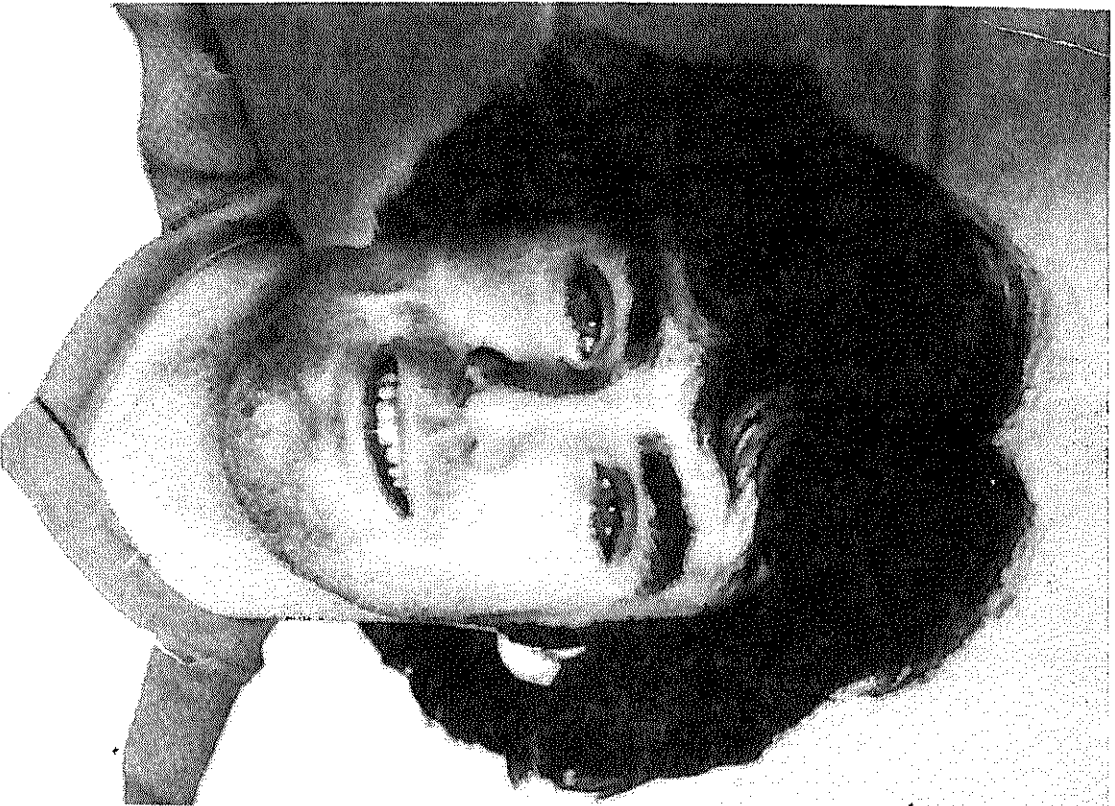

Goaltender, Atlanta Flames**

Jim Craig was the backbone of the incredible United States Olympic Team which captured the gold medal in the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, N.Y. Highlight of the competition was the 4-3 victory over the Soviets, which featured 38 saves by Craig. The American goaltender allowed just 15 goals during the entire tournament as the Americans compiled a 6-0-1 record to win the top prize for the first time since 1960.

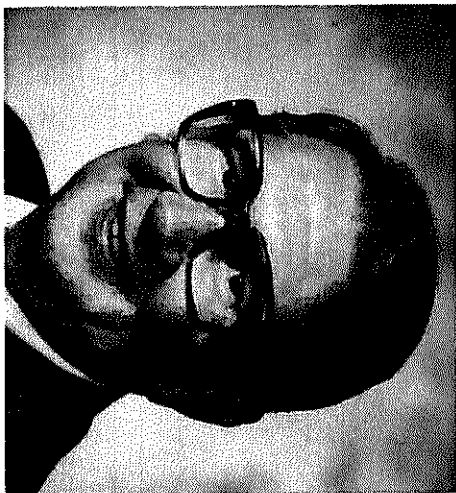
A native of the Boston, Massachusetts area, Jim Craig, is one of eight children. His mother is deceased; his father, Donald, was a proud spectator during the Olympic Games. Craig began playing hockey about the time he started elementary school. By the time he was in high school, Craig was an All-State player in Massachusetts, where he compiled a 53-3-1 career record at Oliver Ames High School in the Boston suburbs.

