Vichich to receive Giffin Track Award Awards, scholarships to feature **OVAC 'Banquet of Champions'**

Presentation of special and team awards and the awarding of several scholarships will share the spotlight at the first OVAC "Banquet of Champions" set for Thursday

evening at the Wheeling Civic Center. More than 700 athletes, coaches, sports

figures and fans are expected to attend the event which replaces the Spring Awards Banquet held annually in early May at Oglebay Park.

Guest speaker for the 6:30 p.m. buffetstyle dinner event is Gary Williams, new head basketball coach at Ohio State University.

Toastmaster will be long-time Ohio Valley news and sportscaster Ken Kadar of Martins Ferry, reporter and co-anchor of the evening news on WTOV-TV.

One of the special awards to be presented is the Cal Giffin Memorial Track Service Award. This year's recipient is Shadyside High athletic director Tom Vichich, former long-time track coach who has also directed many meets during the last two decades.

Vichich, a product of old Powhatan High, produced a number of OVAC track championship teams at Shadyside, with the highlight of his career coming in 1976 when he directed the Tiger thinclads to the Ohio Class A title, the first time that a school from the eastern part of Ohio reigned as state track titlist. In 1979, Vichich's Tiger thinclads were state runnersup, losing to Lorain Clearview by one point.

Vichich-coached Shadyside teams won numerous league titles and were perennial powers in Eastern District circles for many years. Another honor which Vichich won was the coach of the year award presented by the Eastern District Track and Cross **Country Coaches Association.**

Vichich is generally regarded as originating the popular Shadyside Relays which last April observed its 15th anniversary.

Paul Donahie, executive vice president of Wheeling National Bank, will present that firm's scholarship. The Pepsi-Cola Scholarship will be presented by Jim Ovies, president of the Moundsville firm, while Al Glitch, OVAC baseball director, will present the baseball scholarship.

Ron Mauck, OVAC wrestling director, will present the George Kovalick Memorial Wrestling Scholarship and the Daniel M. Burke Memorial Wrestling Scholarship.

John DeLoretta of the Wheeling Central Booster Club will present the Dave Bierkortte Memorial Award to Shawn Murray of Oak Glen, voted the top performer in this year's conference wrestling tournament.

Basketball sportsmanship awards will be presented by John Howell of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials to Cambridge, Class 4-A, coach Gene Ford; Barnesville, Class 3-A, coach Mark Cook; Buckeye Trail, Class 2-A, coach Terry Leggett; and Woodsfield, Class 1-A, coach Bob Cain.

E. G. Mehallis of St. Clairsville, longtime Ohio State University booster, will introduce Williams, who took over the Buckeye post two months ago. After Williams' talk will be the presenta-

tion of conference team championship awards, followed by the announcement of the OVAC's 1985-86 coach of the year, with the presentation to be made by Bill Van Horne of the Wheeling News-Register. Dinner entertainment will be provided by

the Bellaire High School Women's Jazz Ensemble, under the direction of Mary Katherine Alodi.

SPORTS-FI **Ohio State Basketball Coach To Speak** At OVAC 'Banquet Of Champions'

Gary Williams, new head coach of hio State University's basketball am, will be the guest speaker on nursday night, May 29, when the-hio Valley Athletic Conference olds its first Banquet of Champions the Wheeling Civic Center.

The dinner-which replaces the biate conference's annual fall, winter id spring banquets--will showcase e OVAC's championship teams and itstanding athletes from the 45ember schools and will be the most nbitious social event in the long story of the conference.

Jerry Vinci, a member of the VAC's executive board and chairan for the upcoming dinner, plained the reasons for adopting e new format.

"First and foremost, we wanted to nor our kids," said Vinci. "We felt is would renew the enthusiasm that is been missing from our dinners in cent years. This year, we will have guests of the OVAC and the OVAC undation, coaches and members of e championship teams from the inter and spring sports. If this nture proves successful-and I'm nfident that it will-next year we'll we one large dinner and include all our champions during the 1986-87 hool year.

This past fall's OVAC titlists were nored and coaches accepted the vards during the winter dinner held the Linsly cafeteria.

The sports champions to be honed at the May 29 affair include est Virginia-side volleyball, Ohiole girls' basketball, boys' basket-ll, wrestling, baseball, track and ld, tennis and girls' softball.

More than 500 athletes and coaches e being invited to attend the dinner, th the cost being paid by the OVAC undation, which in the past has id several special dinners honoring nference teams that earned state ampionships.

