

Mountaineers rally from three-run deficit to capture OVAC game

STEUBENVILLE – West Virginia had shown few signs of life through six innings of Monday night's annual OVAC All-Star Baseball Game.

In fact, the Mountaineers were being shut out on one hit by their Ohio counterparts as the top of the seventh arrived.

The tables would take a dramatic turn from that point. Ten unanswered runs teammates for a 3-3 lighting. later, W. Va. had roared back to inflict a 10-3 beatdown on the Buckeyes under ideal weather conditions at Vaccaro Field. Behind a trio of effective pitchers, Ohio had methodically mounted a 3-0 upperhand before West Virginia erupted. Fort Frye righthander Chad Stengel was the unfortunate victim during a five-run, bat-a-round seventh frame which helped elevate the Mountaineers to victory in front of a nice turnout. There was little to suggest a W. Va. uprising was imminent following strong mound outings from Toronto's Dave Porter, Edison's Sean Connelly and Zanesville Rosecrans' Michael Reef.

Stengel with a base hit to begin the sev-enth. Parkersburg South's Bryan Hooper then induced a base on balls.

Stengel battled back to record consecutive outs before surrendering four consecutive hits.

Weir High's Chris Bittinger belted a run-scoring hit putting putting West Virginia on the board.

The victory ended a six-year dry spell for West Virginia in the snappily played clash that took just 2 hours and 10 minutes to according

10 minutes to complete. "This one was for fun but we defi-nitely wanted to win and snap West Virginia's losing streak," said a smiling Lou Comis, the stellar catching standout who went through a pressurepacked weekend while leading Weirton Madonna to the state Class A championship in Charleston.

'Eddie, Max (the Nogay brothers) and I really were in this game. We're still kind of on cloud nine after winning downstate, Comis said.



unscathed, retiring the next two hitters on a strikeout and a popup to third base. It was the hard-hitting Comis who finally came up with the Mountaineers first hit. Leading off the top of the fifth, he whistled a single into left field off Zanesville Rosecrans' Michael Reef, the third of five Ohio pitchers. Comis later drew a bases-loaded walk to pick up an RBI in the top of the eighth when West Virginia added three more runs to



open an 8-3 lead.

The Mountaineers go-ahead seventh inning started when Magnolia grad Mason Rine lined a sharp single to left. Fort Frye pitcher Chad Stengel, who started the seventh inning on the mound, then walked Bryant Hooper from Parkersburg South to put runners at first and second still with nobody