At Boston University, Craig was an All-American with a career record of 55-6-3 and a goals against average of 3.76. A business major, he led the Terriers to the NCAA Championship in 1978, making 34 saves against Boston College in the deciding game.

In April, 1979, Craig joined the U.S. National Team under Herb Brooks and had an outstanding tournament during the World Games in Moscow. After graduation from B.U. in 1979, Craig went on to the Olympic try-outs. He and his Olympic teammates toured Europe and the United States during the fall of 1979. Craig compiled a 30-7-1 record with an average of 2.33 during the Olympic Team's 60-game exhibition schedule before the Winter Games competition.

Drafted by the Flames as a fourth-round pick in 1977, Craig played his first game with the Atlanta team on March 1.

George D. Bates was born June 29, 1916 in Steubenville, Ohio, the son of William T. and Elizabeth Workman Bates. He attended McKinley School, Harding Junior High School and graduated from Steubenville High School in 1934.

After graduation from high school, he enrolled in Ohio University where he was a member of Epsilon Pi Tau and Delta Pi Alpha. A Bachelor of Science degree in Education was received in 1938.

Mr. Bates began his teaching career during the fall of 1938 as a teacher and all sports coach at Muhlenberg Township High School, Pickaway County. In 1939 he moved to Wayne High School, Bloomingdale, Ohio, where he was to stay until 1942 when he enlisted in the United States Army Air Force. After completion of the Cadet Flying Training program, he was commissioned and served as a single engine flying instructor and a ground school instructor. He has been a Reserve Squadron Information and Education Officer and is a Captain in the Air Force Reserves. After separation, he entered graduate school at the University of Pittsburgh. The Masters Degree in Educational Administration was completed in 1946. After brief service with the Federal Government, Mr. Bates returned to Wayne Schools in 1947. In 1948, he was appointed Principal of Wintersville Memorial School and, in December of 1950, he was appointed Principal of Harding Junior High School in Steubenville, Ohio.

Mr. Bates returned to Wayne Local School District, Bloomingdale, Ohio, as Executive Head in 1958. In 1959 he became Principal of Steubenville High School. Additional training had been completed at Ohio State University during this phase of his career.

George is a life member of the National Education Association and the Ohio Congress of Parents and Teachers, Inc. As a staff member of the Jefferson County Schools in Bloomingdale, Wintersville and Steubenville, he was active in the local education associations serving as an elected officer, delegate to Eastern Ohio Teachers Association and Ohio Education Association Conventions. An active member of the National Association of Secondary Principals, the Ohio Valley Principal's Discussion Group and the Ohio Association of Secondary School Principals, George served as a member and chairman of the Professional Rights and Responsibilities Committee. Mr. Bates also served as Ohio representative to the National Health and Physical Education Meeting in Washington, D.C. in 1963 and he participated as a member of the Principal's Committee appointed to revise the Ohio High School Standards.

George has been active as President of the Jefferson County Buckeye League, a member of the West Virginia-Ohio Officials Association, Vice-President and President of the All-Ohio Football League, Vice-President and President of the Ohio Big '8' Basketball Conference, member and Secretary of the Eastern District Athletic Board during 1963-67, Chairman of the Steubenville High School Athletic Board and Manager of the Eastern Sectional and District Basketball Tournaments.

As a member of Westminster and Worthington United Presbyterian Church, George has served as Deacon and Elder, President of the Presbyterian Men's Group and involved in church committee work. He served as Scholarship Chairman of the Steubenville Council Parents Teacher Association for many years. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge.

# OVAC HONOREE



**MR. GEORGE WALLEY**  
ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

George Walley Jr., veteran athletic director at John Marshall School, has submitted his notice of retirement to Donald Haskins, superintendent of Marshall County Schools who in turn will submit it to the board of education tonight.

Walley, 55, is retiring from both his teaching position and his athletic director duties. He has been teaching for 30 years.

Recipient of the prestigious Mr. Mat Award from the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference last January for his contributions to high school wrestling, Walley is the only athletic director that John Marshall has ever had.

