## EL defends OVAC mat tourney title

Perhaps the most prestigous night of sport in the Ohio Valley.

This year's OVAC finals was once again a clash of champions that left everyone with that once a year feeling that only this event can offer.

East Liverpool defended their OVAC Crown in close style over runnerup Oak Glen. The Potters did it with depth with 10 wrestlers placing in the event.

The Potters took the 4-A crown in addition to their overall title. Coach Larry Shaw's Oak Glen's Golden Bears grabbed the 3-A crown. In 2-A Barnesville took top honors, while cameron again claimed the single A title

honors, while cameron again claimed the single A title
The 103 final pitted sophomore Josh Hoover of
Beaver Local versus East Liverpool's Jake Bates who was
seeded eigth. Bates hopped out to an early 5-0 advantage
after one period. Following a frenzied second period
comeback by Hoover that saw him inch to within four
points, the scrappy Bates would hold on to post the 8-4
victory.

The stage was set for the 112 war between two former

OVAC champions Buckeye Local's Nathan Kendjorsky and Harrison Central's Nic Rossiter, Rossiter was looking to avenge an earlier loss to Kendjorsky. With two seconds remaining in the match Kennedy was able to record a takedown to give the Patriot junior the exciting 6-5 victory.

The much anticipated 125 final resembled a chess game, both wrestlers feeling each other out in an attempt to gain an opening. Beaver Local senior Cole Bowersock attempted to dent the perfect 30-0 record of Cameron's Tyler Hughes.

Bowersock who already had two OVAC crowns, one at 103 and another at 119 became a three-time champion with a 5-1 win over Hughes.

A matchup of top seeds in the 130 pound weight class featured Wheeling Park's Derek Kennedy who came in red-hot pinning all four of his previous opponents and East Liverpool's John Varner.

The trend continued as the Patriot senior made quick work of Varner posting a 1:23 pin to gain his first title.

The 135 pound final featured Oak Glen senior Eric Noel versus Cambridge's Jeremy Furbee, Noel who has never finished lower than third at the OVAC's looked to grab his second career title.

The Oak Gen senior struck first recording a takedown to jump out to an early 2-0 lead. The relentless Noel went on an all-out offensive ittacking Furbee using a variety of shoots and takedown maneuvers. The Golden Bear grappler would urn in an impressive performance posting a 7-1 decision to grab his second career title.

The two standout matmen had never met before this championship natch. Wilson enjoyed anearly 2-0 ead, and then had to defend himelf from Roth's onslaught.

Wilson battled from the bottom toth who earned the Purple a championship with a 10-4 victory.

The Cinderella story of the night featured unseeded Buckeye Local sophomore David Bertolino who broke through the field to face Martins Ferry standout Bob Mayhugh. Both wrestlers traded attacks and with just :20 left in the second period the match was tied at 3 apiece. Mayhugh stormed back to grab a dramatic 5-4 win in what was possibly the most exciting match of the evening. Overall the 145 pound weight class was a fine show of quality wrestling, and Martins Ferry was able to get its second champion in Mayhugh.

The 152 final featured Shadyside senior Kurt Glasser who entered the match at 24-0 versus John Marshall's Derek Geroge. Glasser and George battled in a classic, and thanks to a beautiful shot late in the match the John Marshall junior was able to break up a 2-2 tie to grab the 152 pound title giving the Monarchs their first champion of the night.

West Virginia State champion Dustin Stickles of Oak Glen squared off with Barnesville standout Justin Jefferis in the 160 pound final.

At 189 pounds, Oak Glen's Phillip Bellville captured a point due to a stalling penalty on Weir's Vince Magnone.


The point gave Bellville, the top seed, a 2-1 decison over the conference's second seed at 189.



Defending champion East Liverpool leads the field after Thursday's first round action of the 48th annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament, being staged at the Wheeling Civic Center.

When matches resume at 11 a.m. today the Potters, with 40 points, will have only a four-point lead, as John Marshall, Martins Ferry and Oak Glen are all tied for sec-

While JM, MF and OG have 36 points, six other teams are within 10 of the Potters. Beaver Local, Wellsville and Wheeling Park all have 32 points, Cameron has 31, and Barnesville and Buckeye Local both have 30.

While the Potters lead in Class AAAA, (John Marshall is second), Martins Ferry and Oak Glen are tied for the lead in Class AAA. The Class AA leader is Wellsville

followed by Barnesville, while Cameron and Shadyside, with 24 points, are 1-2 in Class





## Field Expands to 36 Teams for OVAC Mat Tournamen

Wheeling Central, Conotton Valley newest additions to area's wrestling showcase

The field has been expanded to 36 teams for the 48th annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament, which continues to be one of the largest and best ues to be one of the largest and best events of its kind in United States.

