



Ohio turned back West Virginia by a 7-4 count to capture the annual George Kovalik OVAC All-Star Game Tuesday evening at Steubenville's Vaccaro Field.

Four Buckeye pitchers teamed to record 16 strikeouts. Additionally, Ohio's defense proved pivotal.

"Two state rivals going at each other in a good hard-fought battle. That's what all-star games are supposed to be about," exclaimed Indian Creek's Mike Cottis, one of five coaches in the Buckeyes' dugout.

"We got some key hits made some key pitches at the right time. A lot of different players contributed.'

Ohio's mound corps included Tom Brown (Steubenville), Dustin Coil (Toronto), Adam Walter (Indian Creek) and Cody Smith (Harrison Central).

Although outhit, 10-9, the Buckeyes benefitted from a two-run eighth-inning round-tripper off the bat of Monroe Central's Chris Leasure.

Headed to Shawnee State College in Portsmouth to continue his baseball career, Leasure crushed a delivery from Cameron's Brandon Rush over the scoreboard in left field, elevating the Buckeyes' lead to 6-2 in the eighth.

Later in the frame, Steubenville Big Red catcher Mike Mort clouted a sacrifice fly for a 7-2 lighting.

West Virginia rallied to score twice in its final at-bat, John Marshall's Sean Edge singled home a pair before the Huskies' Smith registered a game-ending strikeout. One inning earlier, Smith faced a two-out,

bases-loaded jam. But the southpaw fanned Brooke's Matt Taylor to end the threat.

Ohio took a 2-0 lead in the last of the third when Meadowbrook's Kyle Winland walked and advanced as Harrison's Dan Milleson reached on the Mountaineers' lone error of the encounter.
