Head Football Coach
Kent State University

Coach Chlebek led Boston College to a 7-4 record in 1980 and was selected the national Coach of the Week by United Press International for leading the Eagles to a 30-13 upset over then-nationally ranked Stanford in the second week of the season.

Boston College ended the season with a five-game winning streak, and three of its four losses came at the hands of teams that have (and will) play in post-season bowl games. Those losses were to Pittsburgh (14-8), Navy (21-0) and Florida State (41-7), among the Eagles' victories was a decision over Ivy League champion Yale, 27-8.

Prior to taking the BC position, Chlebek was head coach at Eastern Michigan University of the MAC from 1976-77. In 1977, he was selected by the media as the MAC "Coach of the Year" for leading the Hurons to an 8-3 record. The eight wins tied the school record for most victories in a season.

A 1962 graduate of Western Michigan with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Chlebek was an All-MAC First Team choice at quarterback in 1961. A three-year letterman for the Broncos (1959-61), he was selected as the team's "Most Valuable Player." In 1961 and also played in the 1962 All-American Bowl game.

Chlebek still ranks second in the WMU record book for career pass completions (156) and yards passing (2,290), and his name still is prominent in several passing categories.

Force Academy, holding that position from 1963 through 1965. Then Gen. Abel began his public affairs career as an information services officer. Until 1968, he was deputy chief of community relations and chief of the Public Affairs Division at the academy. He also was an assistant football coach during this time.

In July of 1968, he was assigned to the 7th Air Force in Saigon, Republic of Vietnam, as chief of the Combat News Division in the Directorate of Information. One year later, Gen. Abel became a public affairs officer for the commander-in-chief of the U.S. Pacific Command at Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii.

He returned to the Air Force Academy in 1972 as director of the Admissions Liaison Office. But the following March he was sent to the Pacific area to assist Operation Homecoming. Gen. Abel made five trips to Hanoi as a public affairs officer to escort returning American prisoners of war from North Vietnam prison camps.

In July of 1978, he was assigned as special assistant to the chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff, in D.C. He assumed his present duties in August of 1980.

Military decorations and awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Bronze Star Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, Joint Service Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster and Air Force Commendation Medal.

The general is a member of the National Board of Trustees of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and the National Public Information Committee for the United Services Organization.

He assumed the grade of brigadier general on Feb. 4, 1981.

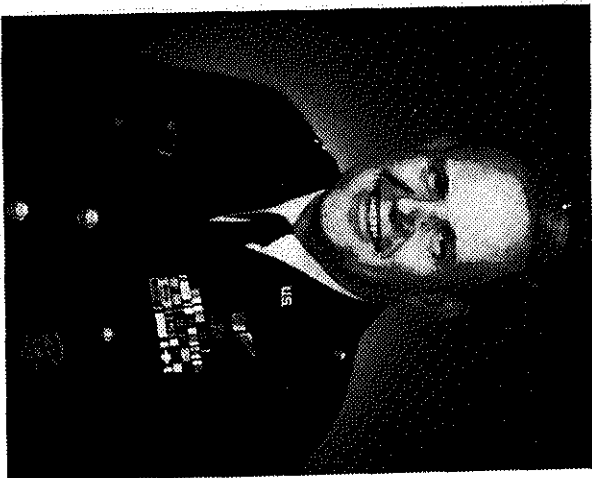
Gen. Abel is married to the former Ann Voelcker of San Antonio. They have three daughters and a son.

Gen. Richard F. Abel

Gen. Abel is a former athlete and has been involved for many years with the Fellowship of Christian athletes.

He is a native of Akron, having been born in that city on Oct. 28, 1933. He graduated from Salnt Ignatius High School in 1951 and from the University of Detroit in 1956, with a bachelor of science degree in business administration.

He also received a commission as a second lieutenant in the Air Force through the Reserve Officers's training Corps program.

The general completed Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama in 1962. He also attended graduate school at Boston University.

