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

Reason to Cheer

Wheeling Park regains crown; Maroon Knights claim 10th straight title

After years of frustration, winning can cure everything.

For the past two years, the Wheeling Park cheerleaders have watched Brooke High win the W.Va. Class AAA state championship and OVAC Class 4-A crown with ease.

Not this year. The Patriots were the final team to participate at the 15th Annual OVAC Cheerleading Competition and saved the best for last as they won their first OVAC championship since 2002 and 12th overall Saturday at WesBanco Arena.

"This is so exciting, words can't describe how amazing this feeling is," Wheeling Park co-head coach Shawna Shepherd said. "All the hard work these girls put in, they truly deserved this,'

Wheeling Park saw its run of 11 consecutive championships end in 2003 to Weir, before falling the following two years to the Bruins.

A new crop of Patriot cheerleaders featuring

six freshmen and one sophomore didn't know the heartbreak of past failures but two seniors did – Allie Crutchfield and Brittany Vincent. "I was there at the first one when we lost, and we haven't one since so this is so important to have won," Crutchfield said. "When you beat a rival like Brooke,

it makes it that much sweeter.'

We knew what we had to do when were were out there and its so amazing to have won," Vincent said.

The Bruins entered the Class 4-A portion of the tournament first, looking to defend their crown,

After a stunning performance, the wait was on.

The other five remaining teams put on a great show, including third place finisher Edison, but the buzz centered around Brooke and Wheeling Park.

"You never know until its over," Shepherd said.

Wheeling Park, winner of 11 titles, will look to capture its first OVAC Championship since 2002 and will be the final squad to compete.

While Brooke and Wheeling Central are used to being in the spotlight, Jones is hoping Mar-tins Ferry can become just as successful.

"Being defending champions is an honor and a great motivator," she said. "We want to be able to do just

as well, if not better, than we did last year.

"This is a great tournament and there will be a lot of good teams giving their best effort."

Each routine will last no more than three minutes and will be judged on cheering, dancing, and overall performance.

Two cheerleaders participating in the event will be awarded scholarships in May, along with other criteria such as academics.

"This is a very laid back competition and its a fun type of tournament," Shepherd said. The important part is that the girls have fun."