This year's championships begin on Thursday night and continue through Saturday evening at the Wheeling Civic Center. More than 500 wrestlers are expected to compete for individual titles in the 14

weight classifications.

Although four champs from the 2000 tourney return only three can emerge as champions again this year.

Beaver Local's Cole Bowersock, the winner last year at 119, returns with a 19-3 record this season, but will wrestling in a heavier class at

Cameron's Roger Kupfer, a champion as a 130-pounder a year

ago as a sophomore, returns as the No. 2 seed with a 20-0 record at 145. East Liverpool s Jeremy Ghrist is that weight class's top seed with a 22-2 mark against a predominantly Division I schedule.

It's at 112 pounds where a defending champion is sure to be dethroned.

Buckeye Local's Nathan Kendjorsky, the OVAC champ a year ago at 103 as a junior, has moved up to 112 this year and has put together a perfect 21-0 mark

heading into the conference tour-

Of Kendjorsky's 21 wins is a

verdict over Harrison Central's Nic Rossiter earlier in the season in a dual match. Rossiter, a senior with a near-perfect 11-1 mark, is the No. 2 seed at 112 and is the defending champion in that weight class.

With Kendjorsky moving up to 112, the door opened at 103 for a new top seed and that came in the person of Steubenville Central senior David Skiviat. tourney's top-seeded freshmen is not your normal wrestle. The Hoppel name is one of the most respected in Ohio wrestling, but Beaver Local frosh Adam Hoppel wasn't selected as a top-seeded grappler because of his name. Hoppel has posted an amazing 18-3 record as a freshman at 215 pounds.

The sophomore top seed comes from Harrison Central with credentials that include a sixth place finish in the tourney last year at heavyweight. Huskie sophomore Tony Carothers takes a 9-1 mark into the tourney.

Martins Ferry's John Tierney was a runnerup to Rossiter at 112 last year in the tourney and moves up to 119 this year where his 14-1 mark was good enough to garner the Purple Rider junior the top-seed. Cambridge's Mark Wheatley is the second seed with his impressive 22-1 season mark.

No team dominated the list of top seeds with only two schools, Oak Glen and Beaver Local gaining two each. The only 10 top seeds were divided among 10

different schools.

Oak Glen's top-seeded pair include senior Eric Noel at 135 pounds and senior Phillip Bellville at 189. Noel was a runnerup to Kupfer at 130 last year losing a 6-4 overtime decision. Noel has posted a 17-1 mark this year. The second seed at 135 is Cambridge's Jeremy Furbee with a 21-1 record.

East Liverpool's John Varner is seeded second this year. St. Clairsville's Adam Yudasz, a third place finisher last year at 140, will enter his final OVAC tourney as the top seed at 140 with a fine 14-3 record. Oak Glen senior Kyle Eckleberry is seeded second at 140 with a 16-2 mark.

At 14-5, Ghrist is the top seed with his 22-2 record. He was a runnerup to Martins Ferry's Greg Ware last

year at 140.

Shadyside s Kurt Glasser brings his perfect 20-0 record to the OVAC tourney as the top seeded wrestler at 152. Glasser, a senior, finished third at 152 last year after defeating John Marshall's Chris Taylor in his final match. Ironically, this year's second seed at 152 is another Monarch grappler in junior Derek George with his 24-1 mark.

Last season, Barnesville's Justin Jefferies finished third in the OVAC tourney behind two of the state's best 160-pound wrestlers, Ethan Birden of Steubenvnille and Daniel Koch of St. John Central. This season, the senior takes his 19-1 mark into the tourney as the top-seed at 160. JM's Taylor is the second seed with his 19-5 mark.

Cambridge's Jake Sowers come into the OVAC tourney as one of the top wrestlers and is the top seed at

171 pounds with his 10-0 mark. The senior did not place in last year's tourney, but had an amazing postseason run. Barnesville's Zack Powell and his 20-1 record is seeded second at 171.

Twelve wrestlers will enter the OVAC tourney without a loss, but only nine have at least 10 wins to their

credit this season.




TOP RIGHT: Martins Ferry's Derek Roth Is in control of Oak Glen's pound semi-final match. Roth advanced to the finals with the victory.







## **Bears Own Nine Seeded OVAC Wrestlers**

#### Nation's largest high school wrestling tournament gets underway Thursday

When the 48th annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament kicks off Thursday, four-time defending West Virginia Class A-AA state champion Oak Glen will be the odds-on-favorite to take home an OVAC crown.

Coach Larry Shaw's Golden Bears received nine seeds overall and tied Beaver Local with two first-place seeds — the most among the 36-team field that will include Wheeling Central and Conotton Valley for the first time in recent memory.

