



After a popup in foul territory for the first out, Indian Creek's Tim Newburn singled in Koehler for a 4-1 lead.


"We always tell our teams that the team that has the biggest inning is usually going to hold up and win the game," Fred Heatherington said. "(Monday) it did."

His coach agreed.



Kramer retires from Madonna

WEIRTON Kramer, the winningest coach in the more than 50 years of football at Madonna High School, has decided to step down.

Nearly 70 years old, Kramer has decided to call it quits primarily because his coaching staff was depleted because of workrelated issues.

"Several coaches on my staff, including my son and others who have been with me for many years are unable to make a commitment to coaching football," said Kramer, who has a record of 110-35 as the Blue Don mentor. "I tried to find some coaches to replace them, but there just wasn't the right fit. I just felt I didn't have time to put a staff together with a similar philosophy about football that I have.

"And I'm not getting any younger myself. It is time to relax. My wife, Kathy, has supported me since we were married 25 years ago, and she retired from her job last year so there are some things that we want to do together."

One title which was not attributed at the beginning of the piece but can also be applied to Heatherington is father.


This season was made even more special when son, Darin, was counted among Steubenville's senior ranks.
