Brown To Speak At OVAC Banquet

Hubie Brown, twice named NBA coach of the year while with the Atlanta Hawks and currently a probaskethall commentator, will be the featured speaker at the 39th OVAC Spring Dinner and Awards Night, set for Thursday, May 13, at Oglebay Park's Glessner Auditorium.

Student-athletes and OVAC championship teams will be honored at the banquet and the News-Register OVAC Coach of the Year Award will

be presented.

The 48-year-old Brown, who may be the next coach of either the Chicago Bulls or New York Knicks, is recognized as one of the top speakers on the banquet curcuit and therefore is in constant demand. OVAC officials were finally able to schedule him after three years of trying.

Brown was named NBA coach of the year in 1978 and again in 1979 after the Hawks extending the defending NBA champion Washington Bullets to seven games in the second round of the playoffs. In four seasons under Brown, the Hawks increased their win total from 31 to 41 to 46 to 50, winning the Central Division championship in 1980 and qualifying for the NBA playoffs three straight years.

Brown coached the Kentucky Colonels of the now-defunct ABA in 1975 and the club responded by winning its only league championship. He became coach of the Hawks the following season after the two leagues merged and the Colonels

folded.

Brown also spent three years as an assistant with the Milwaukee Bucks under Larry Costello. Prior to that, he was an assistant at Duke University and a top high school coach in New York and New Jersey.

During his early years of coaching, Brown established himself as one of the best basketball clinicians in the country, working over 50 camps per summer along the East Coast. Through the years, he has spoken at

hundreds of clinics throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe.

In addition to his job as a probasketball commentator, Brown is the host of the "Scholastic Sports Academy" show on the USA Network.

Brown has a gift for this sort of thing.

Retton, just retired as head basketball coach at Fairmont State College after dominating the West Virginia Conference for nearly two decades with his Fighting Falcon teams and compiling a remarkable record of 487 victories against 95 losses, will receive a special award. Retton's teams won 12 conference champion-ships and his 1968 aggregation reached the NAIA finals at Kansas

The 7 p.m. dinner will also feature presentation of conference championship trophies, scholarships, and other

awards.

John Sorrenti, veteran radio sportscaster, will be master of ceremonies for the evening and will be introduced by Vince Paoletti, John Marshall High principal who is conference

president.
