




It was a wide open tournament on Thursday, a tight tournament on Friday and an exciting battle to the finals on Saturday.










'It was all my teammates," the freshman said. "They got me the ball in the right spots and I had nothing else to do but to dunk it."

Among Cambridge's ranked wrestlers are Jon Ray (No. 2 at 135), Sean Mahley (No. 2 at 152), Kirk Wetherell (No. 2 at 189), and John Nicolozakes (No. 2 at HWT).

Wheeling Park's approach

The Bears have one top seed in Troy Eckleberry at 112, three No. 2 seeds in Ethan Dray at 119, Zach Six at 145, and T.J. Osbon at 171. Ryan Asbury (at 103) and Cody Miller (at 152) are threeseeds. Joel Paolo is fourth at 125, and Nick McAvoy is fifth at 130.

As usual, Shaw figures it'll come down to the wrestlebacks.

"I'm sure a lot of schools are no different than we are," Shaw said. "They're going to try to get those guys really motivated that aren't seeded to come through those consolation rounds. The Golden Bears lead the Class 3-A field by 20.5 points over Martins Ferry and by 23 points over Bellaire.


Barnesville scored 19 points to pace the 2-A field. Caldwell is second with 16.

Oak Glen had 12 of its 14 entrants post an opening-round win, setting up the Golden Bears for another possible run at the title.

The Bears have eight seed-ed wrestlers and all of those rolled to the next round.

As is usually the case, the Golden Bears were the beneficiaries of a wrestler stepping up a notch. At 140 pounds, unseeded A.J. Rhodes knocked off the eighth seeded Tyler Bock by a decisive 8-1 decision.

The Golden Bears' only top seed, Troy Eckleberry, advanced via pinfall over Monroe Central's Jesse O'Neal in 3:51.

Wheeling Park, meanwhile, picked up where it left off last year, advancing wrestler after wrestler to the next round.

The Patriots also advanced in 12 weight classes. However, of those, three were automatically in the second round due to byes.

Patriot top seed Ronell Green (125) was on the mat barely long enough to break a sweat. He pinned Cambridge's Trevor Schaub in just 25 seconds.

Dusty Hill -- the top entrant at 171 points -- needed only 69 seconds to dispatch of Conotton Valley's Anthony Frame via pin.

All told, only three seeded wrestlers bit the dust in the first round and none were higher than a sixth seed.

















WHEELING, W.Va. — Cambridge High figures to be among the top contenders for the overall team title at the 2007 Ron Mauck OVAC Wrestling Tournament, slated to take place Thursday through Saturday at WesBanco Arena.

The Bobcats — coming off of last year's solid third place finish behind champion Wheeling Park and runner-up Oak Glen — enter this year's tournament with nine seeded wrestlers, the most of any team. Next in line behind Cambridge are Oak Glen, Wheeling Park and Beaver Local with eight seeds each while John Marshall and Martins Ferry both have seven.

Although the Bobcats didn't have any grapplers seeded No. 1, they do have five talented performers as No. 2 seeds — junior Jon Ray (22-6) at 135, senior Dan Ray (14-4) at 140; senior Sean Mahley (14-0) at 152, junior Kirk Wetherell (23-3) at 189 and senior John Nicolozakes (23-2) at heavy-weight.

Other Cambridge seeded wrestlers include junior Paul Rose (22-4), fourth at 119;

junior Chad Teague (19-5), fifth at 171; senior Jamaal Lowery (14-7), sixth at 160; and freshman Andrew Bertubin (18-6), seventh at 103.

Both Caldwell and Barnesville had four seeded wrestlers.

For the Redskins, junior Derrick Hesson earned the No. 1 seed at 215

pounds with a12-3 record. Other Redskin seeds are senior Josh Gust, third at 140; freshman Jacob Border (17-3), fifth at 103; and junior Jared Border (17-5), fifth at 135

For the Shamrocks, the quartet includes senior Paul Jefferis (24-1), second at 215; senior Charlie Fritter (19-5), fourth at 160; senior Adam Messenger (16-4), seventh at 145; and senior Josh Smith (14-4), eighth at 152.

Meadowbrook has just two seeded wrestlers junior Ed Lehotay (26-5), fourth at 103, and senior Taylor Harless (24-7), seventh at 125.

Shenandoah also has two seeds — senior Jesse Brown (23-2), second at 112 and senior Justin Rossiter (19-6), fifth at 160.

There are four returning champions in the field — Park's Green, who won at 112 in 2006; Indian Creek's Myers, who won at 140; Martins Ferry's Zac Bowers, last year's 152-pound champion who is seeded No. 2 at 160 this year; and Beaver Local's Reeder, who won at 189 last year.

The event begins Thursday at 6 p.m. with the gala Olympic-style opening ceremonies. Preliminary and first round bouts will begin at 6:30 p.m. on the eight mats, with the session expected to last approximately three hours.