After receiving his pilot wings in May, 1957, at Laredo (Tex.) Air Force Base, he was assigned to the Lackland (Tex.) base as a training officer and academic instructor in the aviation cadet program.

He later was assigned as an air officer commanding at the Air

Chiebek also earned a master's degree in physical education from Eastern Michigan in 1973.

Chiebek began coaching as part-time assistant at Western Michigan in 1962.

An offensive coach throughout his assistant years, Chiebek was name offensive coordinator for Fort Wayne of the Continental Football League in 1964.

In 1966, he was named backfield coach at Bethany (W.Va.) College, and a year later was appointed quarterback and receiver coach at West Liberty (W.Va.) College. From 1969-70, he was the offensive coordinator for the New Jersey Tigers of the Continental Football League.

In 1971, Chiebek was named offensive coordinator for Eastern Michigan, a position he held for three years under head coach Dan Bolsture.

When Bolsture became head coach of the Detroit Wheels of the ten-World Football League in 1974, Chiebek joined him as offensive coordinator.

He then was appointed to the staff at Notre Dame as coach of the quarterbacks, receivers, and kickers in 1974.

Chiebek stayed at Notre Dame for two years (1974-75) before accepting his first head coaching position at Eastern Michigan in 1976.

Born Feb. 9, 1949 in Unlontown, Pa., Chiebek's family moved to Detroit, Mich., where he graduated from Detroit Western High School in 1958. He was a four-year letterman at quarterback, earning All-America, All-Michigan, and All-Detroit recognition.

Following his career at Western Michigan, Chiebek played six years of professional football (1963-69) for the New York Jets, and Ottawa Roughriders.

Chiebek and his wife, the former Sue Wood of Grand Rapids, Mich., are the parents of six children: Kim, 15; Mark, 13; Dave 12; Michelle, 11; Sara, 4; and Matthew, 2.

OHIO VALLEY ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference was organized in 1943 with F.W. Bowen, J.E. Ewing, J.C. Greer, M.S. Hattala, B.G. Lockhart, J.Y. Neilson, C. Petty, C.F. Walker and C.S. Wiseman among those responsible for its basic inception. Mr. C.S. Wiseman became the Conference's first president.

A demand arose in 1943 for a conference which would help stimulate and promote a more lucrative program of competitive high school athletics in the Upper Ohio Valley.

Today, the O.V.A.C. is the largest and most functional high school Conference of its kind in either Ohio or West Virginia. A total of ten major athletic programs are enjoyed by its member schools of which 47 schools supply the Upper Ohio Valley with over 8,000 athletes in the various competitive athletic areas.

It is the basic objective of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference to continue the promotion of all high school athletics and to serve in the over all development of proper school relationship, scholarship and sportsmanship within the Conference.

MASTER OF CEREMONIES JERRY SCHULTZE

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference is fortunate in having Jerry Schultze, former athlete and Coach at Wheeling Park High School as its Master of Ceremonies for the 39th Annual OVAC SPRING DINNER AND AWARDS NIGHT.

Jerry has been involved in athletics since entering Wheeling High School as he was an all state football center and later starred as a center for WVU. He played in the 1972 Peach Bowl and was a first team selection for the All East Squad and was named to the third team All American Squad picked by the Associated Press. Jerry has had the privilege of playing with such stars at West Virginia like Mike Sherwood, Danny Buggs and Jim Braxton.

After graduation from WVU, Schultze began his coaching career from where he graduated in the areas of football, wrestling, girls volleyball and softball. His summer months and extra time was devoted to working at many jobs for the Wheeling Park Commission, a position he held for five years. Actually, he has worked for the commission for nearly 12 years part time and otherwise. Today, he now is in the employ of the Wheeling Park Commission on a full time basis as he left the teaching field last year. His present position is being manager and director of the new lounge in Glassner Auditorium and works directly with the catering service at Wilson Lodge and Glassner Auditorium.
