OVAC cheering competition Saturday at Wheeling Jesuit

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference's cheering competition has returned.

For the first time since September of 1995, competition will be held for cheering squads from throughout the conference with the event planned Saturday, Jan. 18.

'The last competition we had was for the 1995-96 school year, and the upcoming contest will be for the 1996-97 school year," said Sam A. Mumley Sr., OVAC executive secretary.

"The committee decided to hold the competition later in the school year because the September date clashed with too many school activities," Mumley explained. "We have a new committee, and it has worked diligently toward making this year's event one of the best.

This marks the sixth annual event for the conference's cheering squads and all four of the 1995-96 champions are expected to be part of the competition set to begin at 9:30 a.m. at the McDonough Center on the campus of Wheeling Jesuit University.

The event will begin with the Class AAA squads competing, followed by the Class AAAA teams. After these two divisions compete, there will be a short break for the

presentation of awards. This will be nerup and third-place teams in each followed by the Class A squad taking the floor, followed by the Class AA teams. Another brief awards ceremony will conclude the pro-

OVAC Cheering Championships Set

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference will hold its cheerleading championship competition Saturday, beginning at 9:30 a.m. at Wheeling Jesuit University's Alma Grace McDonough Center.

Four judges will determine the place-winners, two from Ohio and two from West Virginia. Paula Thomas, former cheering coach at Wheeling Central, will serve as rules interpreter. There will also be two timers at the scorers' table.