The first of two Friday sessions begins at 11 am. and includes second round championship bouts along with first and second round consolations while the evening session, beginning at 5 mm., will include championship quarterfinals and third and fourth round consolations.

Saturday's first session starts at noon and will feature quarterfinal and semi-

final consolations as well as championship semifinal bouts, setting the stage for the final session which starts at 6:30 p.m. and will include the matches for first through eighth places.

Team trophies will be awarded for the champion and runner-up teams in each of the four divisions and a banner will be presented to the overall team champion. The top eight wrestlers in each weight class will receive individual awards.

Special awards to be presented throughout the tournament include the OVAC Coach of the Year and the David Bierkortte Memorial Award for the tournament's outstanding wrestler. There will also be several scholarships awarded.

Single-session tickets are \$6 for adults and \$4 for students for all sessions but the finals where they are \$8 for adults and \$5 for students. Ticket books for all five sessions cost \$25 for adults and \$15 for students.

"It will depend upon if we come out and wrestle hard (today)," Shaw noted about winning the overall team title. "There are a lot of big points to be won in


those finals rounds if we can win a lot of those we can stay in contention, but don't count out Wheeling Park or John Marshall they have a lot of kids still in it.







BRIDGEPORT Doyle building something big at Wheeling C



With both of them (Bauer and Basich) being seeded No. 1, there is a chance that we can break that streak," the hopeful Doyle said about his wrestlers. "Then we'll have to work to get a state championship.

Considering that both came in as a No. 1 seed and both came in unbeaten is impressive, but Bauer is just a sophomore and Basich, a junior. Doyle obviously has worked wonders with the two in a very short time.

"I can't say enough about them both. They put the time in during the off season. They work very hard. They are constantly learning. It has just been a great year for them both.'

Was it a surprise to Doyle that his two aces were selected as the top seeds?

"I wasn't sure (they would be top-seeded) because they both lost to wrestlers in their weight class last year, but Dirk weighed about 94-95 pounds last year and every-body knew that," the Central coach pointed out. "Dirk has had a great year. We wrestle solely in Ohio and Pennsylvania and I think coaches see that and the level that these kids wrestle at.

"Zack's the same way. He has been very, very dominant this year. I think it gives a lot of credit to them both because coaches voted for them. Hopefully, they'll go pretty far.

Doyle stepped into a pro-gram that had seen very little success if any over the past decade or so. He decided he wanted to build the program and develop wrestlers, but that can be a daunting task when you have only five wrestlers in the practice room.

I talk often about it with my father (former Buckeye Local coach Dan Doyle) and my assistant, who is my cousin, but it is something that you can't explain until you see it," the young Doyle said. "But our wrestling room and we only have five individuals. They don't have the option to come into that room and not have confidence and work hard. They come in every day. They work their butt off. They know that they are drilling with two wrestlers that are ranked one or two in the OVAC and the state. They are working out with the best kids.

"They are young too," Doyle pointed out in speaking of his other three wrestlers. "But if these two guys could do well, it would just give the Central program a real boost

and the community could see that we have an OVAC champion or a state champion so lets get our kids in the program. Hopefully, it will hap-pen (having two OVAC champs), but I can't imagine what it would do.

'We don't have a junior high program, but we have a Mini-Knight program that we run for about a month that is part of the Greater Wheeling Wrestling League. We had about 15 kids from first grade through sixth. We train in the fall and we train in the spring."

As for the OVAC, it means a lot to Sean Doyle just as it means a lot to so many of the wrestlers who have participated in the tournament over the years.

"I never did win this tournament. I was runnerup a few times and I feel that one of the biggest things I can help these kids with is preparing them for the mental state and not fail where I did. I feel like that was the biggest block that I had. Dirk and Zack aren't like that, when they go on the mat and they are fully prepared and they want to score, score, score. The nerves don't get to them.

"For them to win an OVAC championship, it would be like that one that I never got. So it's gratifying for me. I get as

nervous in the corner as I did wrestling. are making great s the Ohio Valley." wrestling.

"I tell my kids that it is really the mental aspect of wrestling. Having yourself prepared, having yourself in the right state of mind. Whether that was getting with them they were very good, but would score by a few points.

"You are starting to see it more in the valley and especially in recent years with Dave Bertolino and Willie Saxton and Zach Schuller and the way they are wrestling on the top teams in the country (wrestling for points).

"Coaches are changing," he said. "You go to Clevelandwhere they have the best wrestling in the country and you going to go to every school and see coaches that wrestled at a college Division I level. You are starting to see that here. You have Brian Davis who was a national collegiate champion, Jay Michael who wrestled in the Big Ten, Lamont Tucker was an All-American. They know the mentality at that level and they are willing to give up some of that knowledge to make our wrestlers better and bring them to another level. 


