# Fowler shines in OVAC soccer game

Wheeling Central's Kelsey Fowler scored a pair of goals, including the game winner late in the fourth period, to lead the Blue team past the Red squad 2-1 in the girls' contest Wednesday at the 10th annual OVAC Soccer All-Star Classic at Wheeling Island Stadium.

The game-winning goal capped a remarkable high school career for Fowler, who leaves Wheeling Central with 88 goals and 58 assists.

With the contest tied at 1-1, Fowler gained control of the ball about 25 yards away from the net. She then picked up speed, raced toward the goal and fired a bullet past goalkeeper Stephanie Foster into the right side of the net with 2:32 to play.

"I just wanted a better angle," said Fowler, the reigning All-OVAC First Division Co-Player of the Year whose headed to Morgantown to play for the highly touted Mountaineers in the fall.

Fowler had been testing Foster all evening, with the Weir netminder winning most of the battles. It was quite a showdown between Fowler-a four-time All-Valley honoree- and Foster-the 2004 Class AA-A Goalkeeper of the Year.

But in the end, Fowler broke through.

"It appeared she would get a goal sooner or later," said Blue team coach John Paoloemilio of Weirton Madonna.

"And she did. She's a great player."