A graduate of Union High School, where he played football and basketball, Walley was in the U.S. Air Force from 1943 to '46 and then enrolled at Potomac State College, which he attended for two years. He made the West Virginia Conference all-star football team as a guard in 1947.

Transferring to George Washington University, Walley also played football there and obtained his bachelor's degree in 1950. He later earned his master's degree from West Virginia University.

Walley began his coaching career as an assistant in football and basketball at Cameron High in 1950. From 1952 through '55, he was on the staff at Union High. When the late Charlie Hellinski moved from Union to Moundsville High, Walley became head coach of the Ironmen gridderers in 1955.

The next year, Walley and Hellinski were reunited as Walley joined the Trojan staff. He served as athletic director and as an assistant in track and football at Moundsville and was also head track coach in the spring of 1968.

When John Marshall High opened in 1969, Walley became athletic director for the Monarchs and relinquished his coaching duties.

The retiring athletic director teamed up with Bill Hinegardner, who is the highly-successful JMHS wrestling coach, to direct the OVAC wrestling tournaments held in Moundsville from 1968 through '75. He also directed and assisted with a number of invitational and regional tournaments and in 1974 directed the West Virginia state tournament which was held at Moundsville and which set the pattern by which subsequent state tournaments have been operated.

Walley and his wife, Penny, have four daughters and two sons. One of the sons, G.J., a former JMHS all-state football player and state wrestling champion, is now a sophomore at Virginia Military Institute, where he is on a football scholarship. The other son, Charlie, is a senior athlete at JMHS, who will participate in football next fall at Potomac State.

## OHIO VALLEY ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference was organized in 1943 with F. W. Bowen, J. E. Ewing, J. C. Greer, M. S. Harvia, B. G. Lockhart, J. V. Nelson, C. Peiry, C. F. Walker, and C. S. Wiseman among those responsible for its basic inception. Mr. C. S. Wiseman became the Conference's first president.

A demand arose in 1943 for a conference which would help stimulate and promote a more lucrative program of competitive high school athletics in the Upper Ohio Valley.

Today, the O.V.A.C. is the largest and most functional high school Conference of its kind in either Ohio or West Virginia. A total of ten major athletic programs are enjoyed by its member schools of which 47 schools supply the Upper Ohio Valley with over 8,000 athletes in the various competitive athletic areas.

It is the basic objective of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference to continue the promotion of all high school athletics and to serve in the over all development of proper school relationship, scholarship and sportsmanship within the Conference.

Mumley is a graduate of Wheeling High School and earned his B.A. Degree from West Liberty State College and his M.A. in Education from West Virginia University. He is a WW II and Korean Conflict Veteran and still maintains an active role in various service men's organizations.

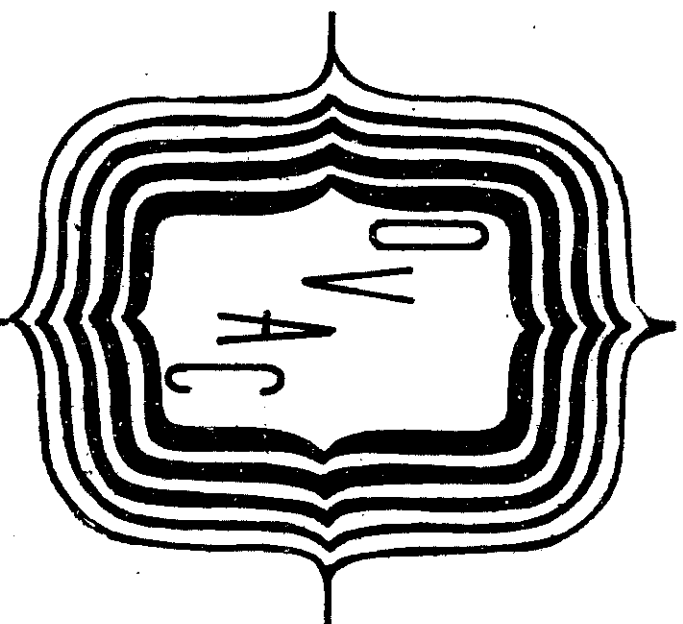
