WHEELING - The 20th Annual OVAC Cheering Competition took place Saturday, and for a change from most local sporting events, the cheerleaders were the ones being cheered for. Thousands of friends, families and supporters of the Valley's cheerleaders packed into WesBanco Arena to watch as 31 schools from all over the Ohio Valley competed in four divisions.

When it was all over, it was the same four schools from last year's competition repeating. The judges selected Toronto in the single A division, Linsly won the double A trophy, St. Clairsville won the triple A division and Wheeling Park won the four A competition.

Joey Takacs, head coach for the Red Knights cheer squad, was very excited when it was announced that Toronto had won the Class A trophy, "It is our fourth OVAC trophy and fourth in a row, and we are very happy to be here again.

CHEERLEADERS FROM all over the Ohio Valley will wake up WesBanco Arena Saturday at the 20th Annual OVAC Cheering Competition, where 31 squads will compete.

Libby Shepherd, director of the event, said she only hopes bad weather will not be a factor for this yearly occasion.

"I hope that the weather cooperates this year," Shepherd said.

Doors will open for the public at 8:30 a.m., but the event will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the Class A division, followed by Class AA, then awards. The afternoon session, Shepherd said, will start at approximately 12:45 p.m. with the Class AAA division, followed by the Class AAAA division and finish with awards.

Shepherd also said there will be performances by the three winners of the annual Junior High OVAC. Performing their winning routines will be Warwood Middle School in the small school division. Bridgestreet Middle School in the medium school division. Triadelphia Middle School in the large school division. 

"Everything has gone real smooth," she said. "We were a little nervous about the weather but we lucked-out there. Every year the compe-tition gets tougher and tougher.
