W. Va. boys post 2-1 win in OVAC soccer tilt

Linsly's Stephen Reihner has helped his coach, Dave Coutts, win a lot of games while an allstate performer for the Cadets.

Wednesday night, Reihner gave his longtime coach one more special memory.

Reihner powered his way to two goals to lift West Virginia to a 2-1 victory over Ohio in the 11th edition of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Boys' All-Star Soccer Classic at the LaRosa Soccer Complex on the campus of Wheeling Jesuit University.

"It was a fitting conclusion," said Coutts, who coached the Mountain State squad with Wheeling Central's Lou Vargo.

"He was an all-star player his entire career," Coutts added. "It's a good way to finish."

Reihner, who earned team offensive most valuable player honors for his performance, isn't ready to turn in his soccer shoes just yet.

He'll be suiting up for Penn State in the fall.

But before he could think about the Nittany Lions, Reihner scored two goals in less than a minute early in the second half to help get the West Virginia squad out of an offensive funk

The first goal came unassited at the 16:22 mark. West Virginia got the ball near the goal area and, after it was batted a round a few times, Reihner knocked the ball off the back of his shoe and into the net.

His goal tied the game at 1-1 and gave his team a much-needed offensive boost.

The powerful West Virginia lineup couldn't really get anything going in the first 40 minutes.

It was Ohio that controlled much of the tempo in the opening half. The chances looked good that they could repeat last year's victory. The team's tri-umph in 2003 was the first for the Buckeye State in the game's

"I wasn't sure if we were going to get the win this year," Coutts said. "Things were going a lot like last year in the first

While Ohio was getting the shots, they were having a hard time getting them past West Virginia netminder Jordan Roth of Wheeling Park.

Roth, who split time with fellow Patriot Kyle Ackermann at the position, made eight first-half saves.

For the game, he tallied 10 stops, helping him earn the team's defensive MVP

Ohio finally managed to sneak a shot by him with 19 minutes left in the first half.

Steubenville Central's Steven Matanzo scored his team's only goal of the night when he took a rebound and sent the ball into the left side of the net for a 1-0 lead.

Steubenville coach Brian Scarpone said Matanzo's goal was a great effort, however the Buckeyes had trouble getting anything else past the Patriot keepers.

"I'm proud of the Ohio boys," he said. "They put in a lot of work the past couple of weeks practicing. They played a great game."

Carpone coached the team along with Edison's Ed Vescovi and St.Clairsville's Dave Hahn.

"They took advantage of their opportuities in the first half," Coutts said of the Buckeyes. "That goal that went in for them was a nice goal."

After being unable to produce any offensive momentum, West Virginia came out of the halftime break with a renewed sense of enthusiasm.

While West Virginia started to get better looks at the net, they just couldn't seem to find the back of the net.

"We were getting a lot of shots and lots of ball possession, but we couldn't score for a long time," Coutts said.

After Reihner got his first goal, he came right back with another at the 15:39 mark. Both he and Wheeling Park's Kyle Regan broke into the open field and headed toward the net. Regan dropped off a nifty pass to Reihner who sent a solid shot into goal for ther winning mar-

Hutchins ends career with win

West Virginia coach Russ Hutchins couldn't have asked for

a better ending.

Hutchins, who recently ended his tenure as Wheeling Park High School's girls' soccer coach, tasted victory one more time Wednesday in the 10th annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Girls' All-Star Classic.

Hutchins' Red team squad scored four consecutive goals to power past the Blue team 4-2 at the James LaRosa Soccer along with Steubenville's Complex at Wheeling Jesuit Jennifer Nocera and Wheeling University.

"This is an all-star game," Hutchins, who was coaching in the contest for the third time,

"You come out, you play and you have fun," he added. "The kids got the job done."

Hutchins, who coached the game alongside John Marshall's Cindy Lawther and Madonna's John Paoloemilio, said it was nice to go out with a win.

Now he said he will spend time focusing on his family. His daughter, Karrie, is a midfielder at West Virginia University.

In the end, Hutchins aid the goal of the game was to have fun.

And they finally started to with 1:03 left in the opening half when Madonna's Stephanie Glover sneaked the ball just inside the left side of the net and made it a 2-1 game at the break.

Brooke's Jenna Allen tied the game at 2-2 for the Red team with a goal at the 9:50 mark of the final half of play.

From there, the Red squad took control of the game's tempo.
Hutchins' crew took its first

lead at the 11:12 mark of the half when Madonna's Millacent Paolo got into the scoring act with a shot from the top of the penalty box that made it a 3-2

The Red team gave itself some insurance when John Marshall alum Ashley Baker recorded a goal with 3:11 left.


We kind of ran out of steam toward the end," Regan said.
