling Park, did not check out until after breakfast on Sunday morning.

The victory was a coveted one for Wheeling Park as the Patriots last year battled John Marshall right down to the wire and still had a chance until the final match when Sean O'Brien was pinned by unbeaten Gordon Gordon, the Monarch star who went on to win the state heavyweight championship.

This year it was a wire to wire win for The Park. The depth and balance

of the Patriots enabled them to get off winging and no one ever threatened them. They finished with a 62-point advantage over runnerup J. Marshall. And O'Brien topped off the triumph by going all the way in the heavyweight division.

Moreover, Carl Stanley, junior 112-pound ace of the Patriots, was picked via a vote of the coaches for the Dave Bierkortte Memorial Award as the tournament's outstanding wrestler.

"We didn't miss any practice last week because of the weather conditions," points out Carder, who directed his first-year team to the state championship last March. "We were able to get our wrestlers to practice because one of our assistant coaches, Matt Doyle, has a vehicle with four-wheel drive. Two of our athletes, Jim Dunn and Mike Fazzolarri, would never have been able to get back and forth from their homes so they stayed at my house. We were able to stay in condition and I think that paid off."

Wheeling Park, River, Cadiz and Beallsville are the divisional leaders after the first

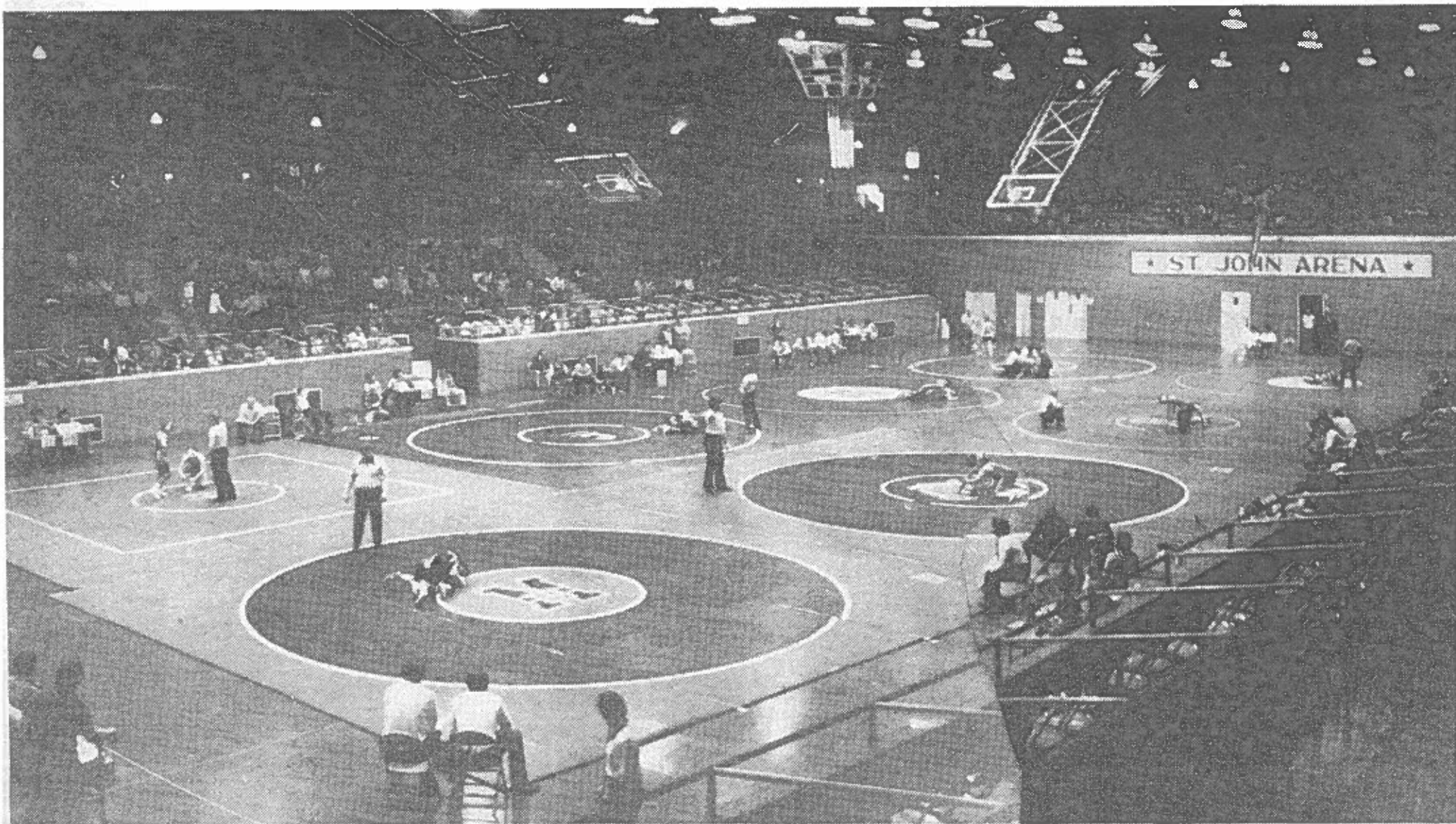

Actual wrestling action will begin at noon with the second round and officials are hopeful that they can finish it up by this evening.