"This is going to be a great evening r everyone connected with the /AC," predicted conference execu-'e secretary Sam Mumley. "It uld be the biggest conference mer in Ohio and West Virginia; aybe in the entire country. While will recognize teams that won ite championships during the year, wanted the emphasis to be on our n OVAC champions."

Mumley and Vinci promised that erything will be done to streamline e banquet program. Championship nnants and banners will be hung in splay on the wall behind the head

table at the Civic Center and will be claimed by the winning schools at the conclusion of the affair. The championship teams will be seated together at tables in the audience. Trophies will be on the designated tables and portable microphones will be used allowing the presenters to move from table to table and have each coach get up right at his own seat and accept his or her school's award.

There will be a similar setup for the presentation of the annual schol-

arship awards. These include the American University, compiling a Pepsi Cola Scholarship, Wheeling 42 record and making two trips to National Bank Scholarship, Ohio Valley Board of Approved Umpires Baseball Scholarship, George Kovalick Wrestling Scholarship and the

Dan Burke Wrestling Scholarship and the Dan Burke Wrestling Scholarship. The Wheeling News-Register award will go to the OVAC's coach of the year. The winning mentor is selected annually by a vote of the media.

Williams, who was head coach at Boston College the last four years before being selected to succeed Eldon Miller as the Buckeyes' court coach, will be the only speaker.

The 40-year-old native of Collings-wood, N.J. is considered to be one of the most dynamic young coaches in the country. His eight-year record as a college coach is 148-87 and includes five post-season tournament appearances and four 20-win seasons.

Williams' record at B.C. was a glittering 76-45 in the rugged Big East Conference. His Golden Eagles made three appearances in post-season play and Williams was selected as the Eastern Coach of the Year in 1983 when Boston Collge captured the Big East regular-season title and set a school record with 25 wins in 32 games. That team advanced to the final 16 of the NCAA tournament, as did his 1985 squad which upset Duke in second-round play and finished the year with a 20-11 mark.

Prior to taking the BC post, Williams ocached for four years at dinner chairman Vinci.

NIT. He was District IV Coach of Year in 1981, his third year American.

Williams played his college bas ball at the University of Maryla where he served as co-captain of Terps during his senior seasor 1968.

He launched his coaching caree 1969 as an assistant at Wood Wilson High School in Camden, N taking over as head coach the foll ing year and leading his team to a 0 record and the state champions Williams later spent six years a: assistant coach under Dr. Tom D at LaFayette College. He t accompanied Davis to Boston Col in 1978, but left for American U year later for his first oppotunity head coach on the collegiate level.

When Davis left Boston Col prior to the 1982-83 season to beck head coach at Stanford, Williams brought out to lead the Eagles. was an immediate success, direc his team to a 25-7 record.

Tickets for the banquet, which begin at 6:30 p.m., are priced at each. Boosters groups and familie the honored athletes are remir that table reservations will accepted. WHILE WE are in the business of passing out congratulations, let's not forget Jerry Vinci and his committee for their efforts in organizing the first Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Banquet of Champions.

In former years, the OVAC spring dinner meeting was attended largely by coaches, school administrators, a sprinkling of fans, and a few athletes who were to receive scholarships. Coaches accepted trophies and/ or pennants in behalf of their schools but the athletes never saw the awards until the coaches carried them back to their home towns.

However, it was resolved this year that the athletes themselves should be on hand. The OVAC Foundation, fund-raising arm of the conference and headed by Gordon Hennebert, picked up the tab for dinners for the athletes from OVAC championship teams and the banquet was moved to the Wheeling Civic Center, which could accomodate the large crowd comfortably.

Not every detail worked perfectly and some of youngsters had conflicting engagements. St. Clairsville and John Marshall baseball teams had tournament games and Bishop Donahue girls were hosting the state softball tournament. Martins Ferry High was having commencement so senior members of the Riders' boys' track team and girls' basketball team, both OVAC champions, could not attend.

I am certain that the conference will consider alternative dates but it is difficult to find any spring date that there will not be conflicts.

On the whole, Vinci and his aides did a superb job on arrangements. I know that Jerry himself did a ton of work. He wanted so badly to make the project turn out well and it did.

When the idea was broached, many people thought the banquet would last forever. However, the program was streamlined. The Civic Center staff began serving the buffet dinner at 6:30 and before 9 p.m. the program was over and folks were departing for home.

The administrators and coaches now know that they had the satisfaction of honoring the kids themselves and, as executive secretary Sam Mumley, said, "That's what it is all about."