Eric Noel, a runner-up at 140 at last year's tournament, is the No. 1 seed at 135pounds this season. Noel currently owns a sparkling 17-1 record, with the only blemish coming at the hands of Beaver Local's Cole Bowersock in the season opener.

Bowersock, a defending champion at 130, is sporting a 19-3 record, is a No. 1 seed and will wrestle out of the 125-pound weight class.

Oak Glen's other No. 1 seed belongs to Philip Bellville at 189. A senior, Bellville is the owner of a 16-1 mark.

Joining Bowersock as a No. 1 seed for the Beavers will be Adam Hoppel at 215pounds.

Hoppel owns an 18-3 record and will be challenged by 12-8 Josh Stansbury (2nd seed) and Steubenville's Tony Jones who is seeded third and owns a 17-4 record.

Overall, four champions return to defend their titles. Bowersock and Cameron's Roger Kupfer at 145, return. As do



# OVAC prep wrestling to again prove interesting

Think prep wrestling can't get any better in the Ohio Valley. Well, it just did.

The 2000-01 mat season is set to get under way and the Ohio Valley mats certainly won't be without their exciting wrestlers and thrilling matches.

With four defending OVAC champions and four more wrestlers that were runners-up back for another season, a national champion set to start his senior year and a large group of state qualifiers from both Ohio and West Virginia back for another year, things could get interesting in the valley this winter.

interesting in the valley this winter.
Wrestling in the Ohio Valley is geared for two events, the giant Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Wrestling Tournament at the Wheeling Civic Center in January and the state tournaments in both

This year's OVAC tournament will the conference's 48th. The tournament will welcome more than 400 wrestlers from the 35 schools in the conference that field wrestling teams.

An annual event every mid-January, the tourney will be held over three days, Jan. 18, 19 and 20 at the Civic Center.

Post-season tournaments get under way in mid-February in both states as Ohio sectionals and West Virginia regions open tournament action on the weekend of the February 16-17. Ohio District tournaments and the Mountain State's state tournaments will be wrestled during the weekend of Feb. 22, 23 and 24. By January the faces may change and so might the weight classes, but four defending QVAC champions are sure to be in the running for another title.



The Near-Fall Only the offensive (or top) wrestler can

score a near-fall. He may do so by causing the defensive wrestler (1) to spring into a high bridge, (2) to lean back on his elbows, (3) to expose his shoulders four inches or less to the mat, and (4) to have one shoulder on the mat and the other 45 degrees or less above the maty

The top wrestler can score two points by holding (for two seconds) the bottom wrestler in any of the above noted positions Futhermore, if the offensive wrestler can secure a near-fall for a continuous five-second period, he would then be awarded three match points for the maneuver.

The offical usually indicates a near-fall situ? ation with an angular sweep of the arm, each sweep designating a second, but he will not signal any points until the near-fall hold is ter-

In reference to the out-of-bounds line. if both shoulders are partially in-bounds or one shoulder is completely in-bounds, a near-fall can be scored.

The half-nelson, cradle, three-quarter nelson, and armbar series are near-fall maneuvers that can ultimately lead to a "fall," which is next week's topic.

## East Liverpool Defends Title in Thrilli

It was billed as the most evenlymatched tournament in the history of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling extravaganza, and it certainly lived up to the advance billing.

East Liverpool defended its over-all and Class AAAA team titles Saturday night, but had to go the distance in doing so.

The Potters led Ohio River rival Oak Glen by just four points heading into the third-place match at 275 pounds. Ironically enough, East Liverpool and the Golden Bears were matched up.

All Oak Glen needed was a pin from Joey Caughey to create the first-ever tie for the team championship, however, all Larry Shaw's highly-regarded squad could receive was a 6-5 decision, thus giving the Potters a two-point advantage, 186-

A bit of history was established early on in last night's championship round, as a pair of Wheeling Park brothers became the first set of siblings to win titles in the same year since 1970 when Matt and Mike Doyle accomplished the feat for Wheeling Central.

Ever since they were youngsters, the Kennedy's — Adam and Derek — have been wrestling with each

The two grapplers wrestled their way to OVAC tournament titles as the three-day event came to a conclu-

And both did it in exciting fashion. Adam, a junior, ran his mark to 19-2 at 119 pounds with a 6-5 decision over Edison's Derek Maple.

Kennedy found himself on the wrong end of a 5-4 score with time winding down, but a reversal with two seconds remaining gave him his

title.
"This is great," he said. "I've worked so hard in the wrestling room with my brother. Now that I've accomplished this, I can set my sights on states."

While it was exciting, the elder Kennedy didn't waste much time in his 130-pound title tilt as he caught East Liverpool's Jon Varner in a roll and claimed a pin in just 1-minute, 23-seconds.


