When the pom-poms were all put away River had won their first ever AA title finishing ahead of Wheeling Central and St. Clairsville defended their title in class AAA.


Toronto repeated in Class A and the Wheeling Park

Pilot's senior squad member Landyn Lucas said the squad had made winning the AA crown their goal.



Wheeling Park wins 13th conference title

The 18th annual OVAC Cheering Competition took place at WesBanco Arena on Saturday afternoon and four champions were crowned.

When the pom-poms were put away, River had won its first Class AA title, finishing ahead of Wheeling Central.

St. Clairsville defended its Class AAA crown.

Toronto repeated in Class A and Wheeling Park won the Class AAAA championship, finishing ahead of the defending champion Brooke.

Wheeling Park won its first OVAC crown since 2006 and its 13th overall. The Patriots have won the second-most conference titles. Wheeling Central has won 14.

The Patriots' squad is comprised of 14 cheerleaders, five of whom are seniors.

The conference crown was a fitting end as the Patriots have enjoyed a solid campaign.


We qualified for state and were run-

onship in 2003. "It's become a good rivalry between us and Brooke," Shepherd said.

OVAC Cheerleaders Ready to Take Stage

Annual competition set for today at WesBanco Arena

Cheerleaders from all over the Ohio Valley will liven up Wes-Banco Arena today at the 18th Annual OVAC Cheering Compe-tition, where 33 squads will compete.

Libby Shepherd, director of the event, said she only hopes bad weather will not be a factor for this yearly occasion.

"I hope the weather cooperates because I know all of the coaches are concerned about the lack of practice they have had due to the weather, but all of the schools are in the same predicament," Shepherd said.

Doors will open for the public at 8:30 a.m., but the event will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the Class A division, followed by Class AA, then awards. The afternoon session, Shepherd said, will start at approximately 12:45 p.m. with the Class AAA division, followed by the Class AAAA division and finish with awards,

Shepherd also said there will be performances by the three winners of the second annual Junior High OVAC, which includes Bridge Street, winner of the small middle school; St. Clairsville Middle, winner of the large middle school and Wheeling Park jayvee, winner of the junior varsity.

Each team will cheer it out while trying to top the champions of previous years and beat old rivals. The defending champions are Toronto in Class A, Monroe Central in Class AA, St.

Go Team! Doors will open for the public at 8:30 a.m., with the event set to begin at 9:30 with the Class A division, followed by Class AA, then awards. The afternoon session will start at approximately 12:45 p.m. with the Class AAA division, followed by the Class AAAA division.

Clairsville in Class AAA and Brooke in Class AAAA.

Shepherd said each squad is judged based on cheer, dance and overall impression, but only has three minutes to perform its routines.

"Each team has 3 minutes to incorporate cheer, dance and tumbling in any manner they choose," Shepherd said. "Judges look for facials, timing, spacing and use of the floor ... This is just a fun day for all the squads to show their skills and hard work and perform for their fans.

Finally, competing in Class in the Class A division include, in AAAA division in the following




stood the time and hard work all of these squads put in to make their routines as good as they are.


The event is open to the public. Admission is \$6 for adults and \$4 for students.