After the first round, Wheeling Park is leading the Class AAAA, while River is the triple-A leader and Cadiz the AA-A frontrunner.

Snow over the East Coast also forced the cancellation of all four All America Basketball Alliance games last night including the Georgia Titan-West Virginia Wheels game set for the Wheeling Civic Center.

Other games cancelled were Carolina at Kentucky, where they have 22

inches of snow in Louisville, Richmond at Indiana where the Virginians didn't even attempt to travel to snow-bound Indianapolis, and Rochester at New York where the storm that hit us Thursday night finally dumped close to two feet of snow on New York City yesterday.

Bethany is scheduled to meet PAC rival John Carroll in Cleveland, West Liberty is supposed to travel to Pittsburgh to meet LaRoche and Jeff Tech is slated to journey to Zanesville to meet Muskingum Tech.

A total of six high school girls' basketball games are scheduled for tonight, but like the boys' games, are in the hands of the weatherman.

One definite cancellation for tonight is the Temple—West Virginia University game set for Morgantown. The Owls couldn't get out of Philadelphia because the airport was snowed in. No make-up date has yet been set.

## Borg Advances In Grand Slam With Easy Win

BOCA WEST, Fla. (UPI) — Wimbledon champion Bjorn Borg never gave Brian Gottfried a chance to get into his game and took an easy 6-2, 6-4 victory Friday in the opening semi-final round of the Pepsi Grand Slam tennis tournament.

Borg will play the winner of Saturday's other semi-final between Jimmy Connors and Vitas Gerulaitis on Sunday in the \$250,000 event which offers a first prize of \$125,000 — the biggest in tennis.

Borg took immediate control of his match with Gottfried, who was substituting for the ailing Guillermo Vilas. He won the first four games, breaking service twice. The entire

match on the new clay Boca West court took only one hour, 15 minutes.

"I was surprised at my game. I didn't expect to play that well," the 21-year-old Swede said. "I'm playing very well and I'm surprised that I got used to the clay surface so very quick."

Gottfried said his slow start was normal for him.

"I normally start slow, but he never gave me a chance to get in the game — he just played too good. Everything I tried he had an answer for."

Gottfried managed to hold his serve in the fifth game and again in the seventh, but was never able to break Borg's.

Borg again broke service in the first game of the second set, and the two held service until the seventh game when Gottfried made one of his several errors, hitting a backhand wide down the line from the baseline.

But then in the next set, Gottfried finally broke back on a double fault by Borg. Gottfried held his serve but in the next game the inevitable occurred as Borg scored the win with a backhand passing shot.

Borg said he was surprised Gottfried charged the net so often.

"Sometimes I think Brian wasn't patient enough and didn't come in on the right shots," Borg said.

But Gottfried said if he had to play

Borg again he wouldn't do anything differently.

"I've got to play my way, my style. That's the way I play," Gottfried said. "He has great passing shots and I have to pick the right shots to come in on."

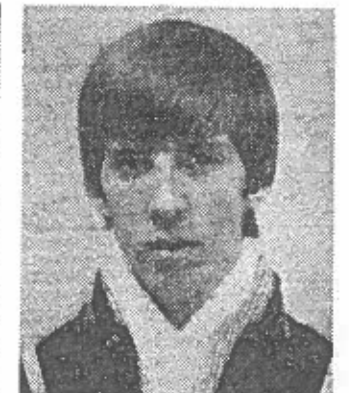

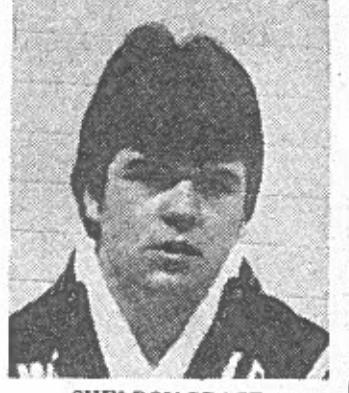
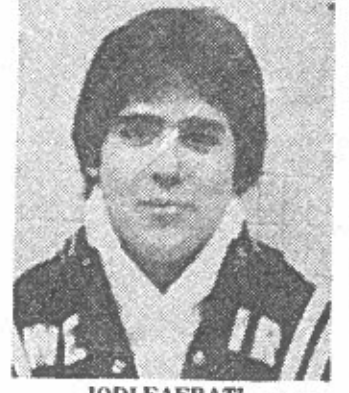
